"I see."

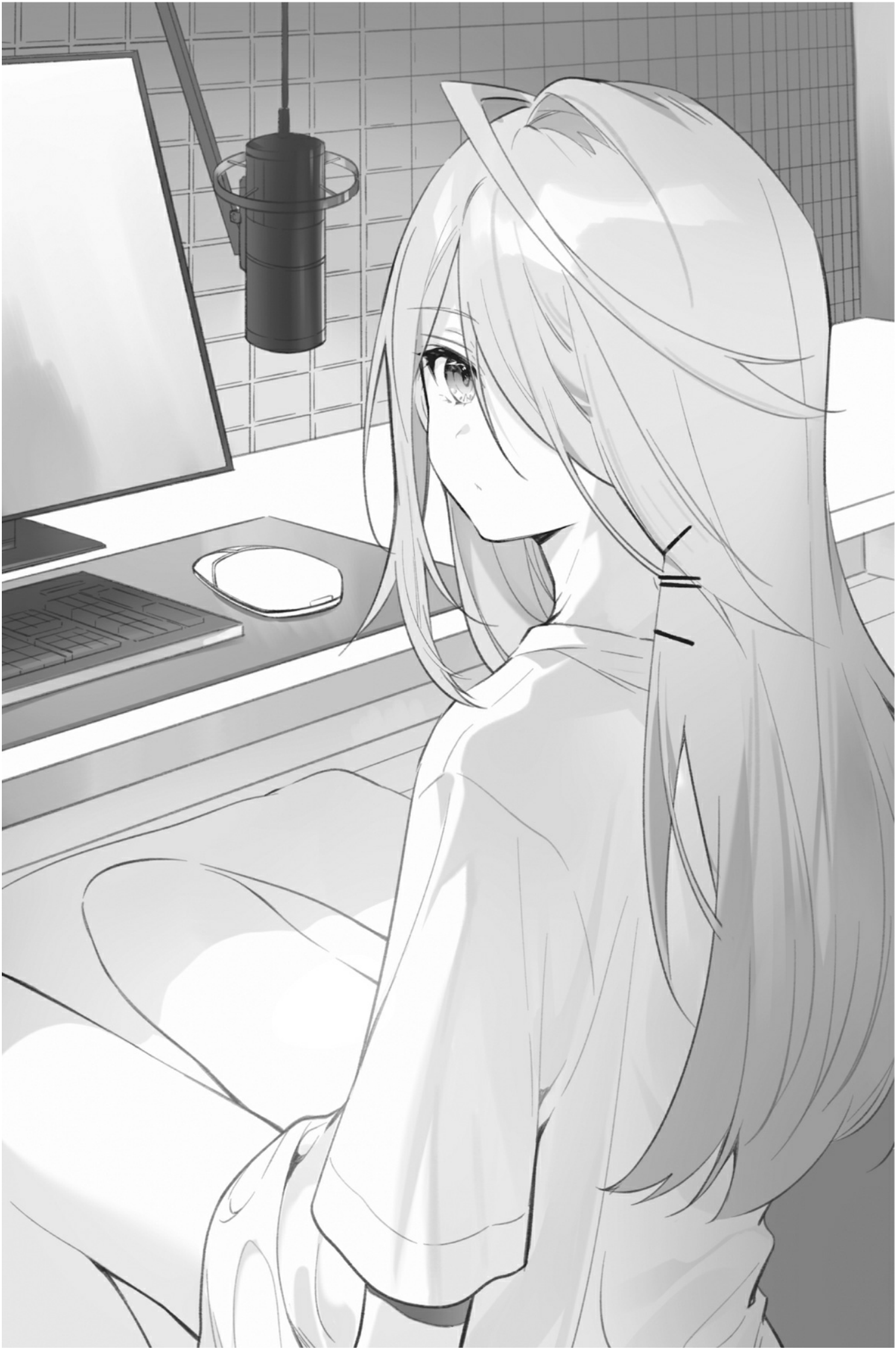
"Yeah."

"Oh, of course she won't mind, will she? When she's such an amazing singer? Please, come and set an example for the class."

The teacher and the students were all gazing at Shiika.

“What do you want to do, Shiika?”

“All I have to do is sing?”

“Apparently.”

“Okay. I’ll do it, then.”

When Shiika drew level with her, Erio snorted.

“Wow. Thought you’d chicken out.”

“Chicken out? Why?”

No doubt she’d taken it as Shiika implying that being compared to her was no big deal.

But that wasn’t Shiika’s intention at all. For Shiika, singing was never a competition. It just came naturally to her, like breathing.

A being possessed of such mental fortitude that she would have no fear in the face of Erio Shibuya... That wasn’t Shiika.

To begin with, she had no concept of how skilled and formidable Erio Shibuya was.

Shiika Ikebukuro just didn’t see the world like that.

“I said singing, but really, it’s just vocalization. Sing ‘la’ into this phone. Use whatever register is easiest for you. Then go one octave lower—and one octave higher. This app will determine your vocal range. Isn’t technology wonderful? In the old days, we had to vocalize along to a piano and sort of fumble around to find the best vocal range. These days, we have apps to determine it for us.”

Mr. Afro whipped out his phone, speaking in enraptured tones.

“All right, Miss Shibuya. Let’s start with your natural voice. Your chest voice.”

“All right.”

Erio nodded and took a deep breath.

Then...

“La-la-la-la-la-la-la-la— ♪”

Well, no one was shocked. You couldn’t call it singing, just vocalizing, but even that sounded amazing coming from her.

Her wide vocal range, too, was impressive.

When I first noticed Shiika could sing, I was interested in her vocal range and register, and I tried doing some research. Apparently, the vocal range of a standard female is an octave and a half from G3 to C5.

G3 and C5, in other words, goes from the “so” we learn in elementary school and junior high music classes to the “do,” which is two octaves higher. But this kind of terminology is really meant for those obsessed, so feel free to just sort of skim over it.

Women with voices that are higher and lower than average only differ in the pitch of notes they can produce. If they don’t do special training, the range of notes that they can produce will generally fall within this one-and-a-half-octave range.



The wider the range, the richer the variety of songs a person can sing.

Singers with a five-octave singing voice get bragging rights, not only because they can produce high-pitched sounds, but also because they can sing in a wide vocal range.

In that sense, Erio Shibuya's vocal range was truly extraordinary.

A piercing, high-pitched sound rang out across the studio, exceeding what would normally be the limit, yet it retained a beautiful tone.

Voice appraising complete.

Mr. Afro was amazed by the results the app showed.

"Two octaves from F3 to F5 in the natural voice. Six octaves including the whistle register?!"

"Phew... Yep, that's about it."

Shibuya caught her breath and grinned.

"Bravo! Oh, this is something special! I would have liked to compare an alto girl with a soprano girl, but we have seen something unexpectedly amazing today! I can scarcely believe you could go so high in the whistle register—and while maintaining total control, too!"

"I can't express it well, but...something about your voice gives me the ick."

"I noticed it when I heard your I Tried Singing video. There's something weird about you."

"What is your problem? Are you trying to start beef with me?"

“But that doesn’t seem to have anything to do with music...”

“That’s what you’d think, right...?”

“People think absolute pitch is the ability to guess the pitch or melody of a sound just by listening to it or having the ability to reproduce it yourself—”

“For example, a piano that is tuned to start ‘*la*’ at 440 hertz will go up to 466 hertz, 494 hertz, and 523 hertz as you play the ♯ of ‘*la*,’ ‘*si*,’ and ‘*do*,’ in order. Even if you were taught to guess the notes, you might not be able to

understand the 480 hertz notes played by pianos with different tunings.”

“Ah, I see. So depending on what the premise is, even absolute pitch can change, right?”

“Right. That’s why a musician with perfect pitch who was educated at 440 hertz can’t match an orchestra that’s tuned to 442 hertz. Or if a tuning different from the frequency range that they were educated in becomes popular, well, it’s like having a door slammed in their face, see?”

“Aha. So Mana Akihabara is actually a genius musician because she’s not constrained by having perfect pitch... Right?”

“I wouldn’t go as far as to say genius.”

Her take on this was way too self-serving. But whatever.

“Though, you know, Gakuto, what’s this explanation have to do with Shiika and her ability?”

“It depends on the conditions, but people can see 7.5 million colors. In other words...”

“The pattern of sounds generated by humans generally falls within this range of colors... Something like that?”

“That’s correct.”

I was impressed by Akiba’s intuition. Not bad for an aspiring composer. Still, I continued.

“Being able to perceive sounds with a much higher degree of accuracy than people who merely possess perfect pitch...THAT is Shiika’s big talent.”

In fact, synesthesia isn’t such a rare talent.

“Your passionate singing voice is wonderful. If I had a flower like you in my life, maybe even I could find happiness... One hundred and thirty points.”

Then, in a trembling voice, she said:

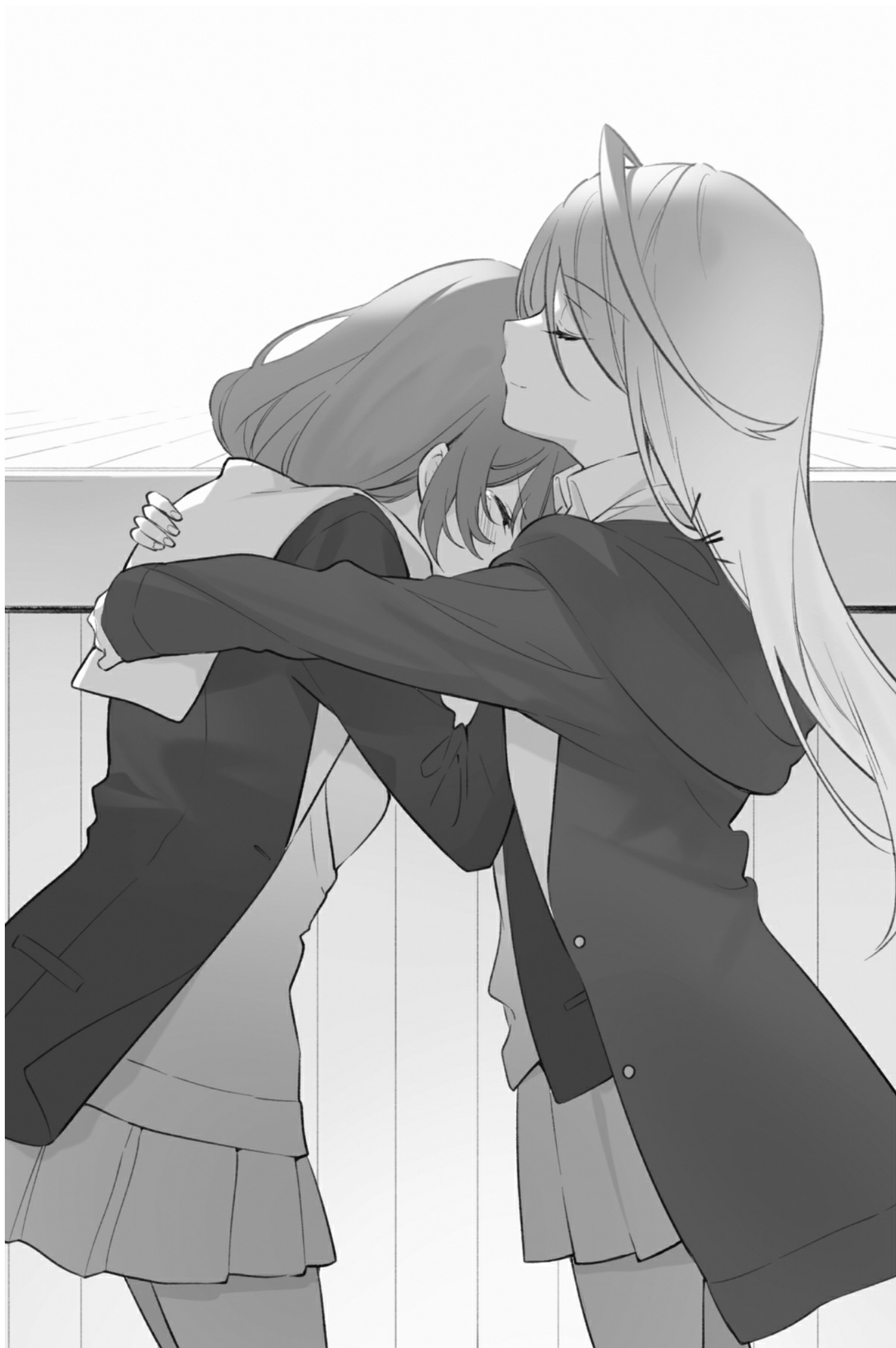
“...Sorry.”
