"Huh?"

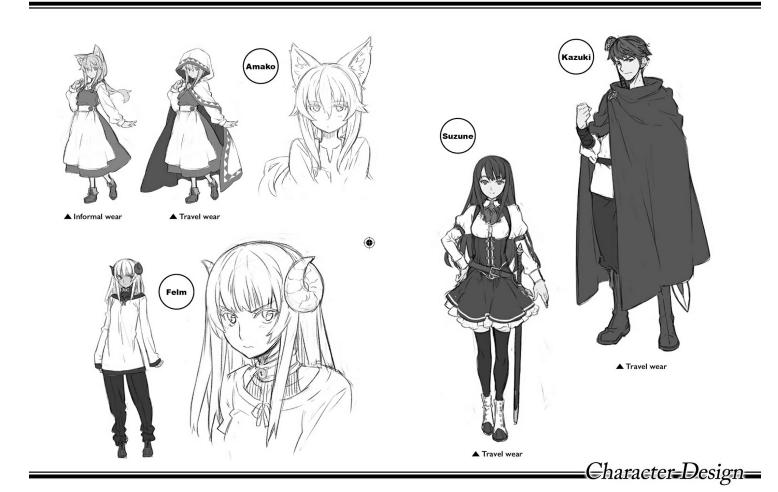
I looked down at the boy again. He looked beaten up, but when I rubbed his cheek, I realized they were right—he was dirty but unhurt.

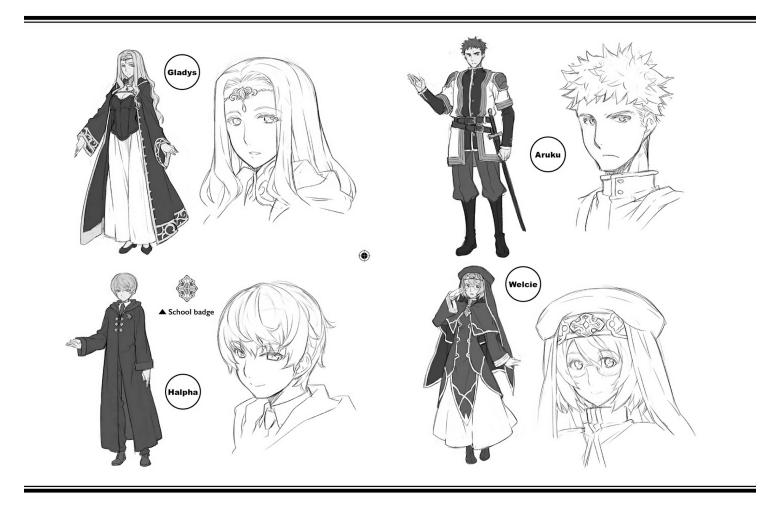
"This boy . . . He's . . . " I stuttered.
