“What a pair!”

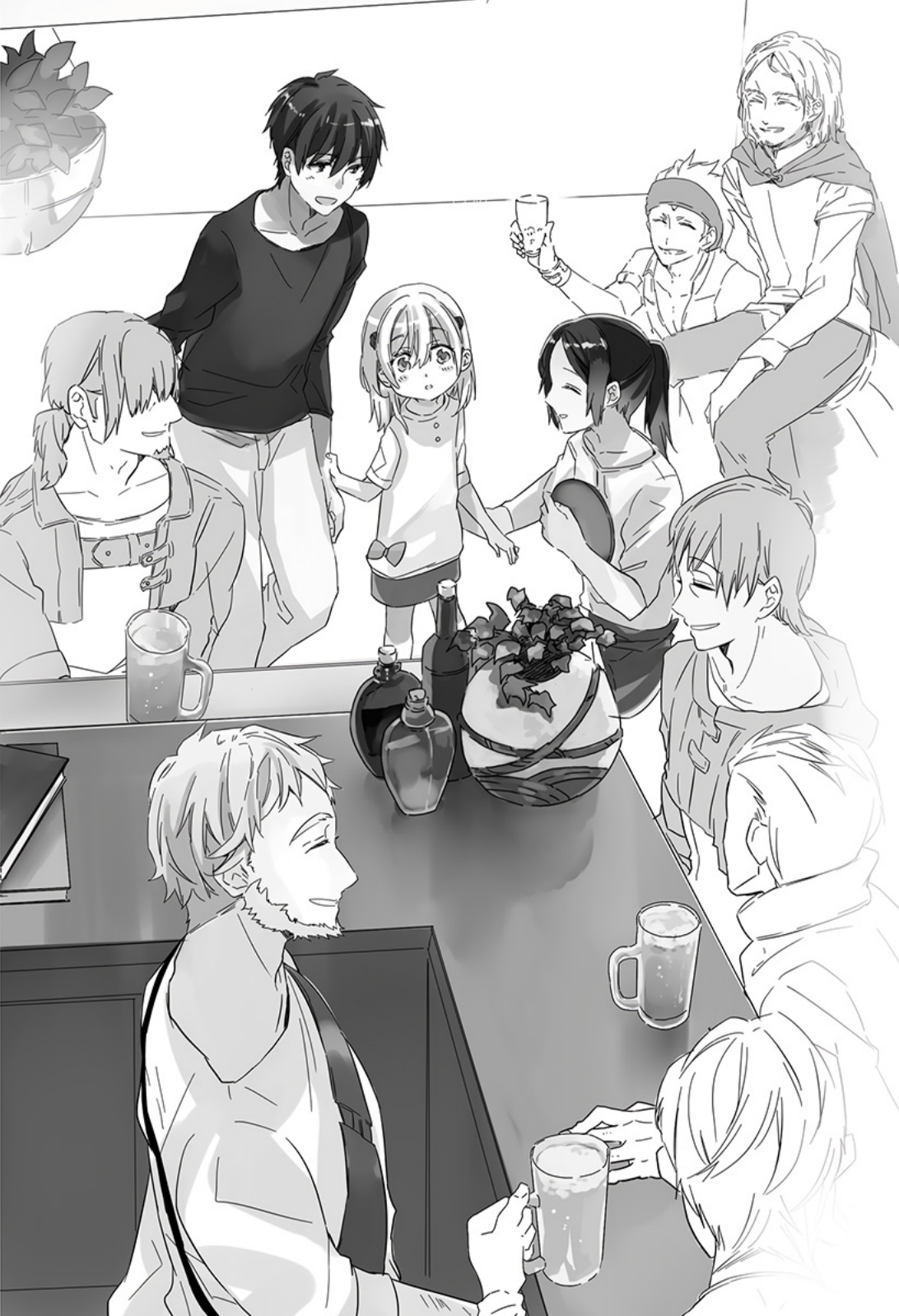
