When the "image colors" of each character are well-balanced, it helps accentuate each cast member's charms—or that's what I, Araki, believe anyway.

When red, blue, and yellow are lined up together, the results are fetching and catch the eye. Each color helps to bring out the best in the others. When the easily riled Earnest is put together with the chill Sophie, it helps break out and emphasize both of their personalities. Add the yellow, boisterous Cú, and the green, easy-going Iona, and everything only gets better, much like the four colors in the Windows flag.

We'll continue assigning image colors to each character going forward in *Classroom for Heroes*. If we ever have a chance to hold a public celebration or something for this series, be sure to bring the right glowstick color for your favorite character.

Incidentally, after three volumes, *Classroom for Heroes* has been getting some very good reviews. As the author, it's a big load off my mind. I promise I'm not

wearing a smug smile over here, though. I've put on a stern frown, like a mountain ascetic.

For now, I'm producing volumes on a four-month cycle. Volume 4 should hit stores in early 2016, and there's a chance it'll have a different vibe from the first three. Maybe. Each volume so far has consisted of three chapters, but the next one will have a section jam-packed with various short stories followed by a Sophie-centric episode.

Also, on September 18, 2016—a week before Volume 3 comes out —*Classroom for Heroes: Empress of Flame* will go on sale in Japan. This is a manga adaptation by Takashi Minakuchi, and the first chapter will tell Earnest's story from her perspective, so I think it'll offer something refreshingly different from the novels.

Changing the subject a little, the light novel industry is being taken over by a wave of webnovels lately.

There's a website called *Shousetsuka ni Narou*, or "Let's Become a Novelist," and a lot of the series posted on there are receiving traditional publications and turning into big hits. I, too, have some novel series running on that site—*C-Mart Prospering in Another World*, and one more as of August 2015. *Stardust Hero Chronicles*, one of my more popular early works, is already being published by Dengeki Bunko/Pony Canyon Books in Japan, and another book launch is in the works. *C-Mart*, too, is slated to get published under the Dash X Bunko label, so be on the lookout for that one as well.
