Former leader of 11th Ward who was in love with Rize. Weak. Part of Kaneki's group.


#### MISATO GORI

"Oh, I'm ... I'm fine. I'm sorry, I didn't warn you in time."


The ground around her was littered with things she had been carrying. There were even some cupcakes lying there. Seeing this, Koharu rushed to pick them up.

Behind her, she heard the detective mutter to himself, presumably thinking he wouldn't be overheard. "Guess this case still isn't over ..."




"Every old lady was young once, you know."


Yomo finally turned to look at Hinami, who was now hiding her face. But he said nothing. Perhaps he wanted to say something, but the words wouldn't come.
