...! ...!

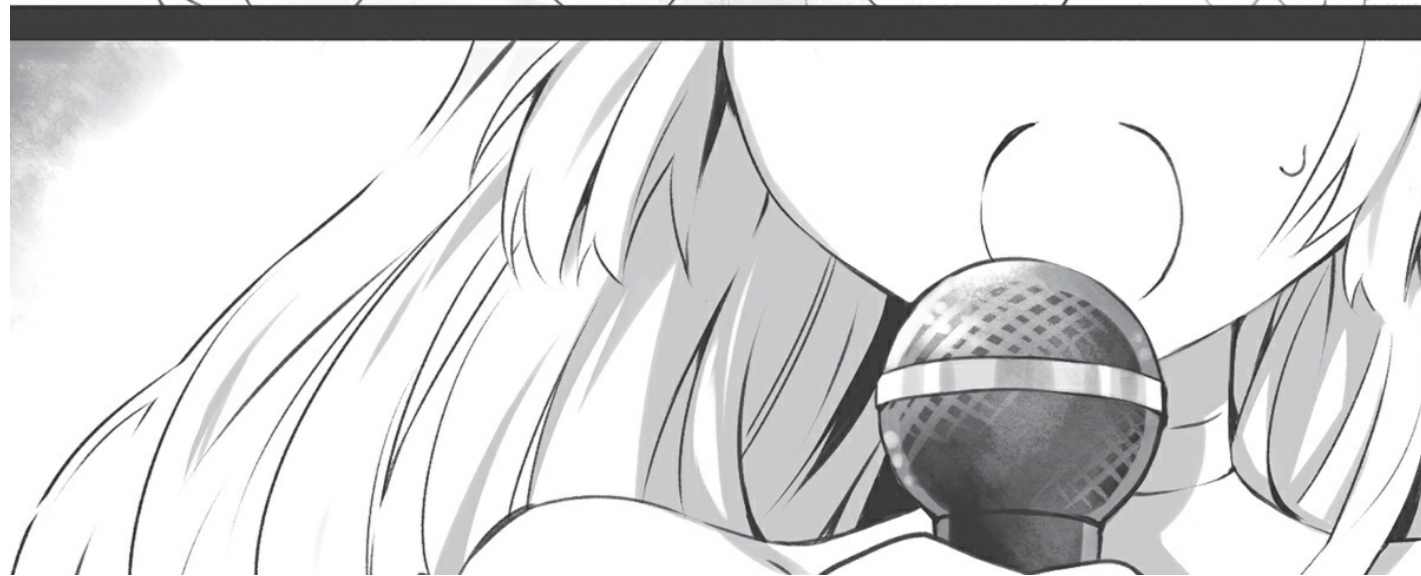
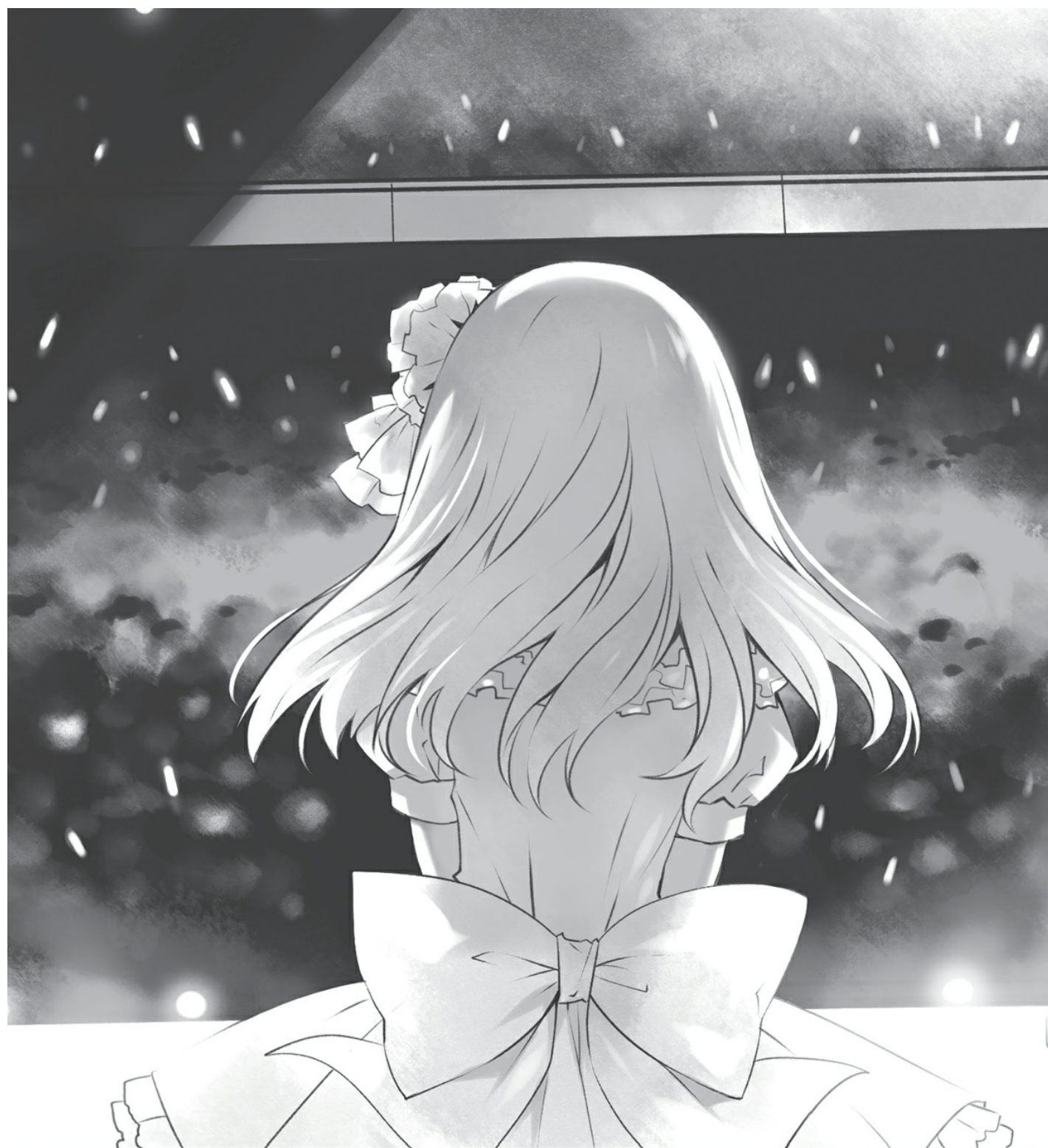
Only wheezing came out of her mouth.

But Shido didn't let that stop him. Slowly, but surely, he approached Tohka.

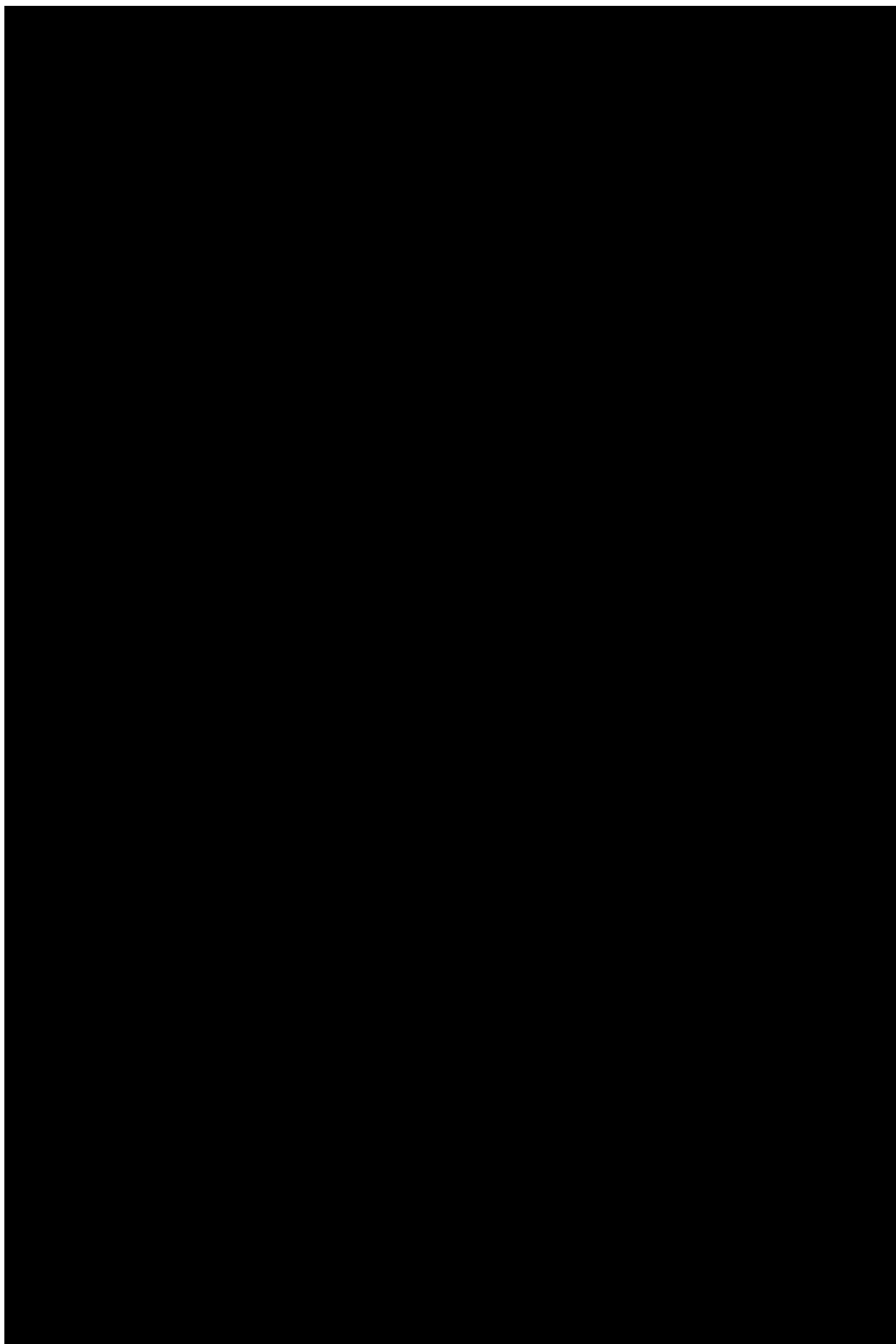
"Tohka." He called her name, and her shoulders jumped up as if she was afraid.

"...!"

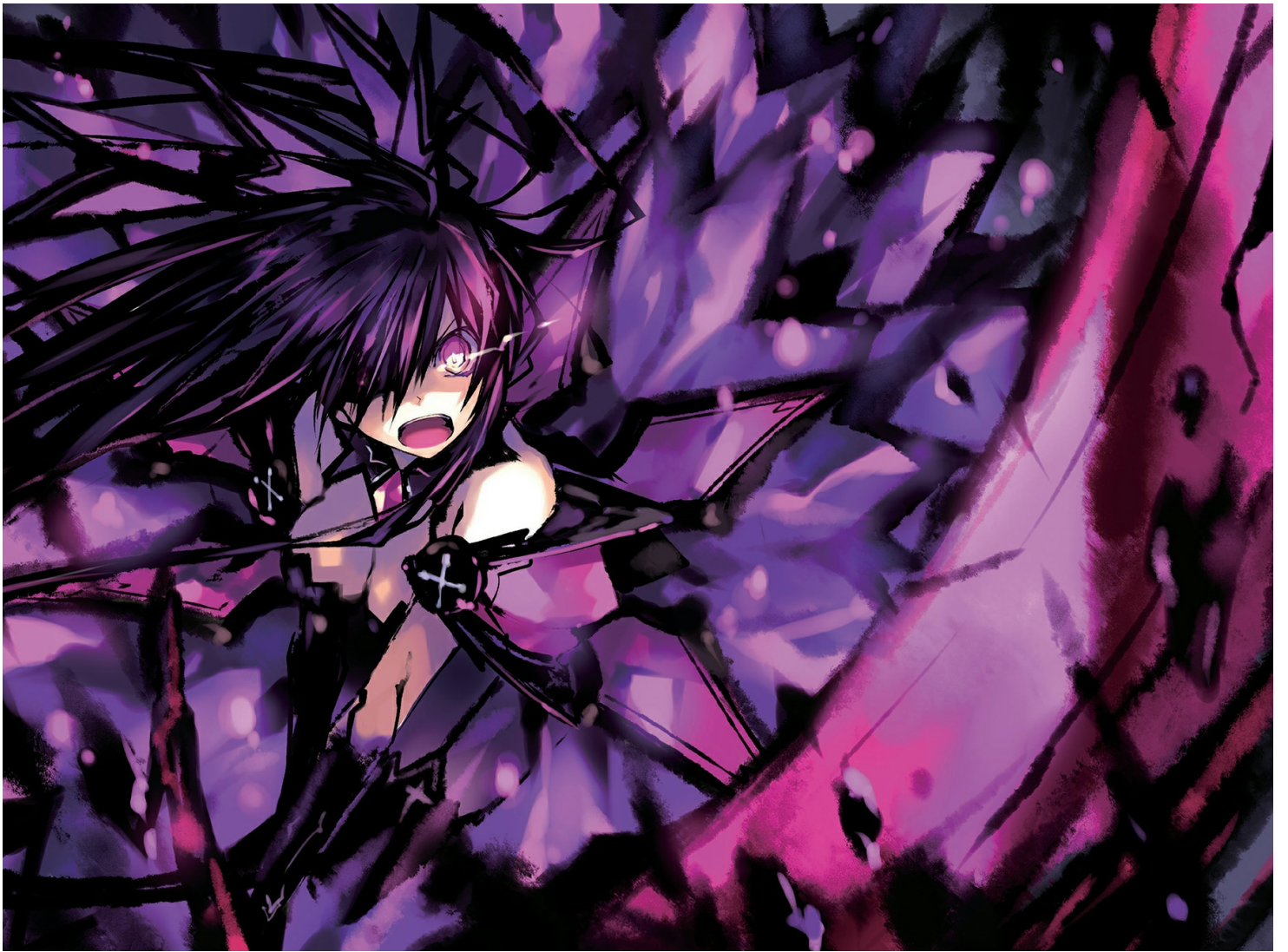
She shook her head as though pushing this away and screamed as she brought down the enormous sword.
