The larger nations began to spread across the continent, and the gap between the large kingdoms and smaller countries grew. Newly established countries found themselves invaded or made into puppet states. The world slowly became inaccessible to newcomers.

In order to stabilize the political situation, the various player kings came together to establish a treaty based on a set of metrics known as the National Power Rankings.

Nations were ranked on a three-point scale: territory held, economic power, and military strength. This score would limit how many players could participate in battles, with the lower-scoring nation setting the cap. Furthermore, there were two pools that battle participants could be drawn from, citizens and mercenaries, and a further restriction dictated that at least 70 percent of the chosen participants had to be citizens.

This made it easier to balance national strength, increased the value of NPC soldiers, and gave individual players the chance to greatly affect the outcome of history.

But the system wasn't perfect. This caused countries to value citizens that were combat-effective even at lower ranks. Young players who had chosen mage classes could only use their beginner skills and were seen as a burden.

This led to a common belief that mages as a whole were an evolutionary dead end. With the ratification of the treaty, an entire class of players was left without a purpose or a place. It was assumed that a mage chosen for one of the valuable national battle slots could snatch defeat from the jaws of victory.

And so, wizards, summoners, and the rest of the mages became players without a home.

The Kingdom of Alcait, located in the southeastern region of the continent, was a small country born in this period of warfare. It was protected by the treaty's ban on waging war against new countries until four months past their founding. This kept the new nation safe for the time being, but despite the lack of a major power in the area, they were surrounded by other small-and medium-sized kingdoms. The clock was ticking, and they'd soon be easy

pickings.

Solomon, King of Alcait, had a plan. He was well acquainted with the hardship that mage-class players faced and knew their aspirations and potential. At a time when the status of mages was uncertain at best, Solomon invited Danblf to join his country. The news spread, and magic users heard that there was a country willing to accept them. One after another, they immigrated to Alcait seeking fair treatment and opportunity. As they gathered into the kingdom, an interesting phenomenon occurred.
