“...I refuse,” came Kou’s simple response.

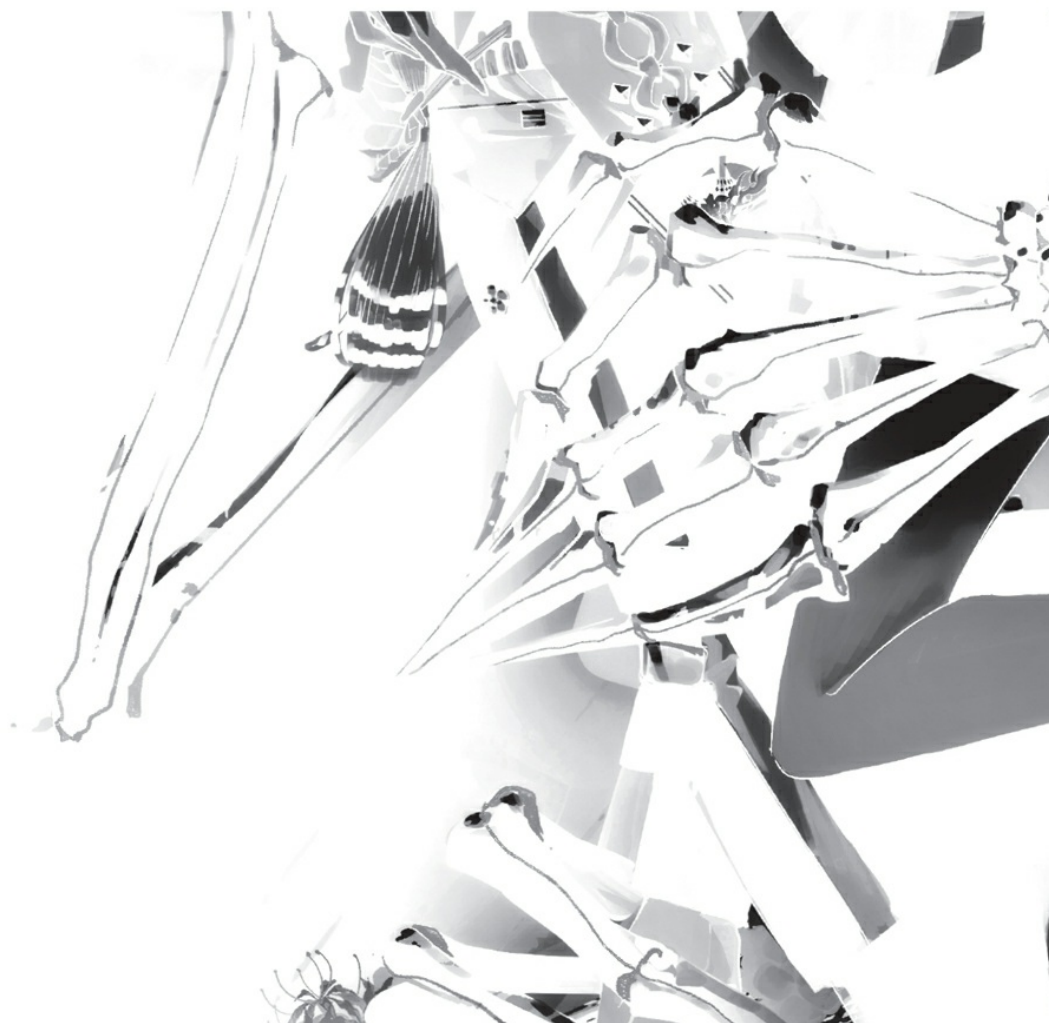
The girl smiled as if she’d known he would say that. Her smile was tender, filled with childlike innocence.

Black Princess turned bright red and brought a hand to her neck.

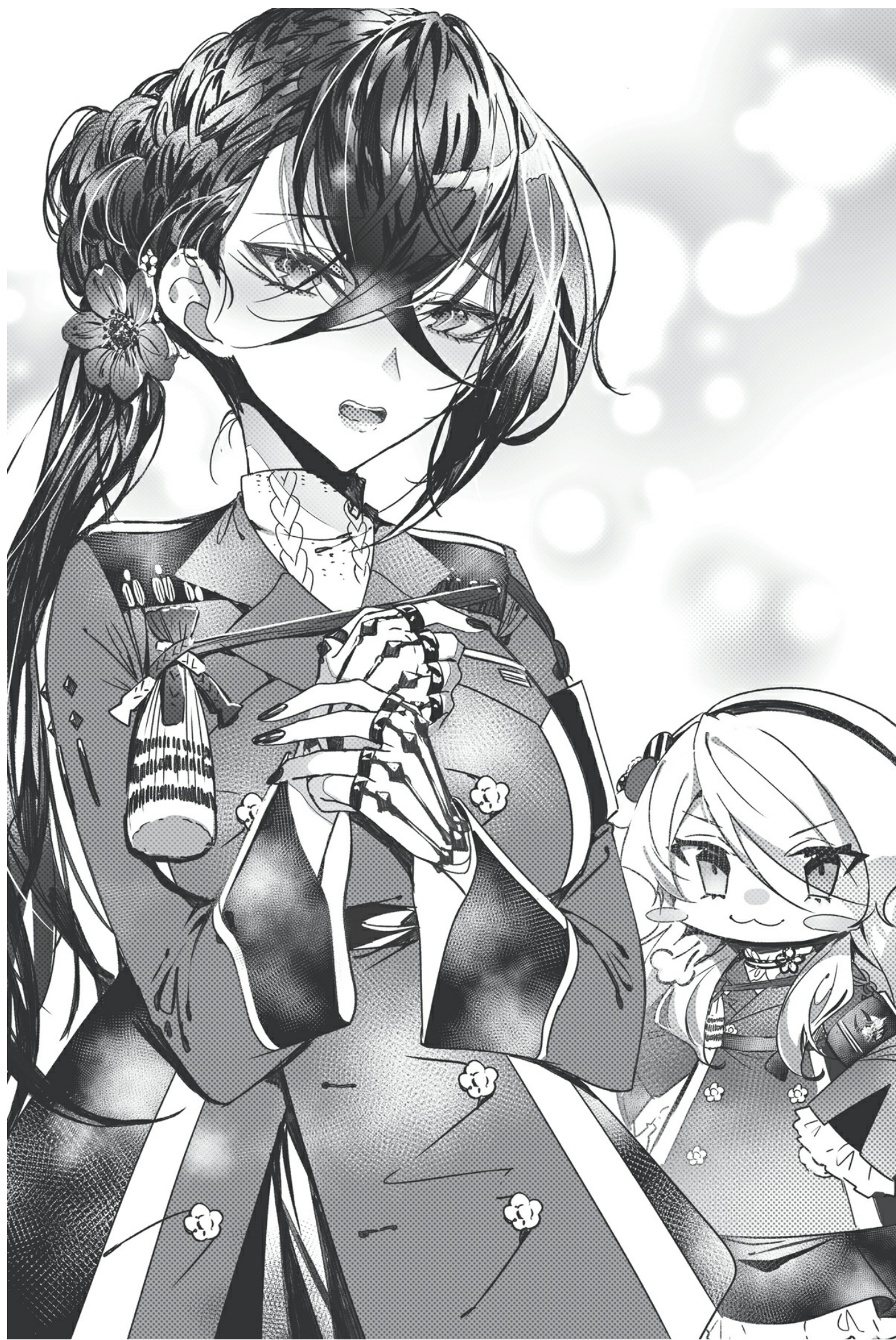
Kou told her again how cute she looked, which made her cheeks burn even

There had to be someone Asagiri had interacted with, someone who gave her the information about Kou's Bride. That was the first thing Kou needed to figure out.

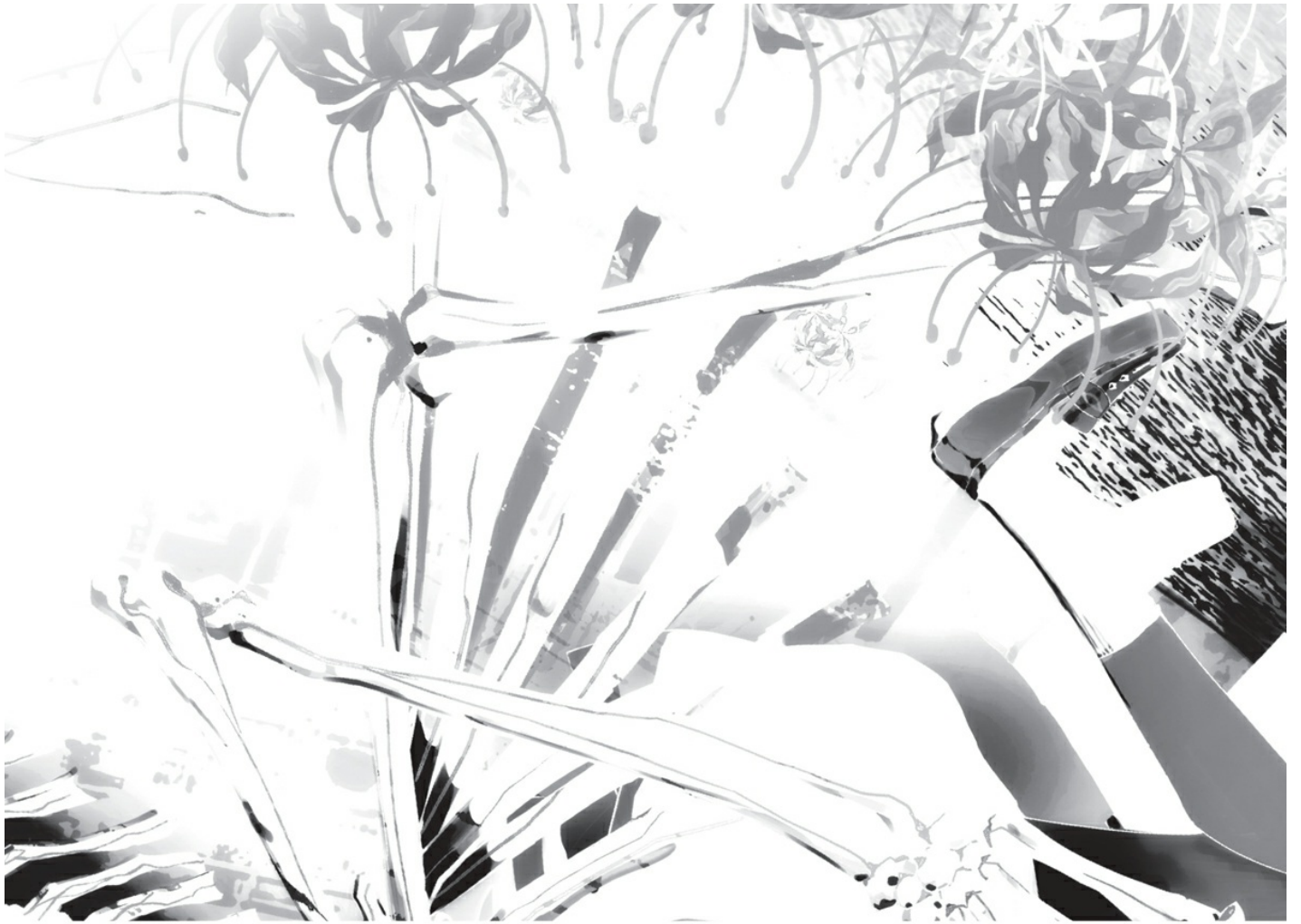

“Argh!”

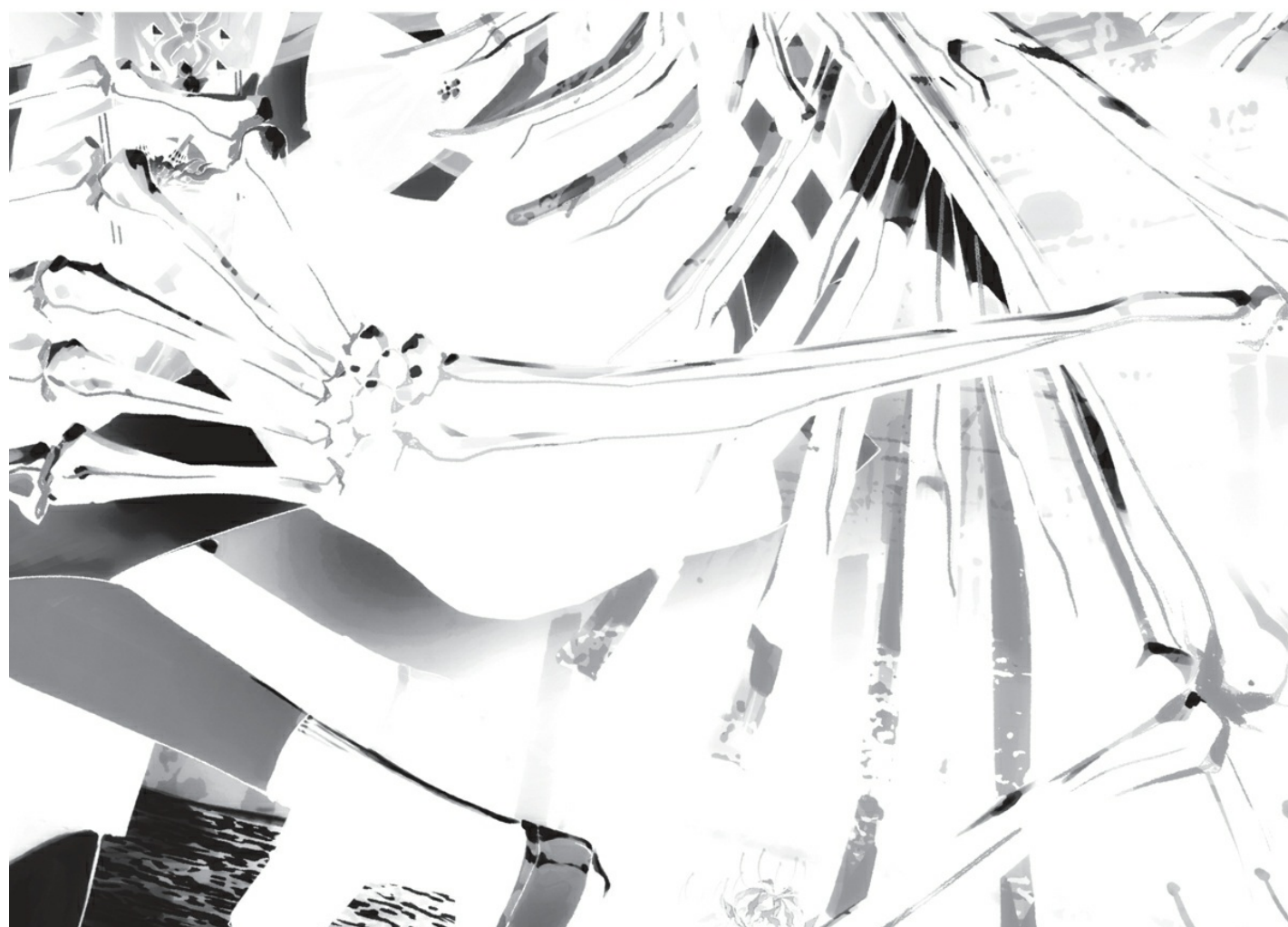

With friendliness in his voice, Kashmar said, "I'll send for you again. Next time, I'll show you around the capital. Look forward to it."

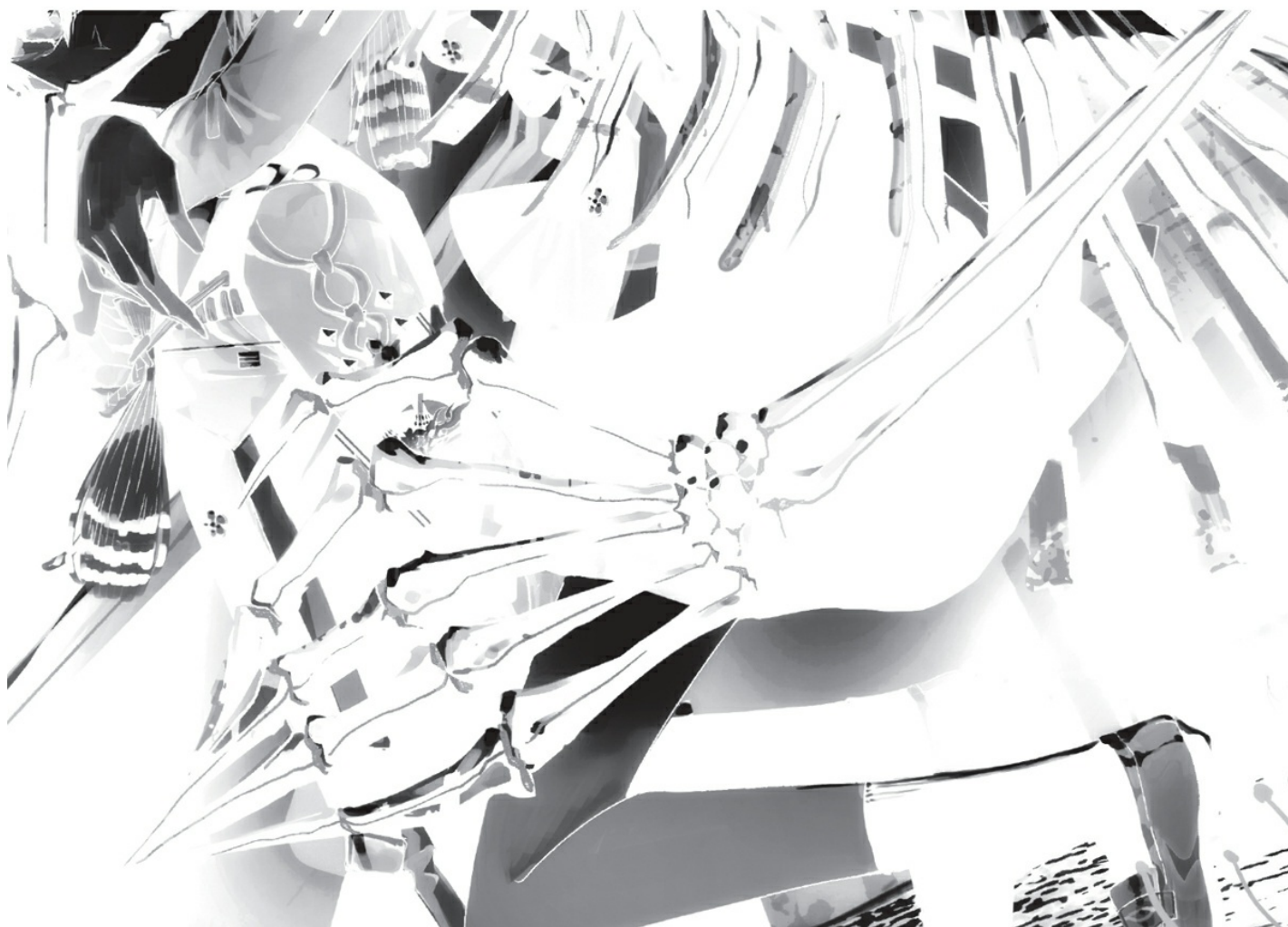
*"We'll meet again."*

Asagiri didn’t reply.

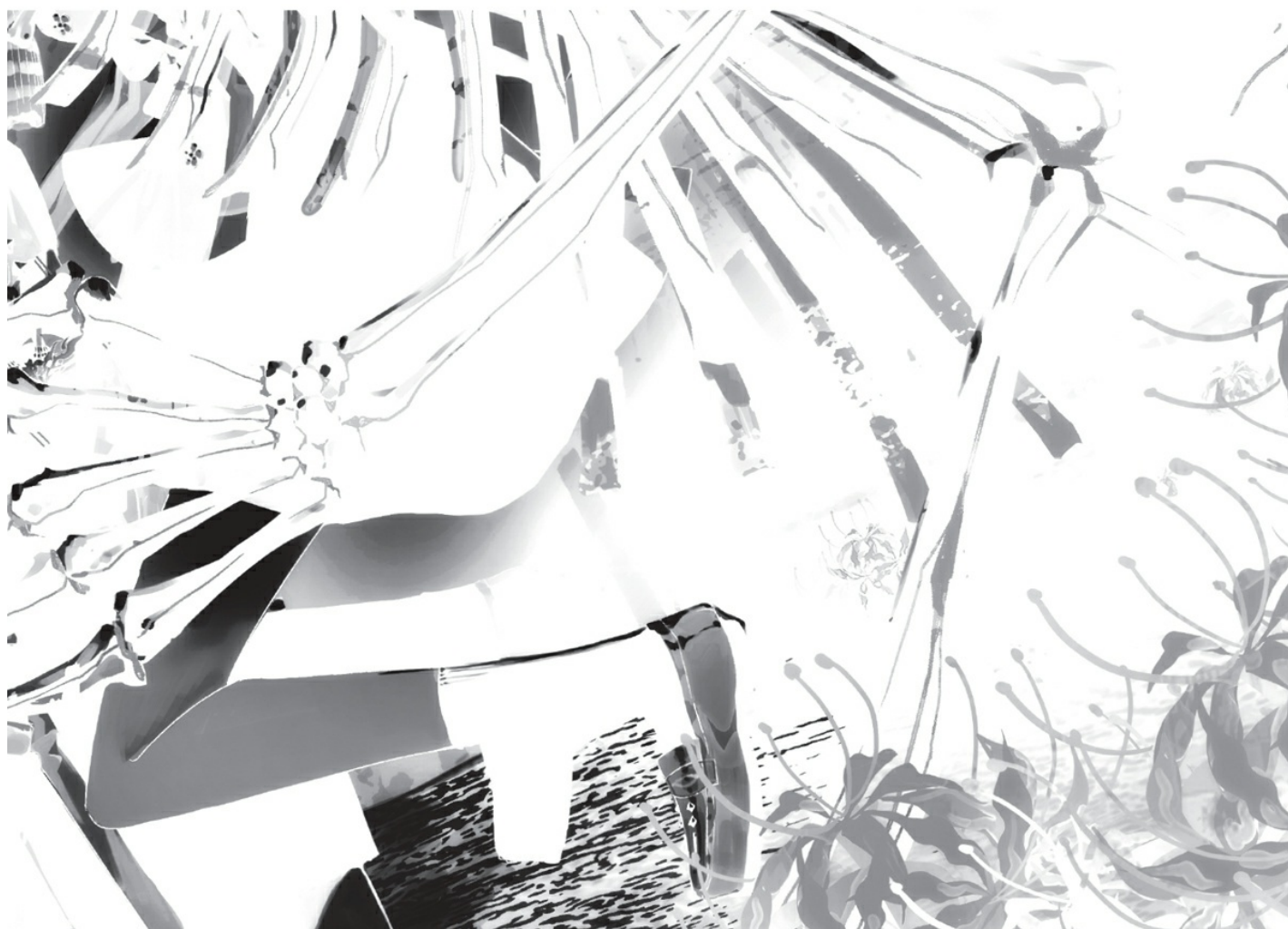
She simply continued to smile.
