And it was sad.


In the end, the Department of Combat lost 20 percent of its students. Considering the hell they had faced, it was a miraculously low number.

Without a word, she opened her eyes.


Those misty eyes stared at Kou. He was relieved; she seemed able to understand him. But the next moment, her lips curled oddly. Her mouth

"We're gonna be contributing something to the festival commemorating the end of the Gloaming. Anyone want to be in charge?"


Every student present shot Kagura a look of exasperation.

Next, White Princess took Black Princess's hand again. The two twirled around several times, enjoying themselves.


They danced for a while longer, trading off leading or following.


In response, Kou wiped away his overflowing tears. He struggled to squeeze his trembling voice from his throat. At last, he managed to whisper: "It's all over."

"Finally. We can't get started without you. Come on, let's go."


Hikami, Mirei, Tsubaki, and Yaguruma smiled at him.
