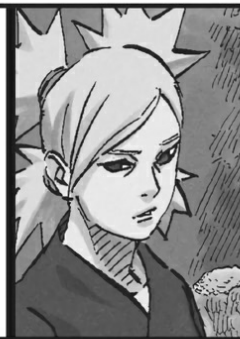

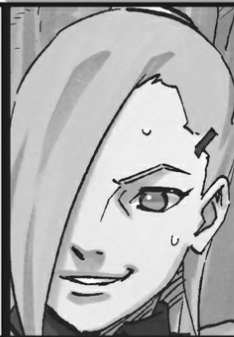
AKIMICHI CHOJI

The life Shikamaru wanted to protect was right here in front of him.


