Elizabeth S. Altar

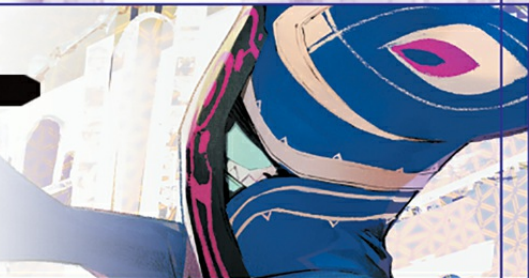

“‘Who?!’ *That* is your first question when faced with such a beautiful being?! Oh my! Such ignorance!” The buzzing, mumbling voice made it difficult to read her emotions, but it was fairly obvious that the question had made the creature upset.

“But I will forgive you,” it added. “This is the kingdom of Altar — a place so dreadfully unlike the wondrous fairyland I call home. I cannot fault you for not knowing me. Ignorance is not exactly a sin, after all.”

“Indeed. I am Eh Teln Pare! As the holder of the Insect General job, I once served Legendaria’s army, but the foolish queen and those who follow her branded me a rebel and chased me out of the country!”

I can’t allow my beloved Legendaria to continue along its wayward course any longer...!” Eh Teln Pare practically sang out her true desires. “And you will be the first sacrifices towards achieving that end!” Finally, she unleashed her Apis Ideas onto Riser’s group.

The ten Apis Ideas in the front of the formation were the first ones to attack. Ten was more than double the size of Riser’s group, and the ones that remained were more than enough to protect Pare...or rather, Regina Apis Idea, the queen bee herself.

Though the Apis Ideas had Demi-Dragon-tier stats, they were human-sized and possessed the insectoid weakness to low temperatures.

Both of them stopped the Apis Ideas in their tracks, and after ten seconds or so...they all exploded, as per usual.

It was as though *their deaths had been delayed*.

“I know this...!” As an experienced Master, Riser was familiar with one job that made this possible.

“They’re Death Soldiers!” The Apis Ideas the queen had at her side — the ones she called the “Queen’s Guard” — were different from the other bee-men in two ways.

First, they had their transformation ability removed in exchange for doubling their stats.

And second...all of them were Death Soldiers.

She increased the oxygen concentration in the air... Pure oxygen was an extremely potent natural oxidizing agent. It reacted with countless types of matter, creating various other compounds. Xunyu quickly realized that her equipment was being affected as well.

Oxygen also had strong inflammatory properties, making it dangerous to use fire magic. If Zeta hadn't snuffed out the flames with her vacuum, this place would now be burning as brightly as the main gate.

She's not wearing the bandages just for fashion... On their inside, there's gear that acts like space or diving suits, protecting her from the changes in air pressure and atmospheric composition.

The nature of Zeta's Superior Embryo was more or less obvious by now.

"Optical camouflage, invisible walls, air projectiles, vacuum, oxygen concentration control... Your Embryo has power over the air itself, doesn't it?" Xunyu said, continuing to attack with her arms, defend with her legs, and dodge using fire attacks. "You get optical camouflage by distorting the air. You insulate yourself by creating multiple layers of vacuum and air. Your barriers are just compressed air. The wind projectiles are exactly that. Then the vacuum, and the opposite with oxygen overconcentration. It's too damn obvious."

Zeta said nothing in response, but there was a hint of surprise on her hidden face.

"Anyone would figure it out if you used as much stuff on them as you did on me. But it's not like it's a big deal that I know it now, right?"

If Xunyu was right about Zeta's Embryo's abilities, Xunyu's awareness of it wouldn't be much of a disadvantage. After all, no living creature could survive without air. It was the opposite of Gerbera's Alhazred, which lost half of its potential when the target merely knew of its existence.

Zeta's Embryo was as strong as ever, even if the enemy knew exactly what it did.

"This Embryo isn't limited to just basic control either. You can actually mess with the air's composition. There's a whole lot ya can do with somethin' like that. Even the skills you're using look the same, but are actually pretty damn different."

Xunyu was referring to the barrier that protected Zeta from the beams and the wall that was blocking her prosthetic arm attacks — the barriers that deflected physical attacks much like Silver's compressed air walls. The barriers

"And evEn though you mEss with the air and its compositiOn, you're not creating any poison gAs or anythin' like thAt. You're just cOntrolling the air thAt's already there, aren't yA?" Xunyu guessed that instead of "filling" the space with pure oxygen, Zeta had actually separated the oxygen from the other gases, which she was now using for her air barriers and projectiles.

That made Zeta's abilities seem weaker, but it was important to remember that she could use the air around her to do *whatever she wanted*.

They were the Royal Guard — those who *used* to be the true protectors of Altar.

"Fshfshfsh... You continue to struggle? Frail as you might be, you are still good prey. Fshfshfshfshfsh..." Aranea laughed, moving his spider-like mouth. "Do be careful, though. My poison is more fiendish than even that of your typical UBM. It will easily melt a limb or two. And this body of mine is far stronger than the one I possessed as a mere Superior Job and a member of The Death's Thumb. To be honest, this will barely qualify as a fight."

As much as these words were a threat, they were also the unvarnished truth.

Even so, they did nothing to shake the knights' resolve.

"Charge!" Theodore cried.

"As you command!" the knights answered. He didn't fall back, and neither did they.

And so, the Royal Guard faced down a foe that far outclassed them.

"Fshfsh... Fatal Mist."

"Everyone! Take an Elixir!" Aranea had used King of Venom's ultimate job skill right off the bat, prompting Theodore to order the Royal Guard to use the Elixirs

they had been provided with.

This gave the Royal Guard the upper hand in this exchange.

Aranea's Fatal Mist was a skill that allowed him to pick several of his ten poisons that give disease-based debuffs, and then create a mist based on those poisons without worrying about any chemical interactions between them. And as King of Venom, he also possessed the Toxification skill at EX level, which doubled any disease-based status effects he inflicted.

Being exposed to a mist carrying such potent poisons would normally be fatal to anyone.

Aranea's Poison Resistance was also at EX level, allowing him to negate any and all disease-based debuffs. It wouldn't have been unusual if he was the only one still standing the moment after he used Fatal Mist.

The only way the Royal Guard could avoid this powerful poison attack was by using Elixirs. With the exception of those from diseases the imbibers had acquired by ordinary means, Elixirs negated all disease-based status debuffs, and then granted immunity to them for the next three minutes.

Indeed, he was the strongest gulong ren — the ancient dragon kin.

“Draconic Emperor, Canglong Renyue.”

With a name that meant “blue dragon, beyond mankind,” he was the humanoid Irregularity — the Draconic Emperor.

Ignis was quick to action. It wasn’t clear how well Ignis understood the gravity of Canglong’s declaration, but the power behind it was more than enough for him.

For the first time since coming to the shelter — no, since arriving at the castle — Ignis truly prepared for battle.

He judged that the entity before him was far above Bellcross and everyone else that stood in his way along the path to the Arch Sage. Canglong was not merely an obstruction for him, but an *enemy* that matched, if not surpassed, his target.

These features would remind some of certain entities faced by a select few champions. The strongest warriors of Altar might recall the great three-headed dragon.

Indeed, Draconic Emperor could only be...

"A human bearing the power of dragons and their kings?" Ignis guessed that Canglong was a humanoid with the abilities of the strongest monsters.

Canglong said nothing in response, focused on protecting the Altarians.

However, in his mind, he gave an answer.

Close, but not quite.



The Draconic Emperors were the descendant of gulong — ancient dragons — as well as gulong themselves. "Gulong" was another name for the strongest Pure-Dragons on the eastern side of the continent.

While the Border Mountain Belt in the west was inhabited by western-style skydragons, the ancient dragons of the east were more like the serpentine beasts from Chinese mythology in the real world.

Dragons with a similar appearance still lived in Tenchi, but the gulong were on an entirely different level. They were extremely intelligent and well-versed in the arts, and had lived alongside humans since ancient times as guardians or

rulers. The gulong ren — ancient dragon kin — that still existed to this day were the descendants of gulong-human hybrids; back then, the gulong used them as representatives of their rule.

The gulong were monsters that had existed since the very first stages of the world. Thus the name *ancient* dragons, which they used to refer to themselves as well as being called this by others.

You could say that the previous observers had put them on this world to act as part of the world's system — as both tyrants and refiners of mankind. They understood the truth behind this world and were aware of multiple ways of managing this *game*.

As a result of all this, the people of the east saw them as wise and fearsome sovereigns of the land.

However, things had changed two thousand years ago, when the Incarnations attacked.

Back then, it quickly became clear that the gulong *knew things too well*.

The Incarnations had abilities far outside the norm for the world, as well as vast amounts of Resources to support them. The dragons immediately understood that they could not win against the men.

That was why they chose to take their leave *without* fighting.

They ran away, fearing the ultimate end they would face if they stood up to the Incarnations, and began searching for a way to survive into the future — to continue to exist.

What they arrived upon was one of the ways to control the very world — the ability to influence the job-managing Archetype System.

They quickly manipulated the Archetype System and disappeared, leaving behind only the gulong ren born from the union of dragons and humans — and the being known as the “Draconic Emperor.”

This was a job that appeared only after the gulong vanished, which was because *the Draconic Emperor job and the gulong were one and the same*.

The gulong had turned their very existence into a job and left it to their future

descendants.

Jobs couldn't be destroyed — they would exist for as long as this world did.

What mattered to the gulong wasn't their awareness or life, but their mere *existence*.

The Draconic Emperor was the aggregation of everything that made up the monsters known as gulong. It was their remains, their continued existence, taking the *shape* of a job.

And those born with this job had two special skills.

The first was "Gulong Cells." It gave the bearer of the job an ancient dragon body said to be tougher than even that of dragon kings.

Being the aggregate of all the gulong, the Draconic Emperor had life force that matched them...if not surpassed them.

Because of this, the Draconic Emperor was nigh-invulnerable. Wounds that would be fatal to anyone else were mere scratches to them. If a crushed heart or a burnt body was enough to kill the Draconic Emperor, then first in Huang He's duel rankings would've been Xunyu, not Canglong.

This immortality had been demonstrated even in this battle against Ignis.

Additionally, as a side-effect of Gulong Cells, the bearer's body was "dragonized," turning him into a Dragon King.

With their genetic makeup and resistances rivaling those of the highest-tier dragons, they were able to turn their magic into the defensive aura characteristic of Dragon Kings, simply called "Dragon King Aura."
