

## Tamaki Shijou


Classmate of Shiren and Ryouta. She's typically calm and collected, but once she slips into a pessimistic mood, there's no coming back for a while.

Alfoncina smiled and moved to leave the rooftop. But before she left, she turned toward him one last time.


"Haah". I really wish things would get rom-com-y again, like they used to be."

# Rei Asagiri


Ryouta's big sister. Her infatuation with her younger brother drove her to follow him to the Empire. She now works as a ninja for Ouka, the emperor.





The sisters were relentless.


"Shiren, I think you and I have more in common than I originally thought."
