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
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Prologue

His embrace grew a little tighter.



"Lean, I found an earring."


It looked familiar, but Cecilia couldn't figure out where she'd seen it before. Her friend, on the other hand, recognized it immediately.

"It would be my reward to you, contingent on my plans succeeding. How about it? Not a bad deal, right? I know you've been searching for it, too, since you found my missing earring."


"…"



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
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
