This volume collects the third trio of a dozen-part series. The cover art was for the original Book Nine, while Books Seven and Eight's have been included as a gatefold.

Where appropriate, the transliterations provided in the footnotes add bars called "macrons" above vowels for a closer approximation of the pronunciation, including for names and words that appear without them in the main text. A syllable with "Ō" is supposed to sound more like *boat* than *bot*. A repeated consonant like "CC" should be construed in the same manner as in *Rebecca*.

The sacred status of Seiryoin¹ Gokenji Temple on Mt. Sayabashiri² in Tosa needs no introduction—every year, thousands upon thousands of swordsmen, from the east and west, make the trip across the waters to Shikoku to partake in the Katana Pilgrimage.

At the center of this holy site is the Katana Buddha.

The gigantic buddha erected by the Old Shogun, as the annals now refer to him, who prevailed over the Age of Warring States and unified the nation—and promptly launched the Great Sword Hunt, that appalling piece of legislature which made all swords under the sun government property. The hundred thousand blades seized by the law were melted down to produce the Katana Buddha, the literal embodiment of the spirits of all swordsmen.

Swordsmen crossed the nation just to catch a glimpse of it.

Ostensibly the statue had been built, in the wake of chaos, as a memorial to peace, that such horrific conflict need not ever be repeated, but today it is a well-known fact that the Old Shogun's motivations were more complicated—indeed, his motives were apparent even then.

He robbed the swordsmen of their swords.

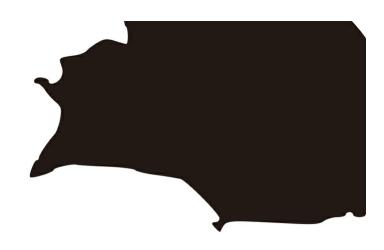

His bumbling⁸ performance—was mortifying.

–Sis must think that I'm a total hack.⁹

And the Last Fatal Orchid, Shichika Hachiretsu, unleashing the other seven at the same time—but for the record, the only foe this secret move had ever felled was the first of the saga, Komori Maniwa.

Other than that, Shichika had only tried the move out at a dojo in the Capital, to show Togame.

"I mean, I guess it didn't work against Kanara Azekura and Zokuto, with his unparalleled armor class. Still, though, it has to be one of the most useful moves in all the Kyotoryu. 'Course, it's for specific situations... Of all the moves to wind up getting in the way—"

"I'm not debating pros and cons¹⁷ here, Shichika. Why don't you show me

Ryuryoku Kako-go ahead, let's see it."

"...?"

Shichika looked plenty skeptical, but he had no good reason not to do the move. To begin, he stood up from his cushion and assumed Form Four, the Asagao.

The move required preparation.²⁰

"See it now?"

"Look, I'm not saying that the prep work, in and of itself, ruins the move—even if Ryuryoku Kako didn't work against Kanara Azekura, your execution was flawless. It's just that mixed up with all the other moves—things get messy."

Fatal Orchids one through seven.

Combined and synchronized—Shichika Hachiretsu.

But the pause inherent to Ryuryoku Kako tripped up the synchronicity. 21

The pause meant there was an opening.²²

All that Nanami had done—was take advantage of the opening in Fatal Orchid Four, Ryuryoku Kako—and use the monstrous strength of the Itezoras to heave his body up into the ceiling of the dojo.

Shichika made no attempt to hide his disappointment.

This was understandable, since he himself had devised the Fatal Orchid. Worse, if Shichika Hachiretsu was off the table, he couldn't use his catchphrase, or whatever you might call it. Right when he was finally warming up to it.

"If I cut out Ryuryoku Kako and make it just the other six—that throws the balance off entirely. I'd have to call it Mutsuka Shichiretsu,²⁵ which doesn't have the same ring²⁶ to it."

""

"Stopping halfway through the sequence is the problem—so just do Ryuryoku Kako first, before your wheels are spinning."

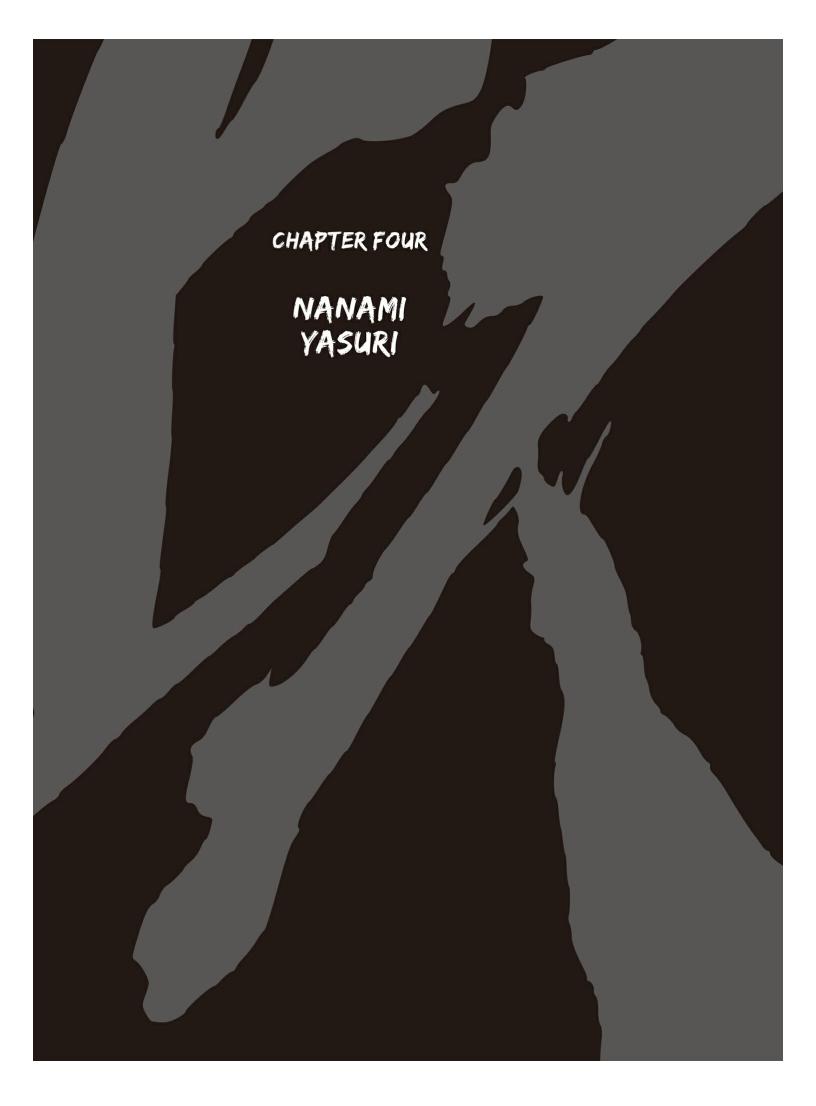

"Please, don't disappoint me. We're here because you asked me for a rematch—come on, assume your stance."

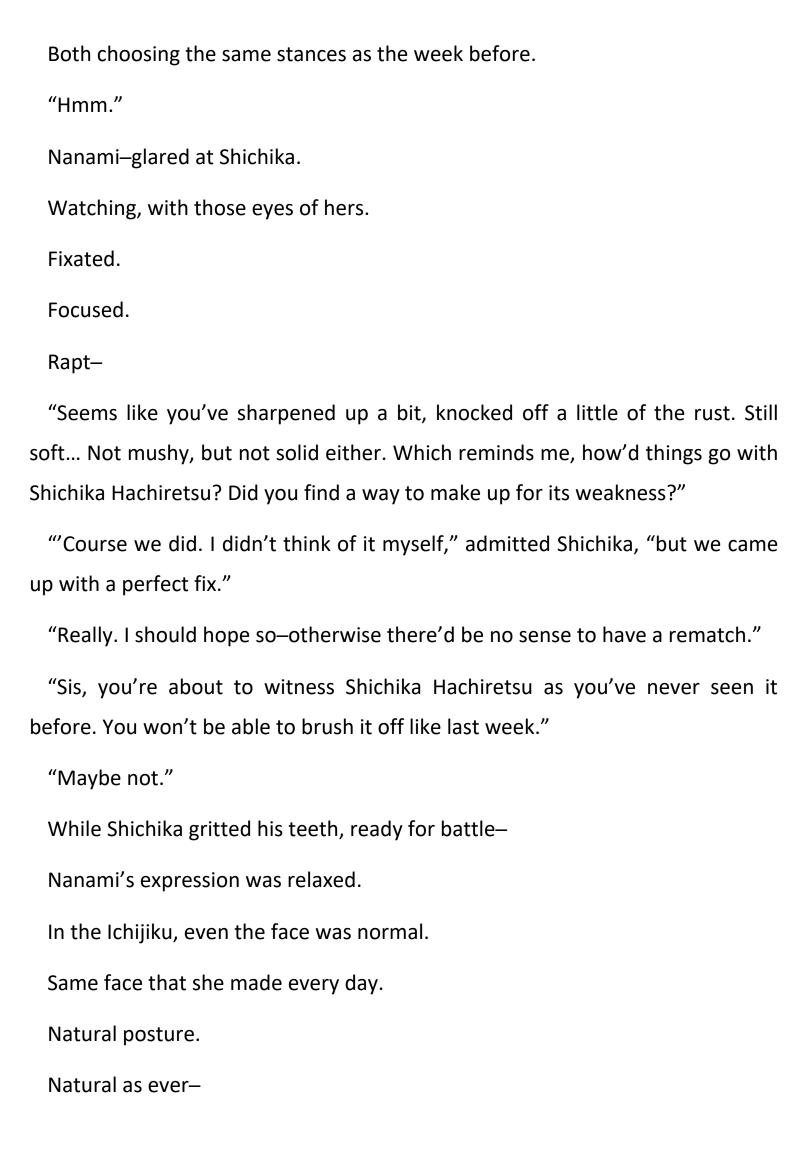
Hearing this—Shichika did as he was told.

Once you start down the path with this sort of thinking, you never stop, so it's best to never pay it any mind at all, but for the record, let me say that nothing is more upsetting than when someone shows you just how big the gap between your skill and theirs really is. This has absolutely nothing to do with them being more dedicated or diligent, more focused or gung-ho, and everything to do with them being leagues ahead of you-stronger, plain and simple. While I'm the first to be suspicious whenever anybody mentions genius, some things can only be explained as gifts (or curses?) from the gods, and bizarrely, these things seem to pop up fairly often. Most people want to think they're special, on account of which they often wind up feeling frustrated, but when you get right down to it, thinking that you're special is just a way of wishing like a madman you were special, when you know you're really not. There's nothing special about being special, if you are, which probably makes the really special people overlook what makes them that way, focusing instead on whatever seems special in their eyes, which sends them down the same slippery slope as normal folks. This is the sort of thing that's funny if you have an audience, but unfortunately, in the real world, we perform for no one but ourselves. I'm not saying genius is a casualty-I'm just saying that while things could always be worse than they are, there's a cap on how good things can get. Know what I'm saying? Since people are never happy with the status quo, some special people probably wind up wondering what good being special ever did for them. But if you go down that rabbit hole, soon you'll be saying that you're special just the way you are, so who needs talent anyway, let other people have it, sounding like a person who

has given up for good, and you know what? Maybe it takes a normal person to appreciate the workings of a beautiful mind. Otherwise, how could we ever stand in awe of anything?

That's all for Book Seven of *Sword Tale*. Now that we've plunged into the second half of the twelve books, things are heating up, for better or for worse, but the crux of the story was the showdown between Shichika and Nanami Yasuri, brother and sister. I set the scene in Tosa, in Shikoku, a part of Japan close to my heart. I hate to say goodbye, and can't help feeling that I haven't fully captured the atmosphere of Shikoku, but I think that my depiction of the family showdown speaks to the power of the place. I hope that you'll agree.

The ending of Togame the Schemer's hunt for all the Mutant Blades of Legendary Swordsmith Kiki Shikizaki is finally in sight. At first, I had no clue where this series was going to take me, but at this point in the writing I can safely say I'm having more fun than anyone else. I only hope I can keep producing good fodder for our illustrator *take*. That's all, folks, for *Katanagatari Book Seven: Akuto the Eel*.

And the victor-

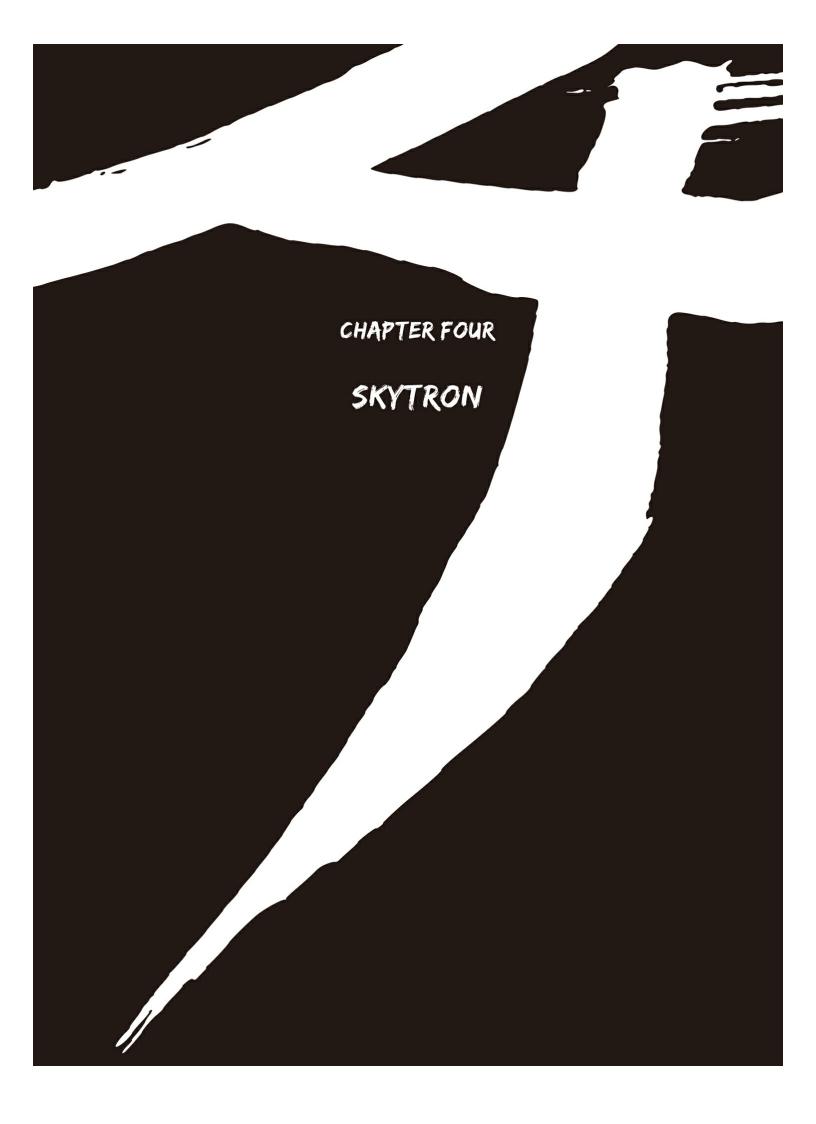

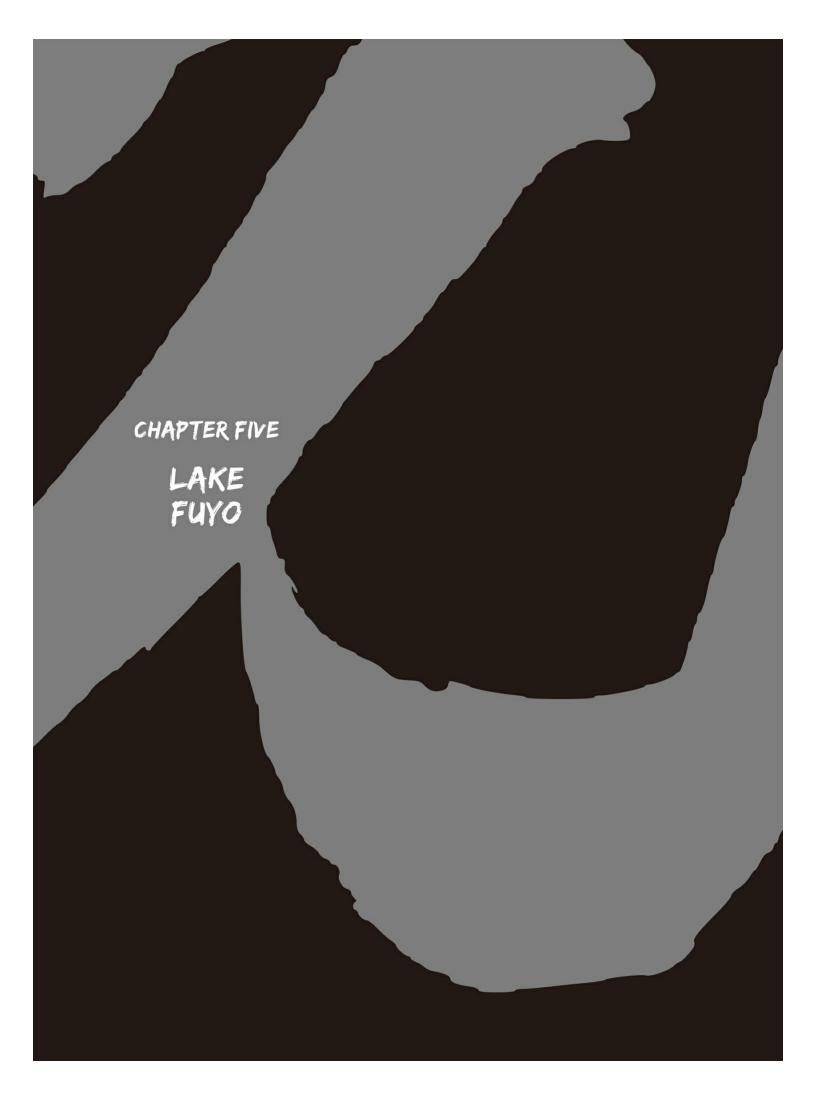

Time to review the victory conditions.

All five of these battles, without exception, had a referee.

Who gave the signal to begin—Fight!

These were formal duels in their own way, and fitting for an age of peace and

order (although in most cases the referee was Togame, Shichika's boss, which gave him what may be called a gross advantage)—but this time would be different.

As a robot, Skytron had no will.

The fight would not have no formal start or end.

If anything—the battle would begin the second Shichika entered Skytron's range of fire.

Shichika leapt at Skytron from Form Seven, the Kakitsubata—and into the Kyotoryu's front kick, the Bara.

The advantage of having four arms.

Each could focus on a smaller range—allowing for increased efficiency.

Of course, the same went for its legs.

In fact, its extra legs provided an even greater advantage than the arms—using one leg for defense, it kept the other three rooted in the earth.

No one could ever be that stable.

"Kyotoryu Combo–from Zakuro to Ayame!"⁴

As soon as he landed, Shichika planted his feet and launched into a rapidfire display of hand techniques—after trying linked attacks like this against his sister at Gokenji Temple, the moves flowed with smooth precision.

Skytron blocked with ease, until the Ayame—at which point Shichika finally discerned an opening among the arms.

A space through which—he may have hit its torso.

"...Hup!"

Nevertheless—he gritted his teeth and *reeled in* the Ayame. This sent him staggering, whereupon he came dangerously close to falling on his face—but somehow Shichika regained his footing.

Easy now-easy now.

He took a deep breath, filling his lungs.

Prior to his fight with Skytron.

Togame the Schemer had given Shichika a couple of precautions.

Above all—he was to only use strike moves.

Shichika could get behind this. He'd said so himself—there was no way he could use a throw move on a four-armed, four-legged robot, and grappling moves would fare even worse. If he got Skytron in a deadlock,⁵ he was going to be the dead one.

This is not to say, however, that strike moves would get the job done. As indicated moments earlier, Skytron blocked every strike, rebuffing Shichika so consistently it made his own head spin.⁶ In his fight against Kanara Azekura, he had confronted the unparalleled armor class of Zokuto the Armor, but its defensive properties were just a matter of materials—

"Interesting."

At a safe distance away, well out of Skytron's range of fire.

Togame the Schemer muttered to herself-watching Shichika fight.

"I'd say that's a good sign—after all, we must not harm the swords. Let Skytron do its thing and protect itself on its own—"

Togame had given Shichika one more precaution.

So long as he stuck to the strike moves, he could wallop Skytron to his heart's content.

Except-he must not hit its head or torso.

Meaning—he had to let Skytron block every single move he made.

Using its four arms-and four legs!

"Hmm."

Shichika brought his furious⁷ attack to a halt and moved away from Skytron.

Yeah-not a bad idea.

They were on the right track.

"Togame sure knows how to think—though I can't harm the katana, she comes up with the idea of *forcing Skytron to defend itself*... That allows me to attack it without pulling all my punches—she has some devilish ideas, taking advantage of a doll that can't think for itself."

A human being who injures an arm or leg cannot simply sub out *the damaged* part for a replacement arm or leg—but a robot can.

Its arms and legs-were fair game.

They were replaceable.

They were removable.

Which made the situation-salvageable.

The Sword Hunt for the Twelve Possessed of Kiki Shikizaki-staying on track!

"Still, though—my feints not working is such a pain. At this point, it's second nature. 9 Even though I know it isn't helping, they come out of me at those moments."

Because the goal was to have Skytron block his attacks.

"COUNTERSTRIKE NOW"

Suddenly.

Skytron strayed from its strict pattern of defense—and made a run on Shichika.

This time it leaned back, raising its front legs together for a dropkick—although since dropkicks involve jumping, and Skytron's robotic mechanisms meant it didn't have to jump, the term sounds contradictory—

Shichika leapt into the air to dodge this jump-free dropkick.

Just then.

"ROBOSLAY-BLUSTER" 12

As it pronounced these words—a pointy¹³ sword shot like a tongue out of the same mouth.

"Wh-Whoaaa!"

Using Skytron's legs for a springboard, Shichika shifted position in midair and got away. His hands touched down first, followed acrobatically by his feet.

The sword slipped back inside of Skytron's body–much to Shichika's amazement. He had never dreamt of such a trick.

For although the Kyotoryu lacked forms for handling a four-armed, four-legged adversary, to Skytron, having four arms and four legs was only natural, its very form. What could be more annoying?

While far less difficult, and not really a fair comparison, to use a simple metaphor, it was sort of like a right-handed person fighting a left-handed person. Quite disorienting.

The gap between the known and the unknown-

And since Skytron was a robot, the difference exceeded that gap.

Yet.

Togame the Schemer had turned this all around.

Thought of a way to turn it all around.

For a fighter¹⁵ such as Shichika to dispose of feinting altogether was frustrating indeed—but on the flipside, they knew that Skytron would never feint at them.

Robots don't try to make you jump or catch you by surprise.

Of course, things were not necessarily so simple, since Skytron was capable of some complex moves—but even these were simply $commands^{16}$ built into it.

"ROBOSLAY-SANDSTORM"

"Kyotoryu-Noichigo!"<sup>19</sup>

"ROBOSLAY-TYPHOON"

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Yes.

After making some adjustments to the rules—they were finally square.

There was nothing they could do to make them squarer—since while Skytron had no handicaps, Shichika had an enormous one, having been forbidden to strike the robot on the head or torso *under any circumstances*.

If it seemed a strike might land outside of the appendages, he must do everything within his power to abort.

As long as they continued this way for a while, no matter how much Shichika anticipated its *form*, one of the robot's moves would get past him.

In which case, it was almost like a slow-paced suicide—as square as it may seem, Shichika was basically being tortured to death.

To when his father–Mutsue Yasuri, was still among the living.

Before he had taken on the title Seventh Master.

Back when all he did was train, day in day out, a sword on a desert island-

"Remember, Shichika."

Trained by the Sixth Master of the Kyotoryu–Mutsue Yasuri.

"I am-a katana."

He was always saying that.

"Just as you-are a katana."

Shichika, who looked up to²¹ his father–listened quietly.

For nineteen years.

He had heard Mutsue say these words.

"If a sword cannot kill, it has no point—consider that the fundamental truth.²² Everything else is trivial. Take my word for it—as a sword, you're only good as long as you stay sharp."

Now he understood.

What his father had meant was-Don't feel.

It meant-Don't think.

Don't think-and don't feel.

A katana has nothing like a will to speak of.

Perhaps Mutsue was unable to train Shichika to his satisfaction—leaving this world before he had a chance to convey fully what it was to be the Kyotoryu.

Evading²⁶ the attack–Shichika realized.

Wow.

This was me—I used to be like this.

Does that mean—what on earth have I done?

Komori Maniwa. Ginkaku Uneri. Meisai Tsuruga. Hakuhei Sabi.

All four of them fought me when I was like this.

It must have been no fun at all to fight me when I was acting like a robot-but hold on.

When Skytron first sensed Shichika, it voiced the words "HUMAN DETECTED" – *Ah.*

When I see you all I see is another sword.

But you'd call me human?

"Kyotoryu-Kyoka Suigetsu!"

Shichika unleashed the fastest of the Fatal Orchids, though not full force—and when Skytron blocked this too, he jumped away, toward safety.

He was short on breath already-practically hyperventilating.²⁷

Drenched in sweat.

Of course he was. He had been fighting Skytron now for almost fifteen minutes straight—back and forth,²⁸ jumping from one move to the next without a break.

Endlessly energetic as Shichika may be, it's not like he never felt fatigue.

Skytron, on the other hand, neither breathed heavily nor sweat.

Using its legs as rotators,³² Skytron gained air supremacy³³ over the battlefield. Just as with Rakka Rozeki, one of the Fatal Orchids of the Kyotoryu, attacks like this from overhead are brutally effective—

This would explain it casting off the four swords.

Those spinning wings could serve as blades and slice a foe in two.

Skytron had pulled out all the stops.³⁴

As commanded centuries before.

To put a full stop on this run-on sentence³⁵ of a battle–

"Hey! Hey! You serious?" asked Shichika, face pale.

Looking up into the sky-up toward the floating mechanical doll.

"But I thought—your fundamental stance was that the Maniwa posed no threat?"

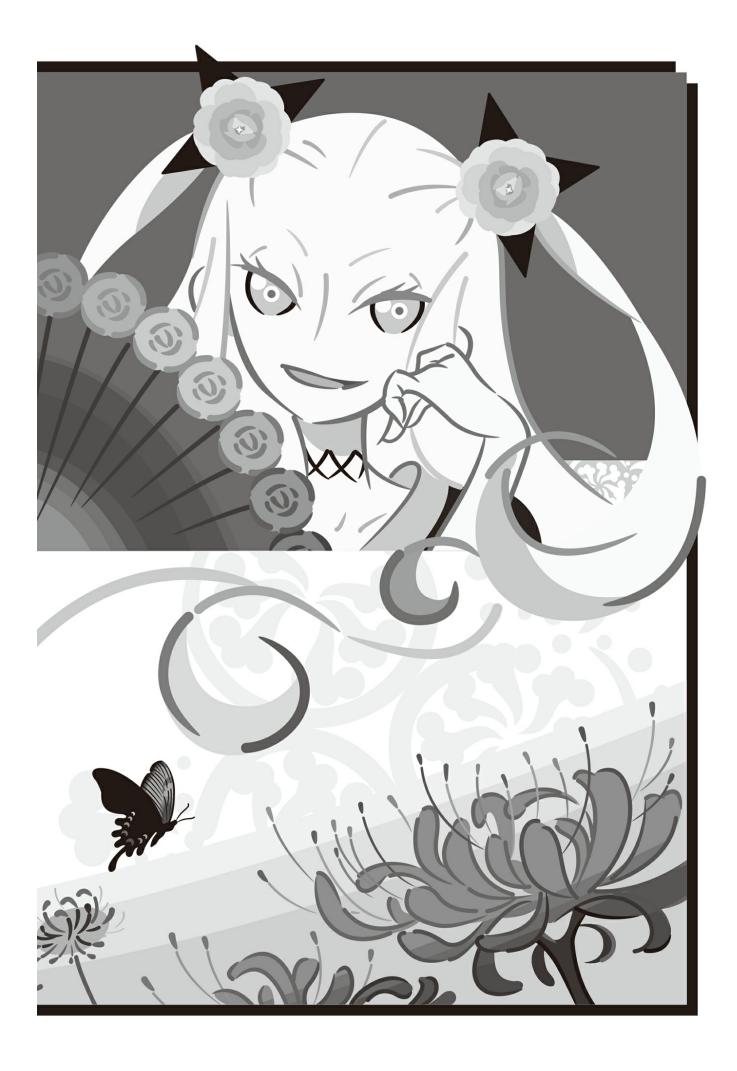

As goes without saying, the conclusion of this one-hundred-and-seventy-yearold feud—would engender very negative developments.

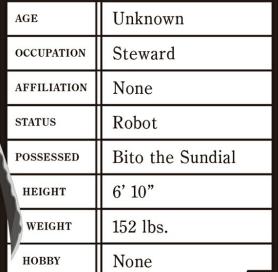

I'm not sure how to put this into words, since it's a little hard to grasp, so I'll just say what's on my mind, no matter how it sounds, but sometimes a command ceases to be relevant. Whether this happens to you personally or you see it happening from the sidelines makes no difference, it's a bummer. To give you an example, let's consider prerecording things off of the television. Say you set your recorder to tape the same TV show every week and walk away; even after the show has made it to the final episode and through its grand finale, the following week your recorder will diligently start taping a completely unrelated show in the same time slot. Thanks but no thanks, right, nice as it was to go ahead and tape the thing. Or how about when a baseball game goes into extra innings, and your show gets bumped up thirty minutes, but the recording starts at the designated time and cuts before the episode reaches its climax? Thanks but no thanks, it's great to have the episode, but not so much when you were hoping for the whole thing. I'm aware that this comparison to taping television dramas may strike some as idyllic, but this question of commands ceasing to be relevant runs quite deep: I'm not exaggerating when I say it influences every aspect of our world. Thanks to misunderstandings like these, no small number of people have been killed in countless wars. While the central powers may have come to an agreement, somehow word fails to travel fast enough, and the results are tragic. It's really sad. Along these lines, it's easy to say, "As cool as machines are, it's way cooler when people make their own decisions," but that view is overly simplistic. It's not uncommon for people to think they're deciding on their own, when in fact they're following some directive burnt into their memory. I guess we call it instinct? I'm not saying we should fight our instincts, though, since probably we couldn't if we tried. Our only option is to do the best we can, to the extent that we can, which is probably the closest thing we have to an expression of our freedom.

Thus ends Book Eight of *Sword Tale*. Since there are twelve books in total, we are now transitioning from the middle stages to the final stages of the story. I tried to make this Edo episode a little different from the ones before it. To be honest, when I wrote Book One, I didn't really think that I would make it this far, but here we go—and I intend to keep it up to the end. We're on the homestretch, but I only made it this far, and with enough energy to finish, thanks to the one and only *take*'s powerful illustrations. It makes me want to make full use of my time for each of the remaining swords.

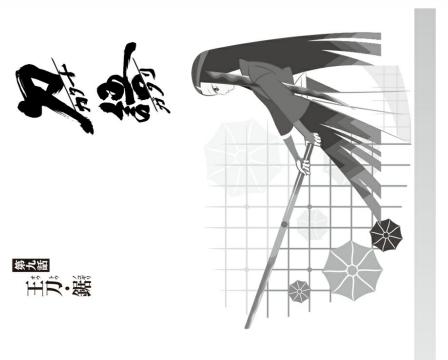

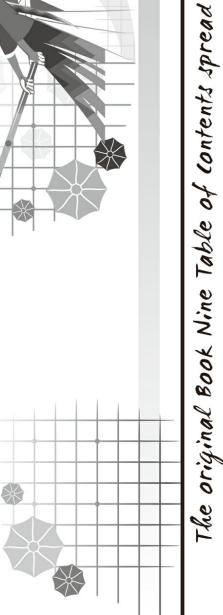

Or so was the opinion of the members of the bakufu, and too the modest country folk who had no interest in the wars with which the reigning elite⁵ amused themselves—but on the side of the Rebellion, especially those close to Takahito Hida, the result was far from peaceful.

The clashes between the twenty-five states of the period were all biased by the number of Mutant Blades.

The Great Unifier¹⁴–known today as the Old Shogun, came out of the war with five hundred and seven Mutant Blades.

His appetite for these swords was insatiable.

With that many, it would have been stranger had he failed to rule the land-perhaps.

From his base in Tosa, in Shikoku—he ruled over the nation.

Although by now, his heart had already been poisoned.

By the venom of the Shikizaki blades.

Although the land had been returned to order, he showed no sign of

stopping—nay, he was unable to stop. Now that he possessed just over half the Mutant Blades, he absolutely had to have them all.

No room for scrupulosity.

And this unselfconscious lust for swords bore fruit. 16

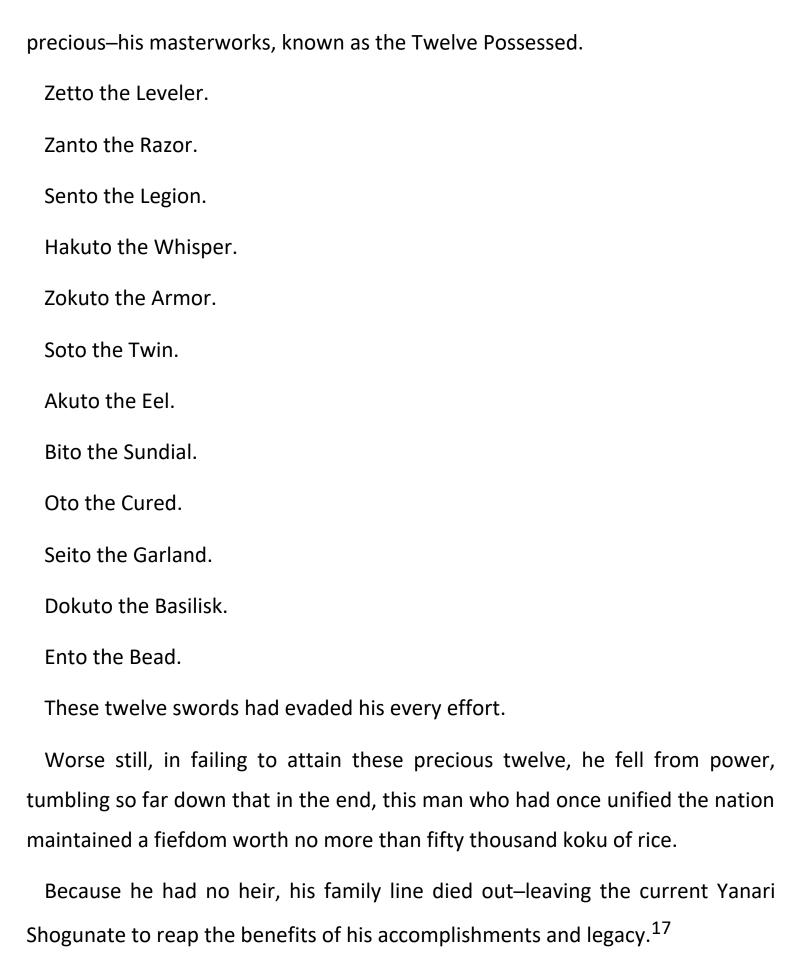
From across Japan, four hundred and eighty-one more swords were brought to him—for a total of nine hundred and eighty-eight.

Thereafter, in Satsuma, they forced Kanara Azekura, Captain of the Armored Pirates, to surrender Zokuto the Armor, a sword unparalleled in armor class.

Whereupon, in Ezo, they accepted Soto the Twin, the heaviest sword in existence, from Konayuki Itezora, the sole survivor of the Itezora Clan.

In the ninth moon.

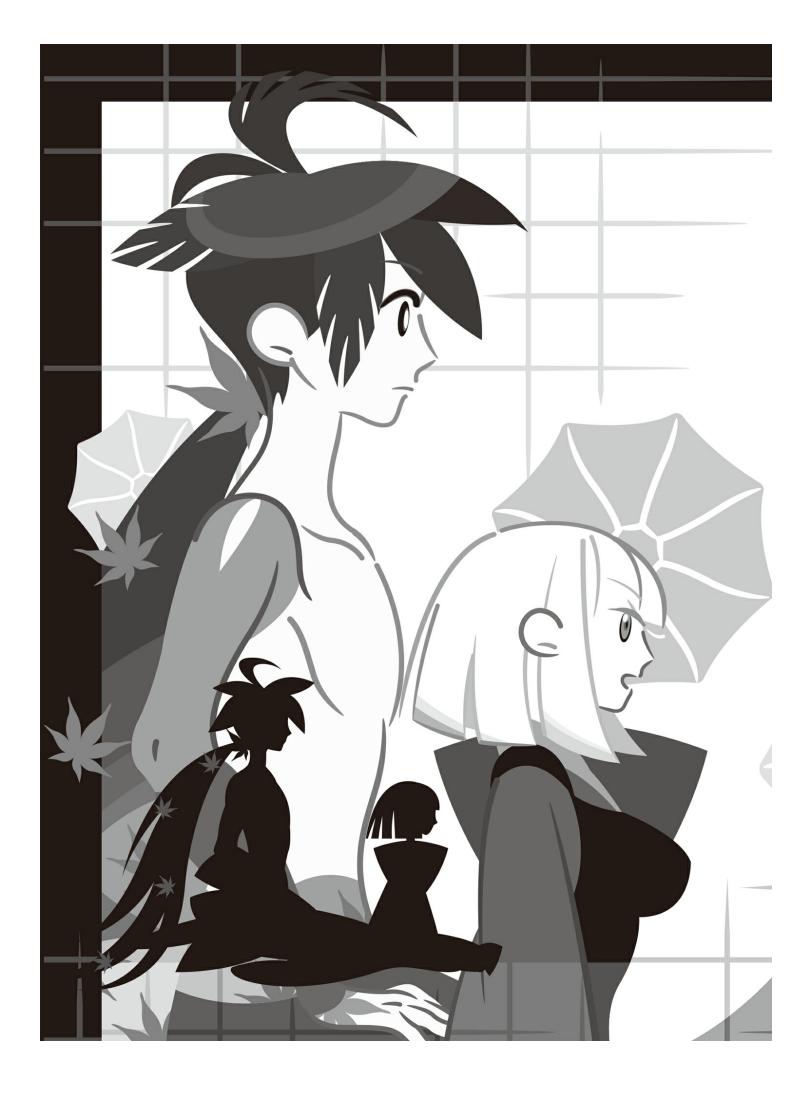
Where the tale began, they got an answer from Zanki Kiguchi.

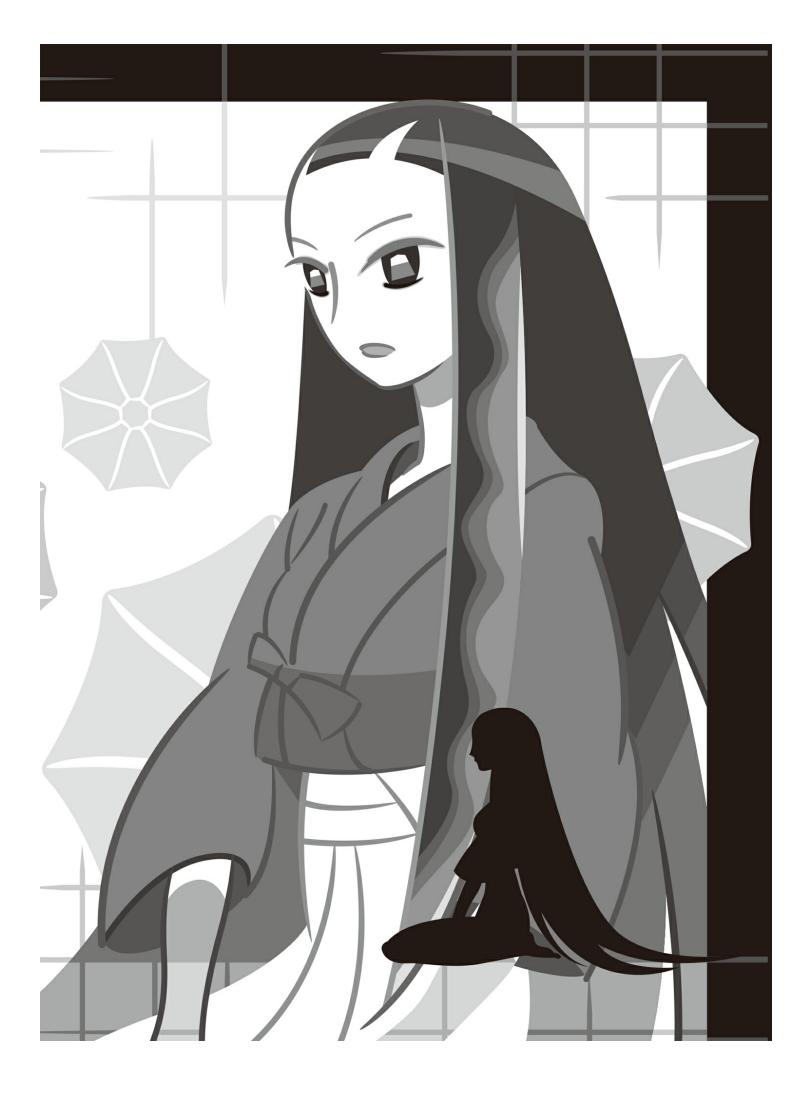
"As Master of the Heartland School—I regret to inform you that I will not relinquish Oto the Cured for any reason."

If Ganryu Island in Suo, where once upon a time a man bearing a greatsword fought another bearing two, and Seiryoin Gokenji Temple on Mt. Sayabashiri in Tosa, encompassing the Katana Buddha, are the Two Great Holy Sites for swordsmen, then Shogi Village in Tendo, in Dewa, is the holy land of shogi players.

Shogi¹ has its origins in India.

By the Heian period, the game had made it to Japan.

In the era of our story, where the Owari Bakufu has unified the land, ushering in an age of peace and order, during which no large-scale wars broke out besides the late rebellion, tacticians used the shogi board as a mock battlefield, competing over games to gauge each other's fitness in the art of war—in other words, at this point in Japanese history, shogi was much more than a parlor game.

Although Togame the Schemer dealt exclusively in schemes, by definition she was certainly a tactician, and knew her way around the shogi board—which is why, thus far in her career, she had visited Shogi Village in Tendo on multiple occasions.

Which is why.

She had long known there was a dojo there for swordplay-and about the

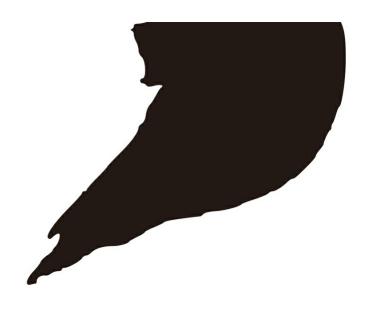

The outcome was deplorable.¹

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That would be a disgrace 12 to the Heartland School!"

"If you're adamant about not needing a weapon or protection, I'll have to ask you to leave—I have no interest in taking gross advantage of a helpless individual!"

Totally lost, Shichika shot a glance to Togame, who was still sitting by the

shogi board-but the Schemer was as baffled as him by this turn of events.

Though Shichika had no weapons.

He was a lethal weapon in his own right.

"Sh-Shichika."

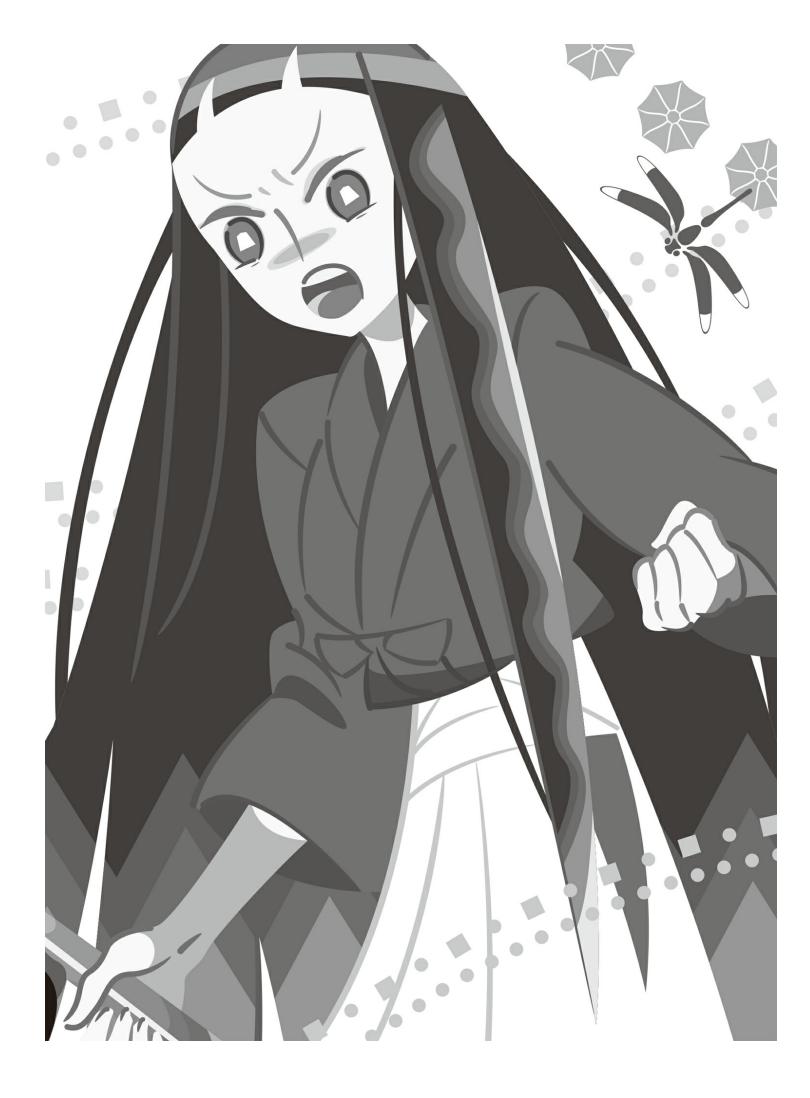
"Y-Yeah."

The outcome was deplorable.

Thus far on the Sword Hunt for the Twelve Possessed of Kiki Shikizaki, Shichika Yasuri had elsewhere been defeated twice—first, on Mt. Odori in Ezo, in his initial bout with Konayuki Itezora, and again at Gokenji Temple in Tosa, versus Nanami Yasuri. As Shichika preferred to fight stripped to the waist and barefoot, they were an encumbrance, and one that he would sooner do without.

Thus armed and padded, Shichika was literally unable to bare his blade-but

there was yet another reason for despair.

There would be rules.

The fight between Kiguchi and Shichika was bound²¹ by many rules.

The rules of kendo.

All of his previous fights had essentially been free-for-alls—even the more formal duels were only regulated nominally, starting on the signal "Fight!" and ending on the word "Match!"

"And I want to make it right," 38 Kiguchi said.

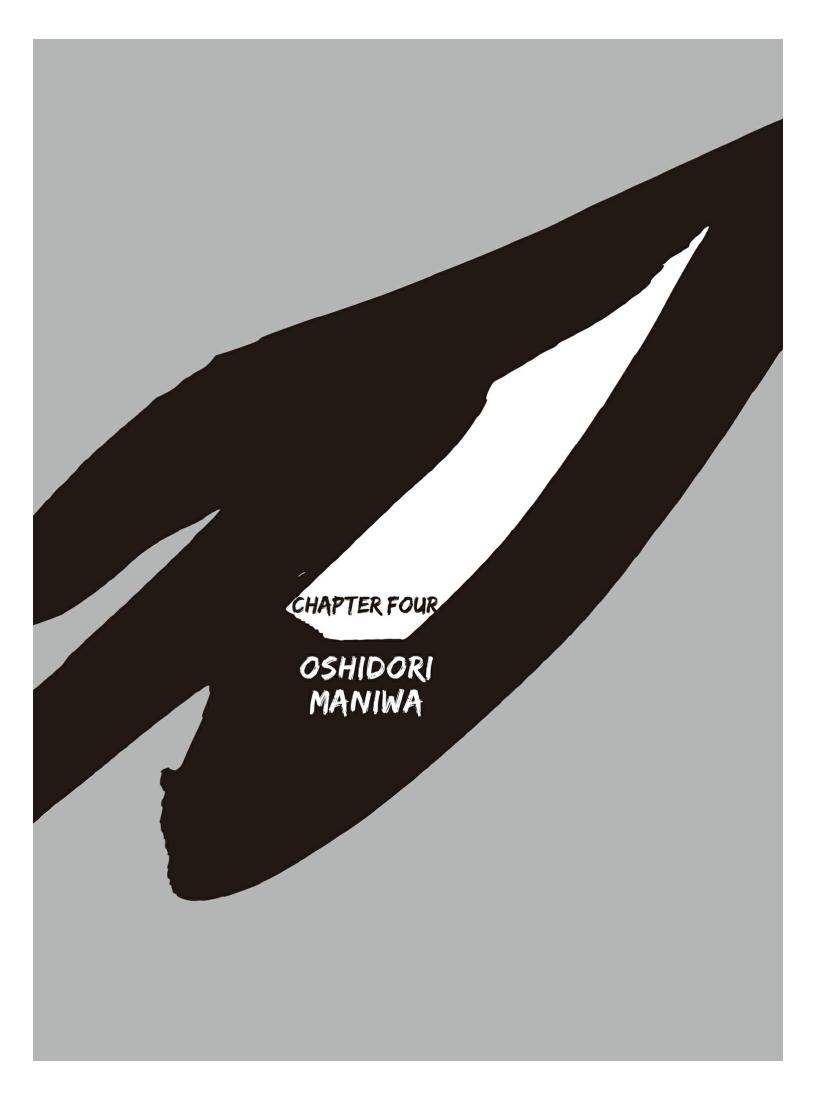
This was a declaration.

And while he let on¹¹ like his brethren treated him like their effective head because he had more common sense than all the other crackpots in the clan—that wasn't it.

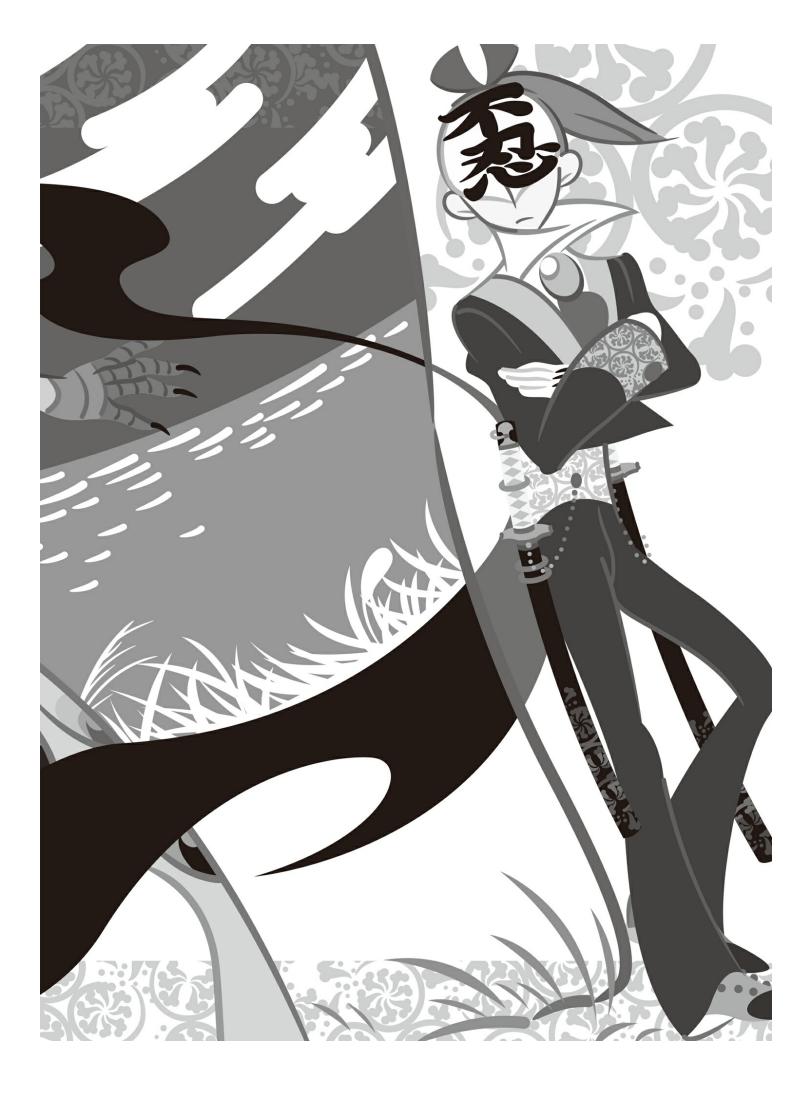
Oshidori knew that wasn't it at all.

"Sound pretty confident," Emonzaemon took this in stride. "If you'll permit me to say so, I'm disappointed you're the one I'm forced to fight—since after all, I have been sent here to assassinate Hohoh Maniwa."

"Assassinate Hohoh?" Oshidori raised her eyebrows. "Who the hell are you?"

"No reply—why should I divulge that information?"

"You could at least introduce yourself."

"Emonzaemon Soda."

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"Ay-mon-za-ay-mon?"
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Has to be a joke, thought Oshidori, raising her eyebrows even higher-

"To begin with, Sir Hohoh didn't even flinch when you showed up."

"True. But remember—I am wearing a mask."

NON-NINJA.

Scrawled on the mask covering his face.

"Besides, Hohoh may have forgotten me by now."

"Sounds like you're not even acquaintances."

"Perhaps."

Smoothly-Emonzaemon slipped into his next move.

Being a ninja, Oshidori could sense her adversary all too keenly, without even

Shichika tried to insinuate as much (although examining things objectively, what came out of his mouth was fairly direct after all, tactless as he was).

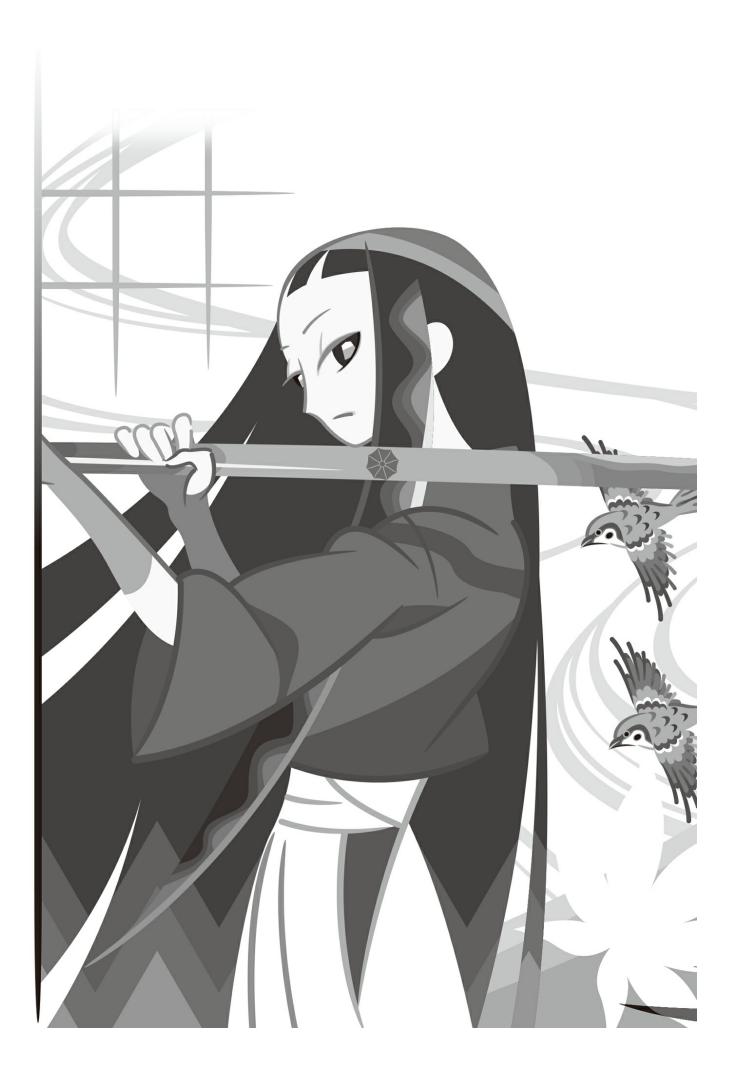

Shichika Yasuri, Seventh Master of the Kyotoryu versus Konayuki Itezora, sole surviving member of the Itezora Clan.

The main reason why Konayuki had beaten Shichika in their first fight was the huge *disparity* between their skillsets—Konayuki knew nothing of the ways of battle, lacking any real experience or training in the art of war, since she was just a little girl, but that turned out to be precisely why she won.

And due to this enormous disparity in skill-

Shichika lost miserably.

"Take a cue from Konayuki—this time, you're going to beat Zanki Kiguchi, master of the wooden sword, because you're the amateur."

From the look on her face, it was like nothing ever happened.

"Do you remember anything about it now?" she asked.

Then finally spoke.

"I forgot all of it."

The next day.

Albeit after a few twists and turns—things were proceeding according to the plan set forth by Togame the Schemer. Their greatest obstacle was Kiguchi's insistence that Shichika was not yet ready to face off against her—which was the honest truth, since he had made essentially no progress in the course of their ten days of training...but Togame talked her into it.

"Declining to face off against an adversary, citing a perceived difference in ability, is quite the show of arrogance, Madame Kiguchi–nothing is so absolute in swordplay. Any gap in skill is neutralized, once both parties have raised their swords."

This was sophistry.

If Togame really believed this rubbish, she should have spoken up eleven days ago; nevertheless, her sophistry was enough to persuade Kiguchi.

She was preying on her seriousness, her oh-so-serious nature.

Further still, Togame had successfully convinced Kiguchi to partake in the shogi showdown, which reaffirmed Shichika's faith in her powers of diplomacy. She'd gone in saying that negotiating with a person like Kiguchi was impossible—but things worked out in her favor.

Perhaps Togame had deliberately gone for the narrow chance.

"I had been hoping we would have a chance to play another round."

Or perhaps she had a hunch—that Kiguchi would take the bait.

All disputes were settled over shogi.

This was a fact of life in the village where Kiguchi came of age, and becoming Master of the Heartland School had no effect on her affection for the game.

Turning things around, this made Shichika feel as if Kiguchi had little interest in their rematch—but if that was how it was, he had to grin and bear it.¹

Kiguchi had but one condition—once this was all over, she asked to abandon any further efforts to obtain Oto the Cured.

There would be no next time.

She made it clear that this would be their final try.

Coming from a person like Kiguchi, a declaration of this sort was not open to interpretation.² To Shichika, whose assigned strategy was riding on a fluke, giving him at best only a fifty-fifty chance of winning, the statement was unsettling.

"Affirmative.3 Let's play."

Thus.

Togame accepted her condition.

Whereupon—they played nine games of shogi.

Togame was unstoppable.⁴

That said, she stopped short of an overwhelming victory, instead beating Kiguchi five to four, the very score she had foretold⁵ to Shichika.

Togame had performed as follows-1: win, 2: win, 3: loss, 4: loss, 5: win, 6:

loss, 7: win, 8: win, 9: loss.

Shichika was simply amazed at her ability to lose on purpose, even if it was for her scheme—but what's more, in terms of how things actually played out, her five wins and four losses were all outstanding. Her winning games, as in her victory eleven days earlier, were neck and neck until the very end, and when she lost, she drew the game out for as long as possible.

Shichika did not understand the rules of shogi.

This made it hard for him to guess how Kiguchi felt about the results—if she had caught on to the fact that Togame had taken pains to win one way and lose another to manipulate the final score, then she'd decided not to bring it up.

Perhaps she thought choosing how to win was the prerogative of whoever was stronger.

-As with swordplay.

Either way.

The stage was set as Togame had intended, with one chance at a one-point match.

"Are you ready, Master Shichika?"

Dressed in her pads—wielding her sword of wood, and standing at the starting line, Twelfth Master Zanki Kiguchi checked in with Shichika Yasuri, similarly dressed in pads, wielding a wooden sword, and standing at the starting line.

Though he was not exactly ready for action.

If anything, the opposite.

All the same.

"Ready," Shichika answered. "Let me just say first, though-thanks for

everything, over the past ten days. I may have been an awful student who didn't come away with anything of use, but the opportunity meant a lot⁶ to me."

"No, you taught me more than I could ever have taught you—I'm afraid this only proves I am unqualified to be a teacher. I owe you an apology for being so incompetent."

"Hold off on the apologies. If I beat you in this match, that proves you did things right after all, know what I mean?"

"I suppose so... Um, Master Shichika, you're holding your sword incorrectly."

"What? Oh, okay."

He fixed his grip.

In forgetting all he knew of kendo, he had gone too far.

Indeed.

Although his victory depended on him being an amateur, there were a number of basic things he would do well to keep in mind—and Togame had drilled them into him afresh the night before.

Specifically, what was off-limits.⁷

It would not do for him to be disqualified.

Kicking was prohibited.

As were throws and grappling moves.

Obviously, he had to hold onto his wooden sword.

No attacks to the lower body—and so on.

That said, because the referee was none other than Togame, she could

probably overlook all but the most flagrant⁸ violations. Kiguchi likely saw this as a fitting handicap—why else would she allow Togame, companion of the enemy, to play the role of arbitrator?

Or perhaps she honestly believed no *bakufu elite* like Togame the Schemer–liaison of the Military Directorate, would violate the rules. 9

For her part, Togame was hoping to avoid any stark violations anyway, while leaving a little room for playing favorites. 10

Togame the Schemer would take the Cured by strategy—it had gotten them this far.

Shichika was beginning to see the big picture—and though Togame told him he was better off going in blind, the way things had turned out made it impossible for him not to think.

As much as thinking was a pain for him.

The nine-game shogi showdown determined the number of bouts between Shichika and Kiguchi-but given this agreement, what had possessed Togame to only beat Kiguchi five to four?

What was the meaning of this feckless, meaningless behavior?

At first the answer was unclear to Shichika—but now that he was facing off against Kiguchi, a guess was taking shape inside his head.

It seemed to him—Togame had used her wins and failures to *evaluate* Zanki Kiguchi.

However much a parlor game.

Shogi remained a game of war—the only thing distinguishing it from the fight at hand being whether the two players wielded swords or pieces. ¹¹ That there

was no necessary correlation¹² between proficiency at shogi and proficiency in swordplay was a fact that Togame knew better than anybody out there—but in playing several games against a poet warrior like Zanki Kiguchi, she saw a chance of gleaning something of the strategies that the Master of the Heartland School would use in combat.

In that sense, it didn't matter whether Togame won or lost.

As long as she got to play—a number of games.

She wanted to learn how Kiguchi would operate when faced with different challenges—to learn how Kiguchi comported herself in the heat of battle.

They say a shogi play-by-play bears traces of your personality.

In those nine games, Togame had been trying to learn something about Kiguchi–and to do so, experiencing a good number of failures, namely four, had been essential.

All the more because Togame wanted Shichika to beat Kiguchi in one go—to that end, she craved a mastery of how Kiguchi won and how she lost.

Armed with this knowledge.

Togame—surely planned to use it in the battle between Kiguchi and Shichika.

This was risky business.

That said—they were still in business. 13

If she was able to predict how Kiguchi would swing, their chances would improve—

-But then again.

If I don't understand her strategy, what difference does it make? If she's playing referee, there's no way she could pull me aside, while I'm fighting, and

help me out. 14

But in actuality.

What Shichika had guessed was about half right.

Considering his mental acuity, this level of precision was praiseworthy—but in practice, what Togame had in mind was far more elementary.

It was a scheme that only could have worked in Shogi Village, in these circumstances, and under these conditions—but the very fact that Shichika, who had been told that he was better off not knowing, had been able to deduce that much just goes to show how brazen of a scheme it was.

Though thinking was a pain for him.

He couldn't help but think it over-

"Alright then, Master Shichika, let us begin."

"Hold on," Togame said to this prompt from Kiguchi.

It sort of killed the mood, 15 but she had to say this, or she could never give the signal to begin.

"Just to be clear—is there no other way we can convince you to relinquish Oto the Cured? You swordsmanship is top-notch—I'm sure that many in the bakufu would readily employ the services of the Heartland School."

"I have long since abandoned such ambitions. Who needs a sword these days? I said as much to Master Shichika just yesterday. After devoting my whole life to this sword, I am prepared to give my life for this sword," Kiguchi turned down Togame's offer summarily—as if her answer were prescribed.

"Only the heart can slay what chokes the heart. Hence the name Zanki. I am Zanki Kiguchi-Twelfth Master of the Heartland School. Show me what you can

do."

"Don't worry, I was gonna show you anyway, but you'll probably miss it—if you're torn to smithereens."

Putting aside the fact that his catchphrase had become a bit perfunctory.

Things were certainly heating up-16

"Alright," Togame said.

Then gave her standard line.

"May the best sword win-fight!"

Hearing the signal—neither of them moved.

Vigilant.

Shichika, the novice, was trying not to dive in recklessly, while Kiguchi, the master, was hesitant to win the fight too quickly.

This, obviously, could be turned to their advantage.

The fact that this fight was the *real deal*, ¹⁷ but with *wooden swords*—and steeped in an air of seriousness that came from the relationship of this instructor with her pupil, offered a great advantage to a person like Togame—and so the Schemer.

Added this—in the same tone as her standard referee line.

"Pawn to 7-6."

Announcing her move.

Capitalizing on a difference in ability and banking on a fluke—this time around, Togame the Schemer was able to come up with no better strategy, but in order to make it happen, there were several conditions they would have to overcome.

Their model was the fight on Mt. Odori versus Konayuki Itezora.

As Togame had assured Shichika time and time again, she was certain that he could have beaten Konayuki if only he had fought her normally.

In that case, why did he lose?

Apart from the fluke, why had he lost? After all, a difference of ability in his favor was not a logical explanation for what happened.

Simply put, he let his guard down—Togame had instructed him to take it easy on her, since she was just a little kid and everything.

If you stay focused—and brace yourself for action, you usually obtain a result commensurate with your ability.

Which brings us to Zanki Kiguchi.

Would somebody with such powers of focus that she failed to notice two intruders in her dojo—let her guard down against Shichika Yasuri, even when his difference in ability was so pronounced?

Most likely not.

Her school of swordsmanship gave life.

Only the heart can slay what chokes the heart.

She was not fighting Shichika, so much as herself—what reason would she have to let her guard down?

Her focus was impeccable—so why not peck away¹⁸ at it?

Sneak up on her and yell, make things go bang—such ploys are usually enough to break somebody's focus, but an obnoxious disturbance¹⁹ was nothing to Kiguchi.

Something quieter, however, might do the trick.

To that end.

In the last of her nine games against Kiguchi, Togame had *lost,* in order to go first in a tenth game!

"Pawn to 7-6."

Hearing these words.

Zanki Kiguchi froze.

An avid gamer in her teens, Zanki Kiguchi, after taking on her name of shame, lived only for the Heartland School of swordplay, but she was anything but slow on the uptake.²⁰

In fact, she prided herself on her intellect.

She knew exactly what Togame was up to.

Kiguchi fully understood how scary it was to fight an amateur—in part, perhaps, because the Kyotoryu was geared toward mortal combat, whereas the Heartland School was geared toward sporting practice.

She would not let her guard down.

She had braced herself, so as not to overthink the way Shichika moved or to

get confused by unfamiliar movements.

Though compelled to look out for her pupil—she had no plans to break her focus.

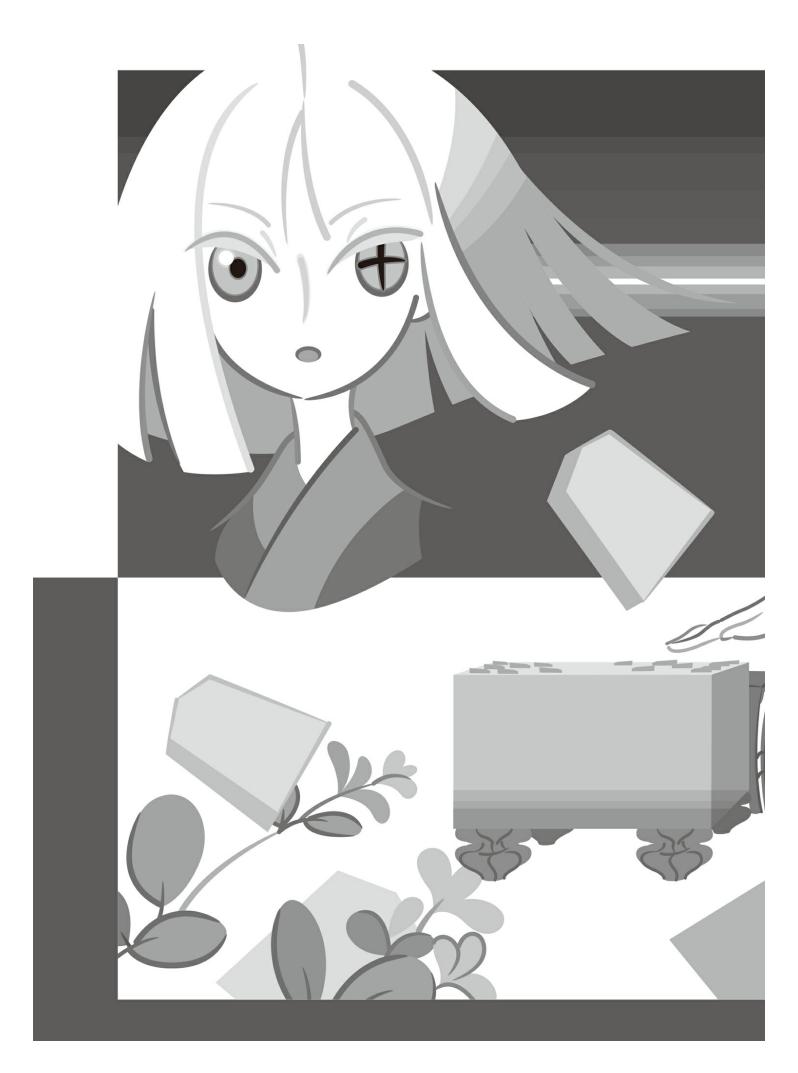
So, when Togame called out her move, Kiguchi understood that she was trying to distract her—and recognized that the Schemer had thrown the final game intentionally—in order to be accorded the first move in the next.

Nevertheless.

When she heard those words.

Pawn to 7-6.

Kiguchi could not help but think about her countermove—not thinking intentionally, but automatically. After all, Zanki Kiguchi was born and raised in Shogi Village—





-If she does that.

I'll go with: Pawn to 3-4.

"Bishop to 2-2."

No sooner than she thought it—Togame announced her move to follow.

Swapping bishops with her out of nowhere.

A hasty move—but wait a second.

-T-Take with Silver General.

"Silver General to 8-8."

With that.

Togame moved her silver general as well, balancing the vertical symmetry of the board.

-It's like...

She can see my moves before I make them.

This was blind shogi.

A way of playing that requires two competitors of unaverage ability—but not a shogi board. The game is played with the imagination, a test of memory as much as skill. This was obviously no easy feat, but almost anybody from the village could play this way, to some degree.

Back in her teens, Kiguchi used to do this all the time.

But Togame's version—was another thing entirely.

Kiguchi was not saying her moves out loud—she was *only thinking them*. Saying them inside her head.

But as if reading her thoughts—as if seeing every single move that she was going to make. Like she was seeing everything, even the thoughts leading up to each decision—

The Schemer launched an offensive. 21

With her moves.

Announcing each next move—the instant Kiguchi had decided.

And with each announcement–Kiguchi thought only of her countermove.

After which, Togame moved again.

On and on.

Over and over-chipping away.

At her focus.

Breaking her down-wearing her out.

At this point, she was about to blow²²–

"Bishop to 5-5."

Togame was relentless—as if she'd read those thoughts too.

Kiguchi knew.

The simplest way to disrupt Togame's strategy—all she had to do was not think about the next move.

It takes two to play a game of shogi.

If one player walks away from the game, there cannot be a winner.

And yet—it was exactly as Princess Negative had proclaimed at Mansion Negative in Owari, though speaking on a topic unrelated to this match.

People can think all they want.

Not thinking, though, is strangely difficult.

Even Shichika, who had a hard time thinking about anything, had an even harder time thinking about nothing; this was only truer for a poet warrior like Kiguchi.

Nay.

The Schemer was—urging her to think.

Thinking of anything except the fight was tantamount to ²³ letting down your guard—

-Alright then.

Gold General to 7-2.

Kiguchi purposely made a weak move—one which wouldn't come to life down along the line, but didn't hurt either, in effect passing.

-Let's see her act on this.

"Bishop on 9-5."

Togame somehow saw through even this and responded accordingly—speaking softly, almost in a whisper.

Indeed, her voice was quiet.

At that volume, she could distract Kiguchi without distracting Shichika.

Reason being-Shichika knew nothing about how shoqi was played.

Let alone blind shogi.

He couldn't even tell you how a rook moved.

In contrast to the grand scheme that she had used against his genius sister, Nanami Yasuri, at Seiryoin Gokenji Temple, which had kept both Shichika and Nanami in the dark—this was the exact opposite, a terribly small scheme.

It would have failed on anyone but Kiguchi.

On anybody but Zanki Kiguchi, the poet warrior!

"Khh..."

-Alright, Lance on 5-8!

The move-defied all reason.

Moreover, she was placing a captured piece—no way it could be read.

This made it check, too.

Unless Togame took the lance, it was Kiguchi's game—but there was no way that the Schemer could expect her to just throw away a piece like that—

"Take with King."

-She got me.

Togame seized the lance like it was nothing.

-So that's why.

That's why we played nine games.

It didn't matter whether she had won or lost.

As long as she got to play—a number of games.

Hence-why Shichika's guess was about half right.

Her approach to the shogi board-

How she responded to certain moves.

Over the course of those nine games—or actually, ten games, if you include their first match eleven days before, Togame had been sizing up Kiguchi.

Hence how she saw her "Gold General to 7-2" and "Lance on 5-8."

-Who is she?

Some mindreading wight?²⁴

After all, they had only played those ten games.

Even if she had been playing not to win, but to size up Kiguchi–one game had at most two hundred moves.

Ten games would be two thousand.

Hardly enough to cover every pattern that could cross the board.

Had the Schemer-filled in any blanks with her imagination, gaining a total mastery of how Zanki Kiguchi played the game?

It takes two to play a game of shogi.

But at present—Togame the Schemer was running the show solo.

Like she was working through a shogi problem—from the first move, she had been forcing Kiguchi through the game, coercing her into each move!

Wh-Who does that?

Her focus had been cracked.

No-more like, her focus had been diverted to a game of shogi.

Just stop thinking.

Just stop thinking.

Why can't I stop!

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"Pawn to 5-6."

Knight to 3-3.

"Knight to 7-7."

Rook to 8-4.

"Gold General to 4-7."

Silver General to 4-2.

"Lance on 5-5."

Pawn to 9-4.

"Head."

Huh?
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Shichika's wooden sword–smacked Kiguchi on the forehead.

Shichika Yasuri, Seventh Master of the Kyotoryu versus Zanki Kiguchi, Twelfth Master of the Heartland School.

A quiet, abrupt, and unceremonious ending.

Believe it or not, it had been difficult for Shichika to hit Kiguchi, even with her standing right in front of him.

But now that he had, he did manage to stand fast for her counterstrike.

EPILOGUE

"What? You dummy. Of course I couldn't have."

Togame the Schemer.

On their way back to Owari from Shogi Village, leaving behind Tendo and Dewa, Shichika asked Togame whether she could have maintained her spectacle of blind shogi with Kiguchi, predicting all her moves, for an entire game.

"It's only possible to predict the other player's moves reliably in the first stages of the game, when force of habit and temperament shine most brightly. I'd say that I had fifty moves in me. Once you move into the latter stages of the game, the board gets so mixed up there's no use trying to guess. All you can do is bet on the most likely option."

"Huh..."

"Like I told Kiguchi after the fact...shogi is too complex a game to learn everything about a player in ten rounds. But once you start calling out your moves like that, in rapid fire, the other player feels as if you're reading them like a book. The fact they aren't saying their moves out loud works to your advantage—since they must at least have considered the move I predicted. Basically, it's a kind of psychological warfare."

"Psychological warfare, huh. Count me outta that. Makes me wish you'd

pulled those guns out when I fought Meisai Tsuruga."

"Fool. Battle is your bailiwick. Today was a very special case."

"Yeah, you're right. My bad.¹ But wait, if you're able to get under her skin like that, did we really need a lucky break? I could've beaten her regardless. She was a sitting duck. Anybody could have beaten her."

"That's tempting to think, now that you've won, but I assure you that you won because you were the amateur. My greatest fear about this strategy was obviously that Kiguchi would finish things before we had our chance—but I was also worried about her more ingrained abilities, the muscle memory created by her constant training. That realm is not my forte, but when warriors head into battle, their body does a large part of the thinking on its own, without the mind, wouldn't you say?"

"Yeah."

"I could distract Kiguchi all I wanted, but if you were just some average swordsman, swinging your sword normally, she likely would have snapped back out of reflex, with her muscle memory. Hence why your amateurish nature, unpolluted by the standard precepts, was essential to this scheme."

"You think I like being called an amateur? Personally, it's depressing. But yeah, I get how someone would have to rely on reason in order to respond to an unexpected move. And with Konayuki–well, I did my best. Still..."

There was something else that had been bothering Shichika.

But he hadn't had the nerve to ask until they were a good distance away from Tendo.

"Strictly speaking, wasn't that a violation of the rules? Interfering with the fight by bothering one of the players feels kinda unfair."

"Did you really just ask me that?" Togame was astonished. "Of course it was unfair."

"We had to think outside the board. She went into the fight assuming it would be quiet on the sidelines. But guess what. That fight was really two versus one—and that was more than Kiguchi could handle. I'm always refereeing fights for you, but I thought I'd play my trump card, just this once—although in all fairness, it is a card that never should be played."

"You'd think that she'd say something, though. Kiguchi was a stickler² for rules—"

"But remember, Shichika, who made that violation?" Togame asked. "Me, the referee."

"...Right."

Her rebuttal left him speechless.

She could probably overlook all but the most flagrant violations-

But what could be more flagrantly unfair?

"I thought-Schemers won through strategy."

"Well, yes. So if Kiguchi thought that I was out of line, she should have spoken up."

"But-she didn't."

"Don't you see why?"

Here, Togame.

Laughed maniacally.

She sounds like sis, Shichika thought. It was disturbing.

"In that town-proposing a game of shogi could never be seen as a violation."

"Ahh..."

The holy land of shogi players.

It would be analogous to banning swordplay from that holy land of swordsmen, Seiryoin Gokenji Temple, back in Tosa.

That's what made it—a strategy.

"Alright. So, you're saying that if you'd given me advice or started screaming or whatever, she probably would've called you out on it."

"It would have made no difference. Kiguchi is a top-notch swordsman—once she's in her element, facing an adversary, I daresay she blocks out everything, background noise or otherwise. Any attempts to distract her by yelling or trying to confuse her, which was out of the question anyway, would never have broken her attention. The sole exception—being shogi."

"Gotcha... She grew up in the shogi capital of Japan. How could she say no to shogi?"

"That's it."

That's it, huh? thought Shichika.

Zanki Kiguchi was unable to dismiss³ a shogi challenge.

She said that in her teens she was an avid player—but she must have been in love.

Which explains how even after devoting her whole life to swordplay-those

memories had yet to fade.

Explains—why she agreed to play Togame in the first place, although she must have realized that the Schemer was up to something when things escalated to the nine-game showdown.

To recap—in the wake of the battle for Oto the Cured...

In real life, a person of inferior powers taking down a person of superior powers, or a person of superior powers getting taken out by a person of inferior powers, is perhaps not very common, but it is by no means rare. The eventual winner and loser are not always obvious right off the bat, and sudden reversals and major upsets happen with surprising frequency. Thinking this over, most of the time, it points to something overlooked in your initial observations, meaning that the person you thought was superior is actually the weaker one, and the person you thought inferior the stronger one. This turning of the tables can be pretty moving for anyone on the sidelines. Saying "whoever should win will win, no ifs ands or buts, and no reason to overanalyze things" would be going way too far, but we certainly have a tendency to think this way nowadays. We expect the stronger person to win, and so we have no reason to applaud them, and expect the weaker person to lose, and as such see no need to blame them; if the stronger person wins, that makes them lazy, but if the weaker person wins, then it's a miracle. To a certain degree, yes, but in seeing things this way, the simple facts of winning and losing become entangled with some truly complicated implications. Being seen as strong can be a handicap, while being taken for a weakling can turn into an opportunity for victory. Turned around, I guess this points to the idea that true strength has the ability to brush away the aforementioned implications.

The present volume constitutes Book Nine of *Katanagatari*. Book Nine, already? At this point there are just a few books left, which is to say that there are only three months left in the journey of Togame the Schemer and Shichika

Yasuri, Seventh Master of the Kyotoryu, and as their author, I can already tell this is going to be a difficult goodbye. Starting off from Kyoto in January, they went to Tottori in February, Shimane in March, Yamaguchi in April, Kagoshima in May, Hokkaido in June, Kochi in July, Tokyo in August, and Yamagata in September. I'm now realizing we've been all over Japan. It's already decided where the two of them will travel in the next three months, but it seems like the plot is becoming quite intricate. Speaking genuinely here, I didn't have the highest hopes of this series working out, but now that I've got the hang of it, I find myself three quarters of the way through a twelve-book project. This in and of itself is a reversal or an upset of a kind, at least in terms of my low expectations for myself, but I'm absolutely dedicated to seeing this thing through. And now, I need to say for all to hear that *take*'s illustrations of Zanki Kiguchi are absolutely heavenly. I feel the need to respond in kind, but that's something for another day.
