"Speaking of spring, I think it's going to trigger a new *otome* game, Lady Aileen!"

This reply immediately ruins the all-important atmosphere and almost makes a vein pop out on Aileen's temple. Keeping her smile firmly in place, she glances across the table at her sister-in-law, who's munching on cookies without a care. "Lady Lilia. Haven't you realized why I, the empress, take tea with you once a week?"

The woman looks at her blankly. Her smooth, chestnut hair and lovely face give her the sort of charm small animals have. This appearance contrasts sharply with Aileen's, whose resplendent golden hair and sapphire eyes overawe others.

"Gracious, of course I do. It's an opportunity for us to brainstorm ways to handle the next game, isn't it?"

Their positions, mindsets, and everything else are polar opposites as well. A second vein throbs on Aileen's temple. "How many times must I tell you not to speak of that?! I am spending this time with you to drum into your head the bare minimum of etiquette expected of the consort to the emperor's younger brother—"

“Anyway, Lady Aileen. I do think it’s standard for *otome* games to begin in the spring.”

“Listen when others are speaking! You’ve graduated from being ‘the player,’ remember?!” Aileen shrieks. After all, Lilia has brought up the topic of their previous lives with no regard for who may be listening.

This world is identical to the stage of *Regalia of Saints, Demons, and Maidens*, an *otome* game series that both Aileen and Lilia played in their past lives. The countries featured in the game exist here, as do the characters. Many events from the games have played out in this world as well. No matter how ridiculous the idea may seem, it’s been proven beyond a doubt.

However, this world is no game. It’s reality, and the characters are living humans. That is how Aileen—a villainess who, according to the game’s story, was destined to die in a haphazard way—has built a different life for herself. She’s romanced the demon king and married him, making them emperor and empress of Imperial Ellmeyer.

Meanwhile, Lilia is the game’s heroine. Like Aileen, she has memories of her past life. Calling herself the player, she treated Aileen and the others as her pawns, referring to them as “characters.” Saying that Aileen was her “biggest favorite,” of all things, she shrugged off events and tragedies as simply part of the game. However, recently, she’s begun to think of this as her own life—or so Aileen assumed...

“But, Lady Aileen, I remembered something quite clearly the other day. Game 5 really did get released.”

She’s referring to an entry in the *Regalia of Saints, Demons, and Maidens* series. So far, Aileen has lived through a variety of events that occurred in Games 1 through 4 and their fan discs. On every occasion, she’s smashed the many death flags that menaced her husband, the final boss.

In other words, if Game 5 exists, it will mean getting dragged into yet another tiresome incident.

“I’m not positive, but I think I died on its release date. I did manage to snag an early copy, so I’d already cleared it by then.”

As Lilia's story begins to sound increasingly specific, Aileen's expression tenses up. "Stop that. There is no Game 5. Y-you must have been dreaming."

"Not only that, but it also sounded like they'd begun working on Game 6. The producer publicly announced that the characters from 5 would appear in the sequel."

"Don't bring up even more troubling things. Was the series even popular enough for that?"

"I mean, probably? Lady Aileen, you really don't remember 5 or 6?"

Lilia cocks her head. Aileen's gaze wanders uncertainly.

She remembers up to Game 4. Unlike Lilia, Aileen had been a relatively casual player, so she didn't know all that much about the games. She simply romanced the characters who piqued her interest. However, she hadn't been enthusiastic enough to preorder the games, and she never proactively hunted for information about future installments. On top of that, Game 4 had been built around Imperial Ellmeyer's legend of the Maid of the Sacred Sword and seemingly capped off the series, so she isn't sure she noticed that Game 5 had been released— No. Wait.

"Was 5 a sort of Mafia story...about secret societies?"

Lilia leans forward. "He's actually an evil god, but he's the school doctor, and the designated fan-service provider! It's a pretty good scenario, no? She's plotting to overthrow the government, but as it turns out, the founder of the religion is the school doctor, our final boss, and she's just being used. The final boss only wants to eat the fiend dragon and regain his power as an evil god, you see."

"Quit dropping spoilers as if there's some sort of competition! It feels like you're going to make me remember the cover... Besides, there is no fiend dragon now; she's become the Holy Dragon Consort! The final boss won't get his power back. The end!"

"Oh, and for some reason, he speaks with a Kansai accent. He uses the body of the first Daughter of God in an attempt to break the fiend dragon's seal, but then he gets attached to the corpse, because he says she looks just like the oracle-princess from the Queendom of Hausel who sealed him away eons ago. What a pervert. Still, he's a hot evil god with glasses!"

“Booooring! Serena’s all busy now that she’s a bureaucrat; she never comes over, and Sahra’s gone back to Ashmael...” Lilia puffs her cheeks out, sulking.

The names she’s just mentioned belong to the heroines of Games 2 and 3 respectively. In addition, Aileen’s lady-in-waiting, Rachel—who’s been pointedly ignoring her bizarre conversation with Lilia—is the villainess of Game 2.

“The hero and final boss of Game 2 are in the duchy of Mirchetta. The final boss of the Game 1 fan disc has become Grand Duke Levi and shuttles back and forth between here and his homeland. However, in reality, it had been a terribly personal, lonely fight. Learning that the great Queendom was controlled by just one woman, Amelia Dark, only made it seem even more so.

In any case, Imperial Ellmeyer emerged victorious. During the conflict, the Queendom's floating palace split in two; one half sank into the ocean, while the other fell into the borderlands between Ellmeyer and the Kingdom of Ashmael, a section of desert crisscrossed by canals.

The Queendom of Hausel had been an island nation. Losing both the palace that had been its core and a queen who could see past and future plunged the land into chaos. Apparently, an oracle from somewhere or other declared herself queen, and fighting broke out not long after. After Imperial Ellmeyer fended off the Queendom's incursions, Claude felt little inclination to look after their interests. The floating palace, however, was a treasure trove of information regarding the Queendom's divine-stone technology, which had been created by combining sacred and demon stones. Claude had been planning on working with Ashmael to dismantle the palace and analyze the technology, and that should have been the end of it.

Then without warning, the floating palace awakened—there's really no other way to put it—and ejected the entire team of investigators. After pale light enveloped the entire structure, it vanished without a trace.

"So it disappeared this morning? Who confirmed this?" Claude asks as soon as he's seated himself at the desk in his office.

His guards Walt and Kyle are on duty at the door. Keith, who came to deliver



the report, has insisted on making tea as usual. Aileen is seated on the long reception sofa, while Cyril Lauren d'Autriche, her older brother, sits opposite her. He took over the management of the d'Autriche dukedom for their father, Rudolph, this spring, and he's recently been appointed prime minister.

"His Majesty the holy king of Ashmael did so in person, then immediately sent a report via sacred stone," Cyril answers. The hues of his blond hair and blue eyes are more muted than Aileen's, and both his tone and demeanor are gentle as well. "The first thing he said was 'Don't tell us you stole it,' so I laughed and asked if he was sure they hadn't hidden it themselves."

"All right. I'll try to get the demons to help with the interviews as well."

"Very good. I've also mentioned this to His Majesty the king of Ashmael, but such a large structure won't be easy to hide. Whether it was moved by a person or some mechanism in the palace itself, we're bound to find it eventually. For now, please take care to avoid anything that may cause a stir and conduct yourselves as usual." Cyril probably means there's no need to make the citizens uneasy...or so Aileen assumes, until he abruptly turns to face her. "I do mean 'take care.' You understand, don't you, Aileen?"

When Aileen opens her eyes, her husband is there with a smile, so she hopes she’s just been having a nightmare.

*Oh, thank goodness. I thought a game might have started again... I needn’t have worried, though. We’ve been through all of the events connected to Ellmeyer and this timeline already...*

Still, Claude always has trouble waking in the mornings, and it’s unusual for him to rise before her. She nuzzles her cheek into his cool palm, asking for attention. The difference in temperature is nice. She hears a door open, and when he takes his hand away, she actually feels lonely.

“Is Aileen awake?”

“She still seems out of it. How about the other one?”

“The girl’s still asleep. We’re having Ares watch her, just in case. Who is she?”

“Your guess is as good as mine. All I know is that her name is Estella.”

“Estella...”

“She seems to be an acquaintance of Charles, the boy who attacked us. I don’t think she’s an enemy, but it might be best to stay wary.”

“You’re certain you don’t have a second illegitimate child?”

“I never even had a first one.”

Aileen bolts up in bed. Claude is sitting on the edge, and she grabs his shirtfront. “You mustn’t speak like that, Master Claude! Imagine how the child would feel, having his own father deny him!”

“That’s the first thing you say?! Wait, Aileen, calm down and listen to me.”

“No. As his mother, I object to the term *illegitimate* as well.”

“I think you’ve adopted him a little too quickly!”

“Well, his face! It was the spitting image of yours, Master Claude.”

Claude falls silent, his expression stiffening.

Baal steps into the room, chuckling. “Ah, is that so? They look that alike, do they? He’ll never talk his way out of this one.”

“Master Baal? Why...? Oh, of course, I asked her to teleport us to Ashmael... Wait—Master Claude?!” She pats her husband’s chest and arms to make sure what she’s seeing is real. He’s human. Didn’t Charles’s curse transform him into a young dragon?

“I reverted the moment we reached Ashmael. It’s a bit better inside the holy king’s barrier.”

“You’d better be grateful to us.”

Baal—who’s arrogantly drawn himself up to his full height—possesses enough sacred power to suppress the demon king’s magic. Sacred power is meant to protect people, so it isn’t good for offense. However, by neutralizing magic, breaking seals, and lifting curses, it purifies the demonic.

“It’s the same as when your magic was unstable. Wearing that earring should slow its progress.”

“Progress...? Master Claude?!”

Claude has abruptly begun removing his shirt—a black garment in the style of Ashmael, which Baal must have loaned him—and Aileen is aghast. The moment she lays eyes on his exposed skin, though, she falls silent.

From his collarbone to the vicinity of his heart, the skin on the left side of his chest has turned dark and dull. When she gingerly touches it with her fingertips, it’s rather hard for skin. More like soft scales.

“...If this covers you entirely, will you become a dragon again?”

“Probably. I’m sorry.” Claude lowers his eyes.

Giving him an intentionally self-assured smile, Aileen points to the area around his heart. “Oh, what a pity. I was hoping to keep your adorable young dragon version as a pet.”

“Don’t even joke about that.” Claude grimaces. Then his expression softens, and he puts an arm around Aileen’s shoulder, pulling her close.

“Conversely, that does mean the curse isn’t very strong... Why do you think he did something so negligent?” Baal murmurs.

“Claude is the demon king,” Aileen reminds him. “Perhaps he simply wasn’t able to cast the curse fully?”

“We sent scouts to the national border. They tell us Ellmeyer is surrounded by a red barrier and they can’t see anything. As you probably suspected, they can’t get in. We can’t imagine someone with the power to cast a barrier that strong over the whole of Ellmeyer failing to cast a curse. It was all even that demon god could do to cover the barrier and hold him in, and we doubt he could have broken through it.”

The image of her father-in-law, who sent them outside the barrier, rises in Aileen’s mind. “Master Luciel... That’s right, where is Mother?”

“Watching for any changes to the barrier. As long as Father’s barrier holds, that boy Charles won’t be able to move, and the situation shouldn’t deteriorate. I think we can be sure of that.”

Grace encouraged them to retreat. She probably won’t make any reckless attempts to rescue Luciel. After all, Luciel bought them this time so they could come up with countermeasures.

“Speaking as Ashmael, we’re concerned that the red barrier might extend to us. However, as of now, it doesn’t appear to be expanding. We intend to stand by and treat this as Imperial Ellmeyer’s internal conflict, but... Claude. Are you really innocent?”

“What are you talking about?”



“The love child.”

“Completely innocent.” Claude’s voice is low, practically a groan.

Aileen frowns. “Master Claude, try thinking back carefully.”

“I’m telling you, there’s nothing. Why doesn’t anyone believe me? I really wish someone would. At least one person.”

“Master Claude, in this world, there are things that can be done and things that can’t. Come, think hard.”

“No matter how many times you say that, if there isn’t anything, then there just isn’t! In any case, even if he did catch me off guard, he had enough magic to fight me on equal terms. If he’s really my child, why haven’t the demons stirred or noticed him before? It makes no sense.”

He has a point. Aileen falls silent. This seems to relieve Claude; some of the tension drains out of his shoulders. “And so let’s set the love child theory aside.”

“If you don’t remember, Master Claude, there’s no help for it... If Sir Keith were here, I believe he could have given us a list of potential mothers, but...”

The demon king’s adviser must know all of Claude’s movements like the back of his hand. As Aileen falls deep into thought, Claude slumps over. “So you’re still going to doubt me.”

“If he were a total stranger, there would be no explaining this. It would make more sense if being your love child has made his life pointlessly hard, and he’s come to repay that grudge by destroying the empire.”

Claude can’t argue with that. He broods. “If we take everything at face value, this appears to have been an attempt to get rid of me and take over Imperial Ellmeyer. But strangely, his heart didn’t seem to be in it... He probably has some other goal.”

“It’s likely. That is precisely why we need information about that child now, including the identity of his mother. Without that, we can’t even negotiate, much less deal with him.”

“Look for information on his father, too, please. I want to clear my name.”

“If you’re going to insist that you don’t know, Master Claude, we’ll just have to ask that girl Estella. Where is she?”

When she ignores Claude’s protests, Baal gives him a rather pitying look. “She’s still asleep, or so we’re told. By the way, that girl—”

“King Baal.” There’s a light knock at the door. The voice outside belongs to Ares, Ashmael’s general. “The girl is awake now. Sahra is with her.”

Baal tells him he’ll be right there, and Aileen slips out of bed to go with him.

“Can you see? Yes? Good. Do you think you can sit up? It’s all right; your wounds have been healed.”

In Ashmael’s royal harem, which is slated to be dismantled, the Daughter of God’s kind voice echoes. The palace is well-maintained but noticeably shabby and generally gloomy.

Sahra, the Daughter of God, is the heroine of *Regalia of Saints, Demons, and Maidens 3*. As such, she has the power to heal wounds. While her abilities aren’t quite what they were in the game, her power is undeniable.

When Aileen and the others enter, Estella is sitting up in bed with Sahra’s help, drinking water from a pitcher.

“Drink slowly. Talking can wait.”

“I... Where...?”

Surrounding her with unfamiliar men at a time like this doesn’t seem like a good idea, so Aileen makes Claude and Baal wait by the entrance, then approaches the bed alone.

“I’ve only healed her wounds,” Sahra tells her. “You mustn’t make her push herself.”

“I know,” Aileen says, and Estella looks at her with hazy eyes. Lovely violet eyes, and golden hair that reminds her of starlight. The cut of Estella’s navy-blue uniform is rather curious; in Aileen’s previous life, it would have been referred to as gothic. At a glance, Estella almost looks like a nun.

Now that she’s taken a good look at her, Aileen is even more certain.

*This girl really is the villainess of Game 5.*

If memory serves her right, the girl in the center of the jacket had flaming red hair. She was probably the protagonist. By process of elimination, she can safely say that the girl with the dark smile in the corner was the villainess.

On top of that, Game 5 had been set here, in Ashmael.

She has a bad feeling about this, but she has to make sure. This girl is their only possible source of information regarding Charles, Ellmeyer's invader.

"Thank you. Because of you, we were able to flee to Ashmael."

"Ash...mael... Is that where I am?" Estella asks in a hoarse voice. Aileen nods. Slowly, the girl looks around her. She thinks for a while, and then her eyes come back to Aileen. "And who might you be?"

"...Pardon? But you know me."

"I've asked the wrong question. Who am I?"

Seeing Aileen's eyes widen, Estella draws her eyebrows together apologetically. "Why am I here? I'm sorry, but do you know me?"

"My dear... Don't tell me..."

"I don't remember. I can't remember... Everything's gone." The girl's long eyelashes tremble.

Aileen can't believe it. Gently, Sahra squeezes Estella's hand. "It's all right. You're a little confused, that's all. Calm down, okay?"

"But I think there was something I had to do..."

"We have a clue, so we'll find out quickly. That's the uniform of Ashmael's Divine Maiden Academy, isn't it? If we ask them—"

"The Divine Maiden Academy?!" Aileen's temples throb. She recalls what Lilia said. *Right...apparently, Game 5 was set in the Divine Maiden Academy, which was supposed to be run by the hero...*

As Aileen struggles to get all the information straight in her mind, Baal steps closer. "That's right. We were going to mention that. Is this girl not one of our citizens?"

“Well, um...” Aileen is at a loss.

Estella’s gaze goes to Baal. “Who are you?”

“Hmm? Very well, let us introduce ourselves. We are Baal Shah Ashmael.”

Instead of responding, Estella winces as if she’s fighting a headache. Seeing this, Baal laughs. “Don’t push yourself. If you have amnesia, you can’t be expected to remember names, even if it belongs to the king. Once you’re back in shape, why not stop in at the Divine Maiden Academy? Someone there may know you.”

“I’ll accompany her,” Aileen volunteers.

Baal blinks. Claude, who’s come up beside him, speaks tentatively. “There’s no need for you to go in person, is there? If we send an inquiry—”

“Her identity is tied to Ellmeyer’s continued existence, Master Claude. After all, she is our sole source of information regarding your love child.”

“How many times must I tell you I have no love children?”

“I beg your pardon. She alone may have information regarding Master Charles, your illustrious son.”

Claude moans something about how she’s gotten it wrong, but Aileen is confident she has the right of it.

“Now that Ellmeyer’s in that state, it may be dangerous for Ashmael to attempt to uncover Estella’s identity. No doubt the Divine Maiden Academy has its own secrets and will take action! That’s clearly where this is going!” All eyes are on her, and every mouth hangs open, but Aileen goes on, almost defiantly. “Some may attempt to take advantage of Estella’s missing memories and use her for nefarious purposes. We must investigate carefully and swiftly. There’s bound to be something we can learn about Charles, and there’s no doubt it will be linked to Ellmeyer’s secrets. We can’t simply leave this in others’ hands, nor should we inquire in a careless manner.”

“I understand, but if we can’t ask directly, then...what do we do?”

“Why, that’s obvious.”

Aileen still isn’t sure whether a game has begun or not. However, if Estella

really is the villainess of Game 5, there's certain to be a denunciation in her future. There's no way the game developers got all the way to the fifth game and suddenly changed their policy.

Aileen doesn't know what sort of person Estella really is. However, she did save them, and she has enough sacred power to oppose Charles. She's someone extraordinary.

Aileen refuses to let the girl be condemned.

"Estella and I will infiltrate the Divine Maiden Academy, posing as ordinary students."

She may be setting up a development identical to the one in the game, but so what? That's how she's always smashed through difficulties before. Aileen smiles dauntlessly.



Even when she pinches his cheek or pushes him, Lilia's husband won't wake up. The same is true of his bodyguard, and of Aileen's brilliant lady-in-waiting, who escorted her here.

*What's going on?*

She's noticed the noise outside, but she wants to figure out this situation first. However, she's starting to tire of tugging on her husband's cheeks and making funny faces.

Sensing an intruder, she hastily pretends to be asleep like the others.

"You're awake, aren't you? I was told you would be."

At the sound of the brusque voice, she opens one eye. He's looking right at her. Lilia recognizes this boy. *Or...do I? I think I might, but perhaps not...* Sitting up, she puts a finger to her temple, thinking.

"...I shouldn't be the one saying it, but I'm pretty sure this counts as an emergency. What are you doing?"



“Searching my memories.”

The vaguely-familiar-yet-not boy seems exasperated. He is young and a little untidy, but the beauty of his face is perfect enough to cover for all that and then some. If he grows up that way, in terms of the game, he'll be a classic hero or a final boss. With a face like that, he could be a romanceable character either way.

“Did you do all this? Aren't you surprised I'm awake?”

“...I'm here because I was told to greet you.”

“Gracious, by whom?”

His only response is silence.

She has the feeling she knows who advised him, though. Should she sense respect for a previous game, or is it provocation?

“My name is Charles Jean Ellmeyer,” the boy tells her. Then he turns on his heel. “That's all... I don't plan to hurt anyone, so don't get in my way.”

He seems to be in a hurry, because that's all he says, and then he's gone.

Lilia blinks a bit, then starts thinking.

Charles Jean Ellmeyer—that name proves he's a member of Ellmeyer's imperial family. Charles is the false name James used, and in the game, it refers to the next demon king.

In other words, this is the next demon king, and he belongs to the imperial family. Add that face, his hair, and the color of his eyes, and there's no room for doubt.

“The sequel is heeeeeeeeeeeeeeeeeere! That's the spirit!”

If that's the case, she has to hurry and get ready, or she'll miss seeing Aileen in action.

Will the stage be Ashmael, home to the Divine Maiden Academy with the holy sarcophagus and the Daughter of God's corpse? She has no idea how this came about, but beginning her investigation there is probably the correct approach. Humming cheerfully, she starts to pack for a journey—and then she notices it.

The sky is bright red. Is it a barrier or something? Ellmeyer has been cut off from the rest of the world. On top of that, there's the state of the people around her...

How is she supposed to get to Ashmael like this?

*What? Don't tell me—am I going to have to stay home?*

Inconceivable.

“.....”

For a moment, the light vanishes from Lilia's eyes. Then she chuckles, her lip curling, and takes out her frustration on her husband by pinching his cheek again. “Wake up, Cedric.”

“.....”

“At times like this, as a rule, the heroine and hero are inexplicably the only ones left awake, and they have to solve the mystery! So why are you asleep? Wake up! Take me to Ashmael! I swear, prince characters are so useless. Wake up, waaake uuuup, I'm going to divorce you, wake up! Fine, divorce it is—”

“Look, you, this is an emergency. What do you think you're doing?”

Lilia's eyes widen. She looks between her husband, who's still stubbornly asleep, and the newcomer. “Serena, my goodness. Were you actually a hero instead of a heroine?”

“There you go, making no sense again. You're not the one behind this mess, are you? I heard something about the floating palace disappearing, too.”

This woman—who's addressing the second prince's consort without even a semblance of courtesy—is Serena Gilbert. She's an outstanding individual who was appointed as a bureaucrat this spring—a fact that Lilia cannot possibly care less about.

What truly matters is that she's a character from the game.

“Anyway, come here a second. The demon king's father has collapsed. It looks like he's hurt.”

She probably means Luciel, the demon king and hero of Game 4.

“You can heal him, can’t you? Assuming he’s alive.”

Serena is the heroine of *Regalia of Saints, Demons, and Maidens 2*, the Saint of Salvation whose special ability amplifies every sort of power there is. Unlike Sahra, the heroine of Game 3, she doesn’t have her own healing abilities, but she can accelerate others’ inherent healing ability.

Lilia’s suggestion is quite natural, but Serena frowns at her. “In this situation, I don’t know whether it’s okay to heal him or not. Obviously.”

“You’re really wary about that sort of thing, Serena. Don’t you have the heart of a saint?”

“Nope. I’ve never been a saint. Anyway, he’s tossing around and babbling about weird things. It’s extremely suspicious. He said ‘Evare’ or something like that.”

“Evare?! But that’s the name of the final boss of 5...! We have to hear more. Let’s help him!” Gleefully, Lilia starts rising to her feet, then pauses, thinking hard.

The evil god Evare. The final boss of Game 5... In that case, who is the boy who called himself Charles?

He can’t possibly look just like Claude and not be a game character, and yet...

*But the hero of 5 didn’t look like him, and if he isn’t the final boss, either, then... Hmm...*

This is a mystery worth pondering. It may be best to start her search at the beginning.

Aileen seems to have escaped, and she’ll no doubt be hard at work wherever she is. Perhaps Lilia’s best move is to find out what she can here.

Someone told Charles to introduce himself to Lilia...not to Aileen. It’s as if they’ve challenged her to a contest: *Figure out who Charles really is. We know you know this.*

Could he be, for example, a character from Game 6, the final installment of the series, which was supposed to be linked with 5?

“Heh-heh! This is going to be so much fun. You think so, too, right, Serena?”

“In a situation like this? You’re as crazy as ever.”

She can say what she wants, but the heroines of 1 and 2 are both here.

How can they let the sequels underestimate the first two games in the series?

## ◆ Second Act ◆

### Covert Maneuvers for the Villainess, Rules for the Demon King

- Game 5 is set in the Kingdom of Ashmael's Divine Maiden Academy.
- The hero is the young boss of an underworld organization that's in charge of keeping the fiend dragon sealed, and he's also the director of the academy. Name unknown.
- The heroine is a Levi tribe survivor, a redheaded girl with magic. Name unknown.
- Based on the jacket, the villainess is probably Estella.
- The villainess is lauded as the divine maiden by the World Unity sect and attempts to kill Divine King Ares. Probably condemned later.
- The final boss is the school doctor. Wears glasses, speaks with a Kansai accent. Secretly the founder of the World Unity sect. Wants to eat the fiend dragon and regain his power as an evil god, so targets the corpse of the first Daughter of God in the underground ruins. (Puppets her corpse.)
- There are three characters to romance at the school. The final boss can't be romanced.
- Charles isn't on the package of 5, but at present, he and Estella know each other.
- Game 6 was apparently in development, but the details aren't known. Features the same characters as 5?

"...At this point, I believe that's everything we have to work with."

Aileen has combined the information Lilia gave her about the games, their current situation, and her own memories, then jotted what she knows down on a piece of paper. She dips her quill into the ink again, putting check marks by the information that's inconsistent with her present reality.

"First, the fiend dragon has become the Holy Dragon Consort. However,

according to Baal, there is an underground organization that was in charge of the seal on the fiend dragon; their role has shifted to conducting rituals in honor of the Holy Dragon Consort, and they still run the Divine Maiden Academy. In other words, the Divine Maiden Academy exists. As a matter of fact, Estella was wearing their uniform...”

In the true ending of Game 3, which was set in Ashmael, the fiend dragon was sealed away. However, in reality, the fiend dragon has been purified and is now the Holy Dragon Consort, so the role of the underground organization has changed significantly.

“In addition, even if the final boss of 5 wants to resurrect the fiend dragon, that’s simply impossible. Since the Holy Dragon Consort has been purified, eating her wouldn’t help him regain his power... However, the holy sarcophagus that holds the body of the first Daughter of God *does* exist. I suspect he could use Lady Sahra as a proxy and skip puppeting the corpse entirely, but...”

From what Lilia said, though, the final boss is obsessed with the first Daughter of God. It could be some sort of romantic fixation or simply foreshadowing a bigger development, or perhaps manipulating the corpse is just easier than using a living human.

“The biggest difference is the fact that the age of Divine King Ares never came to be.”

Baal should have been taken over by the fiend dragon and become the final boss of Game 3. Instead, he’s still the holy king, and while Ares has been pardoned, he’s been branded a traitor who instigated a failed revolution. Even if the villainess of Game 5 is taken in by the World Unity sect, there’s no divine king for her to kill.

“According to the villainess, Ares is a usurper, correct? Estella really does seem to have enough sacred power to become the holy king, but...”

Aileen abruptly realizes something, and her pen stops moving.

It’s about the bloodline of the villainess, who calls the divine king a *usurper* for killing the holy king in Game 3. Following that to its logical conclusion, wouldn’t that mean she comes from the bloodline of the *previous king*—in other words, a descendant of the holy king?



“...Don’t tell me it isn’t just Master Claude, and Estella is Master Baal’s love child—”

“Did you call me, Lady Aileen?”

“N-no, it’s nothing!”

Estella, who’s just returned to their dorm room, seems perplexed by Aileen’s cracking voice.

That golden hair against the navy blue of her Divine Maiden Academy uniform, and those cool violet eyes. Aileen has just realized that the girl looks remarkably similar to Baal.

*I-it can’t be. Master Baal ascended the throne quite a long time ago, and though the harem’s been dismantled, it’s existed for ages. Even if there was a chance before he met Lady Sahra and Lady Roxane, h-her personality is completely unlike his...*

Baal is cheerful and friendly, while quiet Estella seems somehow noble and unapproachable. Unlike Claude, Charles wore an eye patch and had a very different, decadent aura about him, but— At that point, she shakes her head. *In the first place, isn’t her age rather implausible? I do think she’s younger than I am, but unlike Charles, our ages seem quite close. Oh, but there’s no way to confirm her age if she has no memories...*

No matter how many times she thinks it through, she always reaches an impasse there.

Estella notices Aileen’s furrowed brow. She tilts her head and asks, “Are you feeling unwell? Perhaps the fatigue has caught up with you.”

“I’m fine. Remember, I remained in the dormitory on our first day so we could see if anyone tried to strike up a conversation when you were on your own... How did that go?”

“Unfortunately, no one seemed to know me. Neither the teachers nor the students found it strange that I could be a transfer student. Everyone was very curious about my amnesia.”

On their first day at the academy, on Aileen’s suggestion, Estella attended

classes like a normal student.

Aileen and Estella are currently enrolled at the Divine Maiden Academy as transfer students sponsored by Roxane, Baal's principal consort. The academy has a vast campus on the western edge of Ashmael's royal capital, and all students are required to live in the dormitories. Roxane arranged for them to room together, set up dates and times for them to make regular contact, then left them to it.

"However, there was a recruitment attempt by a dubious group known as... the World Unity sect, I think it was. It seems to be popular among the students."

That term appeared in the game as well. Aileen frowns. Not only that, but Lilia also mentioned that the villainess of Game 5 was set up as the divine maiden of the World Unity sect and became the puppet of the final boss.

"You should stay far away from suspicious people...no matter what they say about your memories."

"Of course. No doubt it's an old trick."

Estella doesn't seem the least bit interested, but they'll likely need to be careful. There's a high probability that the game has already begun.

"Was there anything else that seemed odd? For example... Er, I don't suppose you happened to see a prince dressed as a girl...?" she asks, averting her eyes slightly.

Estella looks blank. "I saw no one suspicious. Is there someone here who fits that description?"

"No, it's fine, pretend I didn't ask. I don't think he's usually present... I only needed to make sure, just in case."

"If I see someone like that, I'll report him immediately."

If the love interest in drag appears, will he end up being reported to the police by the villainess? Aileen gets the feeling they may be a villainess death flag. "I understand why that's your first instinct, but please refrain; it would draw attention to you. What about your homeroom teacher?"

“He’s a very kind, elderly man.”

“...I see. You may not originally have been in this year, after all... I had them put you in the highest year so we would be together, but you could easily be a first-year student.”

The Divine Maiden Academy is a four-year boarding school that admits girls fourteen and older. Most students graduate by the age of twenty. While there have been new students in their twenties, it’s rare. Aileen is nineteen, so she prioritized not standing out and had them both placed in the highest year.

“This uniform doesn’t seem brand-new, though.” Estella looks down at her skirt.

Aileen nods; it really doesn’t. “You may even have graduated already.”

“But would I still be wearing the uniform? Perhaps I only borrowed it, and I’m not even a student here. There were no students named Estella in the student register, correct?”

“That’s right. It’s too soon to make that assumption, though. The uniform may be a hand-me-down from someone else.”

“About that... My uniform seems to be a bit different from everyone else’s.”

Turning over the notes she’s written so that the other girl won’t see them, Aileen rises to her feet and takes a closer look at Estella’s uniform.

The academy considers the first Daughter of God its ideal, and so the uniforms are navy blue and designed to resemble the garments worn by nuns. At the same time, Ashmael’s culture tends to favor flamboyant outfits, and the uniforms reflect this: The sleeves are puffed, the shape of the skirts is rather adorable, and lace peeks out around the hem of the skirt and the gathered cuffs of the sleeves. In Aileen’s previous life, this would have been considered a nun-themed gothic Lolita costume.

“...They aren’t the same?” At a glance, Estella’s uniform looks much like what Aileen is wearing. As far as she can recall, the cut and color are the same as what the protagonist of Game 5 wore on the package.

Estella shakes her head slowly, holding the cuff of her sleeve out to her. “The

design of the lace is a bit different. The skirt hems are the same.”

Aileen puts her cuff next to Estella’s, comparing them.

It’s true; the delicate lace that peeks out of their cuffs is slightly different.

So the game really has begun? Aileen tenses, and the young man who's introduced himself as Evare takes a step forward. His movements couldn't be more human. "Aw, no need to be so nervous, Miss Aileen. Let's get along, okay?"

"Oh, y-yes... Wait, you know my name?"

The person who tried to prove she was the one and only true queen of Hausel.

The first Maid of the Sacred Sword—Amelia Dark.

*Why...?*

The only ones who saw the girl's true form were Aileen, Lilia, and Luciel and Grace, who knew her personally from the past. Aileen fought her hand to hand just once, but she could swear that this girl's face is absolutely identical, and there's no mistaking it. She can declare with certainty that the only difference is the color of her hair.

"Let's go, Aileen."

Claude has never seen Amelia. She hesitates, wondering how she should tell him, but Claude's gaze is already scarily severe. Whispering softly, he gives her back a gentle push. "Steer clear of that girl. She's no ordinary human."

She gives him a questioning look, but Claude shakes his head. Does he mean he doesn't know any more than that?

At the same time, the fact that Evare has someone like that with him means he's not ordinary, either.

"That Evare fellow is dangerous as well. His magic doesn't feel human or demon... He's probably the one who shot down Father."

"What?"

"If you keep whisperin' like that, you'll make everyone suspect you two're lovers or married." Evare turns back, raising his lantern again with yet another smile. A step away, Machina turns around, mirroring his movements.

Evare's lantern is bright, and it makes the shadows sharper and deeper.

"Let's all get along. For now anyway."

Hair and eye color are tied to the laws of this world. Since the color of Machina's hair is different, she can't be Amelia.

However, the fact that she's with the final boss of Game 5 can't be dismissed as mere coincidence. She wasn't on the jacket of 5, but this girl, who looks almost identical to Amelia, is most definitely someone to watch.

Claude offers to investigate the faculty, Evare included. Aileen wants to object but can't. Without his help, she'll be spread too thin to keep an eye on Estella's surroundings.

During their first lecture of the morning, Aileen sits in a seat diagonally behind Estella, resting her chin on her hand. *The others simply treat us both as transfer students. One would think they might recognize Claude and myself, but... Perhaps it's because this is a boarding school, isolated from the outside world.*

The one who's been the most blatant about acting as if he knows everything is Evare... Although, that man would have been deeply suspicious even if they hadn't spoken with him.

It's something Baal told her when she casually asked about the underground ruin.

*He said the door to the underground ruin could not be opened by anyone other than those who'd inherited the blood of the first Daughter of God: direct descendants of Ashmael's royal family, and only the women at that...*

She wonders what Lilia's doing. It doesn't seem likely she's simply sleeping inside that red barrier. Aileen gazes out the window. On the edge of the horizon, if she looks closely, she can just make out the top of the barrier.

"Distracted, hmm? We can't have that."

Now he won't get mad when she doesn't appear for her lecture...probably.

At noon, when she sees the pair who've come to the academy's front court to facilitate the contact, Aileen blinks.

"Lady Aileen."

One of them is Sahra, who's carrying a large basket of some sort. She and Aileen are acquainted, and in terms of servants who can travel back and forth between the girls-only school and the palace, she isn't an unexpected choice.

"How are things progressing?"

However, the one who's appeared from behind her is Roxane, and her visit is most definitely unexpected. Instead of the gossamer veil that hides half her face and the red robes that mark her as the principal consort, she's dressed like an ordinary noblewoman. However, she carries herself with such grace that it's clear at a glance she's someone extraordinary. Not only that, but she's also pregnant.

"Lady Sahra is one thing, but even you're here, Lady Roxane? I'm surprised Master Baal let you leave the harem."

"My pregnancy is advanced enough to be stable, and it's best if I move around a bit. Besides, the palace is rather hectic at the moment. Also, I had business here."

“Has something happened?” Aileen asks.

Sahra looks in the direction of the palace a bit uneasily. “Thieves entered the treasure house and set fire to it last night. No one was badly hurt, but there’s a lot that we don’t understand. Ares has his hands full with that at the moment.”

“In other words, the thieves weren’t caught?”

Roxane nods, gazing right back at Aileen. “That’s right. In addition, they only wreaked havoc in the treasure house; nothing was taken. However, when Master Baal ordered an investigation of the whole palace, we discovered that materials related to the underground ruin were missing.”

Aileen’s expression tenses. “Th-then the thieves were after the Daughter of God’s holy sarcophagus...? Is that what this is about?”

“If the ruin is involved, then yes, probably. Since the academy’s director is here today, I’ve forced—or rather, *persuaded* Master Baal to let me come as his representative.”

She’s coerced him into letting her leave. Aileen is rather amazed, but since it wouldn’t do for them to stand around talking, Roxane boldly enters the academy.

“As it happens, it was time for our scheduled contact with you, and no men are allowed here. Of course, as the holy king, Master Baal may enter, but we didn’t want to cause more of an uproar than necessary. The body of the Daughter of God is our kingdom’s sacred relic, but it isn’t as if she has the holy sword.”

The holy sword is a weapon the Queendom of Hausel made, based on the sacred sword. While it isn’t as powerful as the sacred sword, it can be mass-produced and used by anyone, which makes it very practical. However, mass production is only possible due to the Queendom’s technology. Both that technology and the majority of their holy swords were lost in recent battle, and if one breaks, the current Daughter of God is the sole person who can repair it. Now that the sacred sword no longer exists, since the holy sword can use sacred power to attack, it’s a rare weapon. To the Kingdom of Ashmael, it’s a national treasure that slayed the fiend dragon.



“...Come to think of it, why was the Daughter of God’s body preserved in the first place?”

“Probably because she was somebody important, right?” Sahra sounds mystified.

Aileen shakes her head. “If the body had been kept with the holy sword, that would make sense. However, because the holy sword was in the consecrated area where the fiend dragon was sealed, they couldn’t do that. In which case, I assume burying her would be the normal thing to do...and they even went out of their way to build an underground tomb instead of keeping her in a place she had a connection to in life. The harem, for example, or the royal palace.”

In Game 3, the Daughter of God’s ghost appears in the harem. It’s probably because Sahra, her successor, is there. Since everything related to the Daughter of God is in the harem, it seems odd that her body is kept elsewhere.

Roxane clears up that question easily. “From what I’m told, preserving her body was the Queendom of Hausel’s idea.”

Aileen is taken aback by this revelation, and Roxane continues, sounding like a historian, “The holy sword was bestowed on us by the Queendom, and there is a theory that the Daughter of God was also originally from Hausel. Considering the fact that, without her, the holy sword becomes something to be used and cast aside, it’s a persuasive theory.”

“Then both the holy sword and the Daughter of God were gifts from the Queendom...?”

“I believe that’s correct. At the time, this land was poisoned, and it’s hard to believe that any humans lived here earlier. The idea that the Queendom sent the Daughter of God and the holy sword in an attempt to reclaim this land, which had been polluted by the fiend dragon, seems more plausible.”

The Kingdom of Ashmael, born from the myth of the Daughter of God, was founded after Ellmeyer. At the time of Ashmael’s foundation, Amelia Dark was already ruling as Hausel’s one and only queen.

In other words, it’s very likely that the holy sword, the Daughter of God, and the underground ruin were all prepared by Amelia.

“The ruin under the Divine Maiden Academy was built under the Queendom’s guidance, to celebrate the Daughter of God’s achievements. The same is true of the holy sarcophagus that holds her remains.”

“In other words, both the ruin and the sarcophagus were made with the Queendom’s technology?” Aileen asks.

“Yes. I’m told the same is true of the mechanism that will only respond to women directly descended from Ashmael’s royal family. There is a record stating it was made that way because Hausel insisted,” explains Roxane.

“...Wait just a moment. If it’s being preserved by the Queendom of Hausel’s technology, then the body of the Daughter of God...”

“It’s apparently in extremely good condition. Granted, that’s based on testimony from a princess who went to look at it several generations ago, so that report is perhaps two centuries old.”

Amelia’s real body had been asleep on the Queendom’s altar, and if the same principles are at work here, this body may actually be in nearly the same condition as it was in life.

*Does that mean it could move, provided it had a soul?*

“The world must be purified!”

“Just as the land of Ashmael was once steeped in poison, the world is being defiled. We must come together and resurrect the true Daughter of God, and it must be done now—!”

“I’ve never seen them before... Are they popular here?”

“What, the World Unity sect? They’re basically playing, and it’s largely limited to the school. However, Master Baal has been concerned that the events in Ellmeyer have made them bolder.” The unsettling appearance of that red barrier over Imperial Ellmeyer has accelerated the development of a new religion. Roxane’s remark makes Aileen glance over at Sahra, who’s still holding the flyer.

Aileen thumps Sahra on the shoulder. “Pull yourself together. Luc tells me you intend to study medicine. The kingdom’s first female doctor will bear much

greater responsibility toward future generations than the Daughter of God would.”

Sahra squeezes her hands into fists. “Yes, I’ll do my best!”

“Refrain from overdoing it. When you get too excited, the results are never good.”

“Oh, you know, I can see that,” Aileen says.

“What?! That’s mean!”

“...Sahra, what is that supposed to mean?”

“That’s perfect, though! Let’s all have lunch together!”

Could he have discovered Estella's origins in such a brief span of time?

Isn't that the sort of conclusion he could only have arrived at by working backward, as Aileen had done, based on knowledge he already had? For example, the fact that Estella is the villainess and that she may be part of Ashmael's royal family?

"Why would you do that? Is it something to do with your memories? Have you recalled something about the World Unity sect...or its founder, or the divine maiden?" Roxane asks calmly. She seems to have picked up on the same possibility as Aileen.

Estella hesitates for a moment, then looks up at Roxane. She seems unusually unsure of herself.

"...Is the Daughter of God's body really *still* there?"

It's an entirely unexpected question. Blinking, Roxane responds with a careful question of her own. "What do you mean?"

"I see... In that case, let us go after her."

"I am about to get very cross with you."

The ancient flagstone road is buried under the throng. There’s no way all these people can be students at the Divine Maiden Academy.

“...Are there are outsiders here as well?”

“Apparently. I heard the principal consort and the director talking today. They said that several students are recruiting outsiders.”

So Claude has been diligent about gathering information as well. With a start, Aileen looks back at him. “By the way, Master Claude, how was the director? You did meet, didn’t you?”

“Yes. She was a cheerful woman with beautiful white hair,” Claude says briefly.

Aileen stares at him. "...Pardon? A woman? Th-the director wasn't a young man...?"

If he opened the underground ruin, used the Daughter of God’s body to break the seal on the fiend dragon by pullin’ out the holy sword, and ate that dragon when it resurrected, he’d get his powers as an evil god back. As y’all know, though, the fiend dragon’s gone and become the Holy Dragon Consort. The evil god doesn’t have enough food to revive. He never even woke up.”

Slowly, Aileen draws a breath, then exhales. *Wait. He’s talking about Game 5...isn’t he?*

However, it sounds as if Evare is describing events that should occur in the game beyond this point, and a present in which they’ve already failed to happen.

“The world has a proper shape, a form it should take. That’d be destiny. Human darkness defiles the world, and by takin’ on that darkness, the evil god would end up savin’ the world. That right there was foreshadowin’ that was gonna save the future.”

The Daughter of God, who purifies the world; the Saint of Salvation, who fosters it; the Maid of the Sacred Sword, who opens it up—they’re all gone. Even the enemies that need defeatin’ are gone. The future’s full of nothin’, buried in white ash. If you’re born into a future like that, what do you do? Should you just give up? Even though you did nothin’ wrong?”

Evare raises his head. There’s a twisted smile on his lips. “There’s somebody here who should take responsibility, but it ain’t me. Ain’t that right?”

Everyone in the chapel turns to look at them. Eyes glittering with purpose, they reach out to grab Claude and Aileen. Claude swings his sword without removing it from its sheath, knocking several of their assailants unconscious, but there are too many of them.

“I-is Professor Evare controlling all these people?”

“Probably. I should have caught on sooner.”

Tossing Aileen over his shoulder, Claude kicks the chairs over, retreating into the cleared space. “The school was already under his control. —Baal. Just inside the academy is fine, but take down the barrier!”

The voice is quiet, but it carries well, and everyone freezes.

Since most of the crowd has been blown out of the way, they now have a clear view of the pipe organ, and Evare in front of it. Next to him, Machina stands with her white hood removed. Although she’s as expressionless as ever, she’s twisted Estella’s arm up behind her back and is covering her mouth.

“It’s a real cliché, but I’ve got a hostage. Nobody move. Let’s have you clear those soldiers out, too.”

Aileen and the others glare at him, but Evare shrugs. “Aw, don’t look so scary. What else am I s’posed to do, huh? I’m up against the demon king and the holy king here.”

“Oh-ho. So you do understand that much. For all that, you don’t seem worried.”

you. Only direct female descendants of Ashmael's royal family can open that. If there's another way to do it, we'd like to know it ourselves."

"I guess seein's believin', then."

Evare grabs Estella's arm. The girl winces, and Aileen shouts at him, "Don't hurt her!"

"Hey, it's fine. If it don't work, it don't. It'll be my fault, too, for just followin' the stories and not checkin' her face properly. I had no idea you'd end up bein' such a key person, though."

Evare's claim that the villainess is not a key person shows he really has no knowledge of the game.

In that case, why does he have his suspicions about Estella's bloodline? Ignoring Aileen's glare, Evare goes on in a laid-back way. "There wasn't time, and most of all, that prince kept his guard up tight. You're so loved."

"What...are you talking about? What prince...?" Estella asks faintly, glaring at Evare.

Evare just keeps talking. For some reason, he turns to the pipe organ and begins removing the keyboard. "It looks like this era is where it all starts. I can't go back any further. The Queendom of Hausel's only just broken up, so I figured it'd work out somehow, but even Mother's spare didn't stick around. I misread that one bad. On top of that, although Lilia Reinoise would've been a sure thing, she got locked up in Ellmeyer."

"Was that barrier over Ellmeyer your doing?" Claude asks in a low, irritated voice.

Evare smiles brightly. "What're you talkin' 'bout? Your son did that."

He isn't even trying to hide the fact that he knows Charles.

"It's always possible that you made him do it."

"Egged him on, you mean? C'mon, don't talk like that; what will people think? That boy's still a kid, but he's smart. Now then..."

Evare steps back. The pipe organ begins to play on its own, swinging open from the center to reveal a smooth, jet-black door that reaches all the way to

the ceiling.

“Master Baal, is that the door to the underground ruin?”

“That’s right. The door to the holy sarcophagus. It won’t open, though. It’s impossible.” There’s a stern look on Baal’s face.

Grabbing Estella’s wrist, Evare pulls her over to stand in front of the door, which has no handle. “Lessee if this thing opens or not.”

"...Yes. Thank you...very much."

"The thought that my son is the one who's doing it pains me, but yes, it's similar."

Estella gives another little laugh. The traces of her tears are still there, but her cheeks are dry now.

"You've come this far, so see it through to the end."

"I will."

"...All right. It looks as if we've arrived."

The lantern illuminates the foot of the stairs.

The depths of the room are pitch-black. They're standing properly, but they can't even see the floor. With each step they take, ripples spread as if they've set foot in a puddle, but that's all.

"I'd imagine so. I recognize it as well."

*“Change the past and defeat the corrupt dragon. Then create the proper future—using the sacred sword.”*

“Now that it’s tangled up this bad, we’ve gotta regroup. We’ve gotta make this place into the future.”

“Do you mean the stage of Game 6?”

“Six? What’s that?”

“The evil god is a god who takes on human malice. If he’s defeated, then that malice won’t have anywhere to go. If the demon king is born into a situation like that, he’ll become a demon that puts the fiend dragon to shame and completely rot the world. That means we need to purify both the evil god and the world and start over—at least, that’s what the first Daughter of God said in 5, when she snapped and went off the rails. There’s no way that wasn’t foreshadowing for 6.”

What skims through Luciel's mind just then is Claude, and one other. The boy who's just like Claude and himself.

"I didn't get most of that, but if you're talkin' 'bout the corrupt dragon, that's right."

"That must be the final boss of 6, then. Yes, I see. Most of the pieces have come together. By the way, there's something I told myself I'd do if I ever got a little brother."

"What's that, hmm? If you're gonna be on my team from here on out, I'd like to hear it."

"Little brothers must submit to their big sisters completely."

Evare freezes up, the polite smile still on his face.

Lilia gives a thin smile of her own. "What did you expect? I refuse to be your mother figure." She crouches low, then launches herself off the floor.

Evare grimaces. "What's this? You ain't got a sacred sword now. You wanna die?"

"Heh-heh. Don't make me laugh. You call a thing like that a Maid of the Sacred Sword?"

The wine they intentionally spilled on him has left a stain that won't come out. The lace handkerchief she made for him is submerged in muddy water.

*I could have given you a different future, and yet—*

His back as he faces a canvas behind the bars of the West Tower, charcoal in hand.

*“What are you drawing?”*

*“It’s a secret,” he says with a laugh, and what he’s drawing is...*

In the game, it hadn’t been a picture like that. Is that good fortune or bad?

Her eyes are so hot, they feel like they’re on fire. It hurts. Everything’s being sluiced away. She has to see it, though.

The future Lilia Reinoise has ruined.



When he opens his eyes, the face he often sees in dreams is right there, and it leaves him so stunned, he can’t move.

*“Are you awake, Master Charles?”*

Her voice is impassive. This is no dream.

*“Woman— Why are you he—?!”*

He starts to bolt up but realizes while he’s in motion that it’s going to bring their faces closer together. In an attempt to avoid that, he twists his upper body and ends up rolling off the couch and onto the floor.

Estella, who’s seated on the carpeted floor, tilts her head. The tips of her pale-gold shimmering hair sway at the level of her lovely chin. *It’s grown out a little*, he thinks.

She chopped that hair off when she’d gotten engaged to him.

*“What are you doing?”*

*“...Sh-shut up! Y-you were too...close... Actually, why are you even here?!”*

Our little brother isn't just a princess; he's a nation-toppling beauty!"* Then they'd forced the reluctant Charles to dress as a girl and marched him around, plunging the capital into chaos as everyone wondered who the beautiful princess was. His father scolded everyone, telling them to *"Do anything but that,"* but Charles didn't feel particularly grateful. His father was sympathetic only because he had the same problem.

"Master Charles, do you want to be taller?"

"Of course I do."

*It's obviously better if I'm taller than you, the girl I like.*

*As if I could say that!*

Canceling out a remark his father would probably have made without a blush, Charles gets to his feet. “Who cares about that? And Machina’s...still asleep, huh?”

Unless Machina wakes up, he can’t send Estella back to the future. He can’t do anything else until that’s done. He wants to settle this fast, but...

“...Um. What sort of person is Lady Machina?”

Charles is standing by the bed, looking down at Machina, and Estella’s strangely hesitant question makes him blink. “What sort of...? All I know is that Evare brought her from the future. We’ve never said more than a word or two to each other.”

“What did you talk about?”

“Huh? Um, well, I greeted her and stuff? ...I also asked why she was doing what Evare said.”

Tossing the spoon into the empty glass, Claude rises to his feet. “It sounds as if Father is back, although he’s badly weakened. I’d like to ask him where he’s been and what he’s seen, then plan accordingly...but it looks as if we won’t have time.”

As Claude starts to follow him, Aileen shouts at him accusingly. “Master Claude! Do you seriously intend to leave me behind?!”

“Staying home once in a while will make for a nice change of pace, won’t it? You’ll finally know how I feel.” Claude’s smile hasn’t faltered even slightly.

Smiling in spite of herself, Aileen issues a low declaration. “—If you leave me behind, I promise you’ll regret it.”

“Charles really does take after you.”

With that parting shot, Claude winks out of sight with Baal.

Aileen immediately turns to Estella. “You can teleport from here to the floating palace, can’t you?”

“What? —Well, yes. But Father and Master Claude both said to stay here...”

“No, that’s no good. We have to go after them quickly. Our opponents have the sacred sword.”

Turning in the direction of the voice, Aileen sees Luciel, who looks as if even walking is hard, and Serena, who’s supporting him. Behind them is Machina, as expressionless as ever.

“Lady Lilia?! Why? She’s in Ellmeyer—or no, of course she wouldn’t be, not

under the circumstances.”

Aileen can just picture Lilia rampaging around to her heart’s content, giddy over the arrival of the sequel. Just thinking about it is exhausting.

“Am I to assume that she saved you and slipped out through Charles’s barrier with you, Master Luciel?” Aileen gives him a half-hearted glare.

“No. She said Hausel’s floating palace had to be around somewhere, and when we went to investigate, it was the enemy camp.”

“In other words, you charged the enemy camp.”

No doubt she used her game knowledge to guess where it would be. Just



talking about it makes Aileen feel weary.

Luciel frowns, looking concerned. "Lilia acted as a decoy to let the two of us escape. Evare said he'd make her the next queen, so... If he's fiddled with her memories, she may be under his control."

"What?!" Sahra turns pale. "Th-that's awful. Lilia... No...!"

"Sahra, calm down."

"But, Roxane! Lilia doesn't have the sacred sword anymore!"

Serena seems to have a few thoughts on that as well; a shadow falls over her expression.

Luciel continues, "It may be best to consider Grace an enemy, too. She stabbed me with the sacred sword."

"Lady Grace stabbed you, Master Luciel? With her own sacred sword?" Aileen frowns.

Luciel nods, hanging his head. "Technically, it was probably Lucia's, but... She did stab me. She didn't seem to recognize me."

Folding her arms over her chest, Aileen gives a long sigh. "...I see. It looks as if I really will have to go myself. Estella, will you take me?"

"But won't Emperor Claude be angry?" Estella gives her a worried frown.

"Gracious." The corners of Aileen's lips curve up. "Master Claude isn't petty enough to hold a grudge over a little thing like this."

"You're the reason the imperial castle gets those extremely localized blizzards all the time, aren't you? It's a total nuisance."

"That's a different matter! This is something else entirely!" Refusing to even entertain Serena's complaint, she gets a better grip on the holy sword. Against the sacred sword, the demon king and the god of demons don't stand a chance. That is one of the cardinal rules of this world. "It is my duty to handle the things that he can't."

Luciel, who's standing without help from Serena now, nods. "I'll take you, then. She's restored enough of my power that I can teleport, and if it comes to

that, I can turn into the divine dragon and fight Evare.”

“Thank you, Father, please do. And then—”

Machina steps forward soundlessly. Aileen blinks. “Do you wish to come as well?”

The girl nods. Her eyes are as hollow as ever, but they’re focused. Estella is gazing at her steadily, and Aileen speaks to her again. “What will you do, Estella?”

Estella looks shocked. “I-is that true? And that’s how the demon king became emperor...?!”

“I thought Master Claude would be a good ruler, of course, but I also felt as if he needed to take the throne. If he was going to win happiness both as the demon king and a human, it was a necessary means toward the end.”

And so she didn’t hesitate, and she has no regrets.

Shrugging, Serena looks in the direction of Ellmeyer. “I know of a woman who went along with a man whose mind and stance were already made up, too, though.”

“Oh, Isaac! Yes, the way he’s devoted to his work is rather dashing, isn’t it?!”

“In what way? That guy’s definitely no good, and he won’t make her happy!”  
Serena yells.

“Wha—? Huh...?”

“And actually, who is this girl anyway?!”

Sahra beckons Serena over and murmurs something in her ear. She’s probably explaining Estella’s origins.

“I would like Master Baal to stay holy king as well.”

“Mother...,” Estella calls to Lady Roxane in a thin voice. Apparently, she does allow herself to be a little weak in front of her.

“I don’t know what it is that Master Charles wants. However, I once failed to notice the hand Master Baal extended to me. With help from Lady Aileen, I made it in time, but... I don’t want you to have those regrets.”

Softly stroking Estella’s cheek, Roxane continues, “If you’d like to go, then go. In the first place, you did not come here to help us. Isn’t that right?”

Estella came to take Charles back home. Her eyes are still a little hesitant, but after a slight pause, she nods. “All right. In that case, Lady Aileen and Master Luciel, I’ll take you to the floating palace. And, er—you as well, Lady Machina.”

Abruptly, Machina pivots to face Estella.

Everyone flinches. They watch as Machina pats Estella lightly on the head, then pivots away again.

“Um...?”

Estella is bewildered, but just then, a flash of searing light dyes their surroundings pure white. Its source is the floating palace. There's no time to hesitate. "Hurry, Estella."

"I know. Over here, all of you."

"Wait, I've got a message from that woman." As Estella's sacred power builds, Serena announces brusquely, "She says, 'Go easy on me.'"

Aileen tucks her chin, smiling. "You must be joking. I'm going to flatten her."

Particles of light surround her. As her vision thins, she sees Serena shrug and Sahra give a tense smile.

They melt away, and the next thing she sees is the floating palace—from much higher up in the sky.

"I seem to end up in this situation far too frequently!!" Aileen screams as she falls.

Estella is flustered. "I-I'm sorry! The palace has something like a magnetic field around it, and it destabilized my teleportation!"

"N-now, now, Aileen. I'll get us all down there safely, so— Claude?!"

As Luciel screams, Aileen's eyes flick in that direction, and she tightens her grip on the holy sword. Her body registers what she's seen before her mind does. She doesn't hesitate. She doesn't even think, *Why?*

A girl is attempting to run a holy sword into Claude's chest, and Aileen cuts in from the side, slashing at her.

Pulling her blade away from Claude, the girl turns gracefully in midair. Then with a smile, she alights on the rubble of the floating palace. "Good day, Lady Aileen."

"Good day, Lady Lilia."

Lilia is holding a shining holy sword. Standing in front of Claude, squarely in her path, Aileen smiles back at her.

Barring her way and protecting Claude—those roles should always be hers.

"It's no use, Lady Aileen. I really do need to slay the demon king."

“Mm, yes. That’s what I thought you’d say.”

“Well, I mean, I am the Maid of the Sacred Sword.”

This woman is the enemy. She always has been, and she always will be.



Charles glances at Claude and Baal, who’ve teleported after him. “Coming along is fine, but stay out of my way.”

“If you brush me off coldly like that, I may accidentally shout the name of the girl you like.”

“Die right this minute!” Charles snaps back instantly, flushing bright red.

Baal puts a hand next to his lips, screening them as if he’s telling secrets, but his voice definitely isn’t quiet. “Did you see that? The boy could just have teleported, but he flew away like he was showing off.”

“It was probably because that looks more impressive.”

“I see. So he’s at the age when he’s more concerned about appearance than anything else... We understand, mm-hmm, yes.”

“That wasn’t— You know that wasn’t it! The floating castle is made of divine stones and tends to warp magic in weird ways. Teleporting here is dangerous!”

He puts one hand to his chest and gives an exaggerated bow, like a theater usher. "Welcome. Glad you could make it. Well, this is the crowd I figured I'd get. The holy king and the demon king. You'd be enough of a headache on your own, and now you've brought along a prince who's real close to Luciel in his prime."

"Evare, you've found the Maid of the Sacred Sword. That means you have no more business with this era." Charles steps forward; his voice is clear and carrying. "I won't run or hide. I'll keep my promise, so you keep yours. Surrender the floating palace and leave this age alone."

"Comin' from a boy prince, that ain't real convincin'. What do the demon king and the holy king say?"

"Huh?" Evare gives them a dim-witted look.

"I also explained about the corrupt dragon, and what's going to happen to me after this. On that understanding, if you surrender the floating palace and go home, they've promised not to pursue you any further."

"...Nah, nah, nah, nah! Even if you explained, there's no way they'd let you. That guy's obviously gonna stop his son!"

"Neither my father nor the demon king would risk their countries or the future for a stupid thing like that." Charles is dignified. Behind him, Baal sighs, and Claude shrugs. Neither of them denies it.

Evare looks appalled. "Is this for real...? Family should be hell-bent on shuttin'

this down.”

“I haven’t told my wife. She probably wouldn’t allow it,” Claude admits.

Baal crosses his arms. “The same goes for us. There are some things it’s best not to know. Especially for our daughter.”

“Oh, I see. So you’re doin’ your duty as leaders of your nations, huh?” Evare sounds disgusted. Then he gives Charles a pitying look. “Well, that’s a shock. The holy king, the demon king, and the demon king’s son. I wasn’t sure I could call any of you human, but I take it back. You’re human, all right. Leavin’ your son to die for the sake of a formless thing like a country is somethin’ only humans would think up.”

“...It’s not really like that,” Claude murmurs, but nobody hears him.

Instead, with perfect composure, Charles says to Evare, “Withdraw. Do it, or I’ll get rid of both you and the floating palace.”

“Here’s the thing: I can’t. See, I’m well aware I’m bein’ reckless.” Setting his hands on the railing of the ruined balcony, Evare gives a wry smile, but the eyes that gleam behind his spectacles aren’t smiling at all. “I’m bettin’ my future on this, too. I can’t back down.”

“Fine. I’ll kill you and drop the floating palace out of the sky.” Charles speaks calmly, as if he’s simply stating a fact.

Evare takes his hands off the railing. “Oooh, scary. But listen.” Gazing steadily at each of their faces, he smiles. “Did you people forget there’s no way you can beat the Maid of the Sacred Sword?”

As he spreads his arms wide, a figure darts out from behind him. Claude frowns. *Lilia Reinoise!*

He doesn’t know why, but Lilia Reinoise is attacking them with a holy sword.

Baal shouts, “Hey, isn’t that the former Maid of the Sacred Sword?! Did you plan this?!”

“No, Evare’s controlling her!” Charles tells them.

Evare laughs scornfully. “C’mon, don’t say it like that. What’ll people think? I made her come ’round, that’s all.”



“She no longer has the sacred sword, though.”

“What’re you sayin’, Demon King? Even if she’s a former one, that’s the Maid of the Sacred Sword, and she’s armed real well.”

As if to back up Evare’s warning, Lilia’s holy sword gouges up a spray of dirt. A regular holy sword wouldn’t have this much power.

“I think the match might be over before you even get out there, Lucia.”

While their attention was elsewhere, a girl who looks just like Grace has come to stand at Evare’s side.

Claude and the others flee into the sky, pursued by the holy sword. Repelling it with a barrier that has both sacred power and magic worked into it, Charles yells, “We’ll fight her later; take the palace down first. There’s no time!”

“Gracious, demon king’s son, you mustn’t get distracted.” Lilia’s holy sword stretches like a whip, tangles around Charles’s ankle, and dashes the startled boy to the ground.

“Charles!”

“You too, Demon King.” No sooner has he heard her voice than the holy sword attacks him from above. Turning, Claude parries her attack with a holy sword he’s quietly brought with him.

A blast wind rages right in his face, but Charles is behind him. He can’t retreat any farther.

*She’s strong. She can’t have been training, and yet...*

So this is the Maid of the Sacred Sword. The thought that his wife faced something like this makes a shudder run through him.

“You know, I think this may be the first time we’ve fought, Demon King.”

Their magic clashes right in front of him, crackling. The girl seems to be enjoying herself immensely, and Claude frowns softly. “...Cedric’s going to cry.”

He is aware that this is technically his sister-in-law.

When Lilia hears that, she laughs. “You’re pretty composed, Demon King. You’re up against the Maid of the Sacred Sword, you know.”

“You no longer have the sacred sword.”

In fact, the weapon in Lilia’s hands is a holy sword. He’s wary, but since magic will work on it, it isn’t a threat. The sacred sword would’ve erased Claude’s magic instantly.

“You’re certainly coolheaded enough. Unfortunately for you, though, there couldn’t possibly be a game where the Maid of the Sacred Sword loses to the demon king. Especially not if he’s a final boss.”

“Now do you see your error in leaving me behind, Master Claude?” Aileen asks, half in jest.

Behind her, Claude seems to be smiling wryly. “Mm, yes. I have always made a point of not interfering in fights between women, and yet...”

“So what are we callin’ this? The Maid of the Sacred Sword versus the Maid of the Cursed Sword? What a pain in the ass...”

Evare is looking down at them from the crumbling balcony. He has an index finger to his temple, and he seems to consider himself a disinterested spectator. Aileen gives a contemptuous snort. “The Maid of the Sacred Sword? Her?”

Lilia cocks her head. Her enigmatic smile is the same as ever, but her violet eyes are just a little unfocused. “I *am* the Maid of the Sacred Sword. Tell me you’re not underestimating me just because this is a holy sword, Lady Aileen.”

“You heard her. She may be the old model, but she can draw power that’s a lot like the sacred sword out of the holy sword. I’d expect no less from her.”

“The old model, hmm? I sense no respect for previous installments... Or I suspect that is what Lady Lilia would say, but—”

“I don’t have a sacred sword anymore, so there isn’t much that can be done.”

The woman’s learned to say some very admirable things indeed. With a snort, Aileen spins the holy sword one-handed, switching to a different grip. “Well, that’s fine. Why tell you when I can just show you? We’re both armed with holy swords, so let’s see which of us is better, once and for all.”

“Oh, nothing. It’s just...if I beat you here, I’ll be able to make Cedric emperor.”

Aileen frowns, and Lilia’s smile abruptly disappears. Her eyes focus on Aileen’s in earnest. “I want to protect him. Even a little. Even if I’m starting late. If I can make it in time.”

“You mean you regret it? Now, this late in the game, you—”

“I’m going to make him happy. And so...”

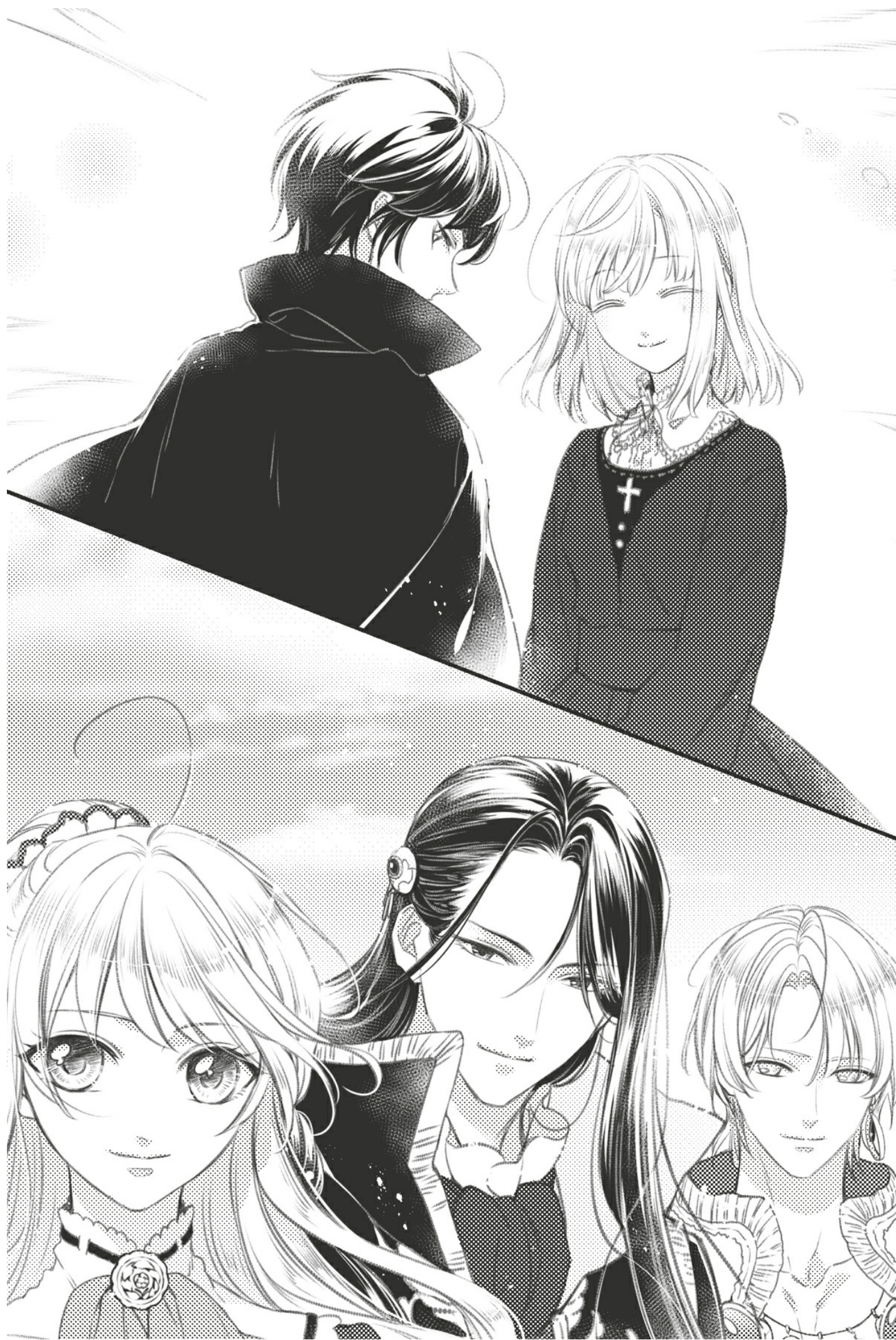
