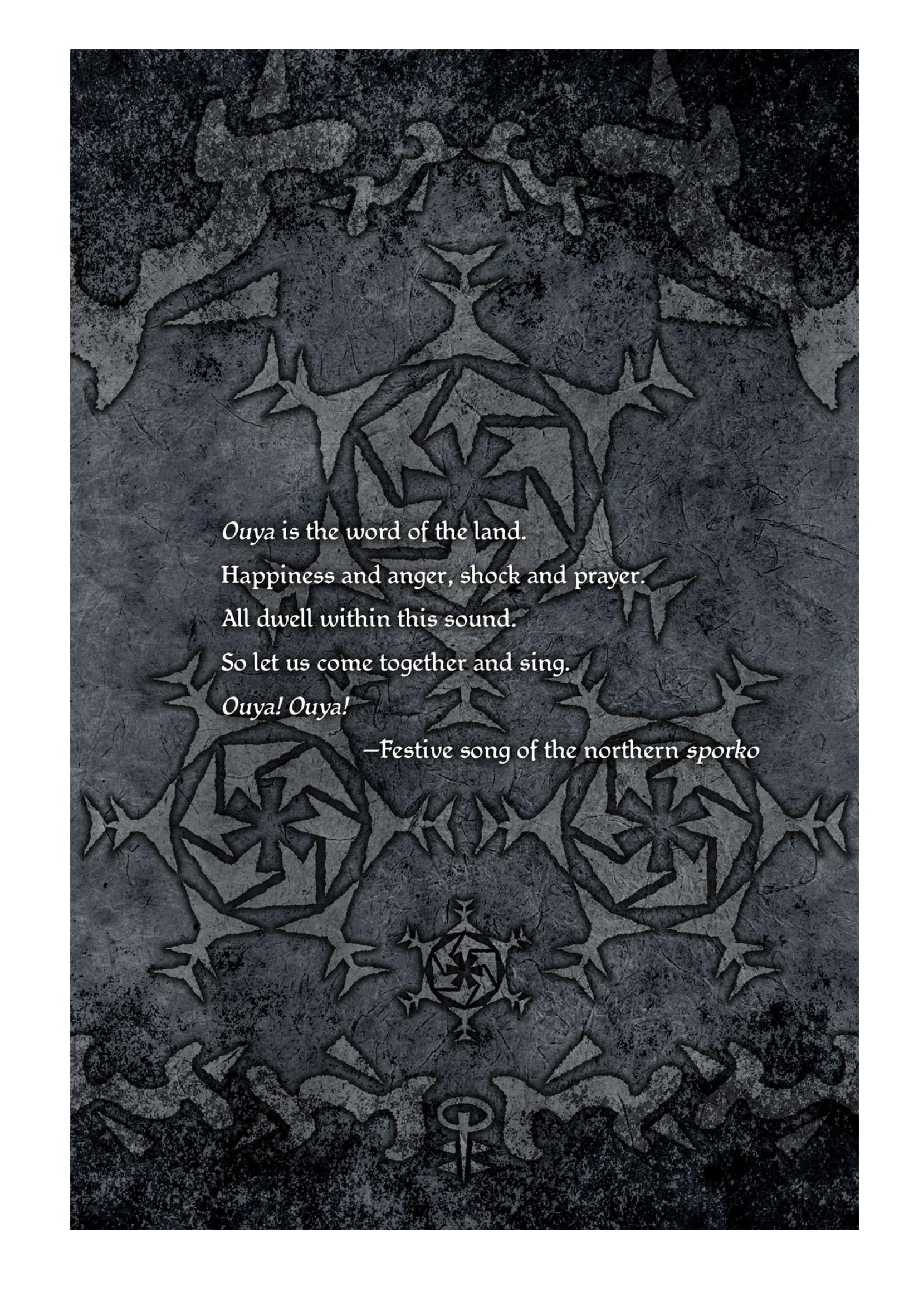

“Look, Bisco! Those must be blood cells!”

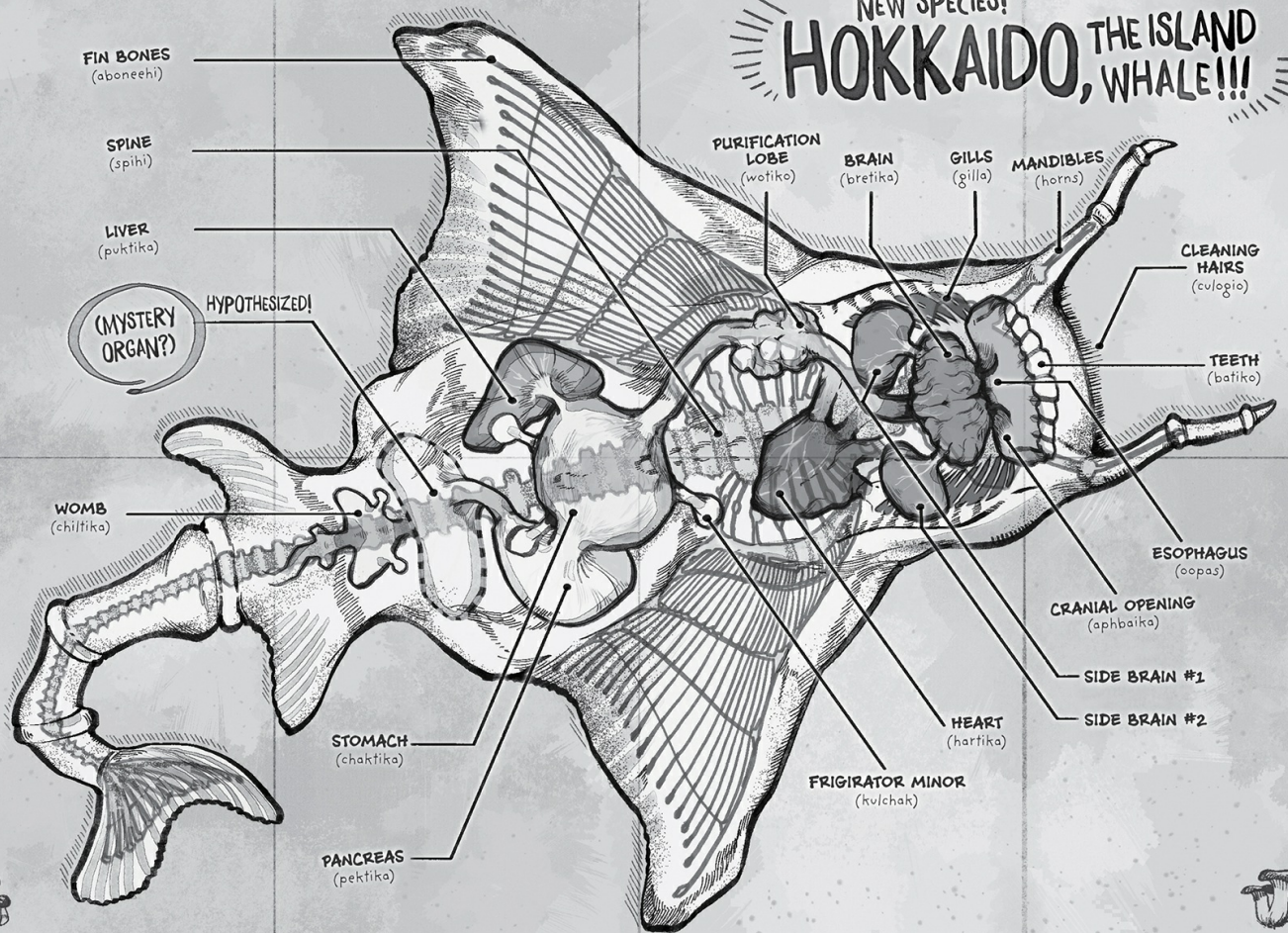
Milo snatched one of the floating balls and examined it with excitement. He squeezed it, rubbed it, and shook it, just like a hamster playing with a new toy.

“Aaagh!”

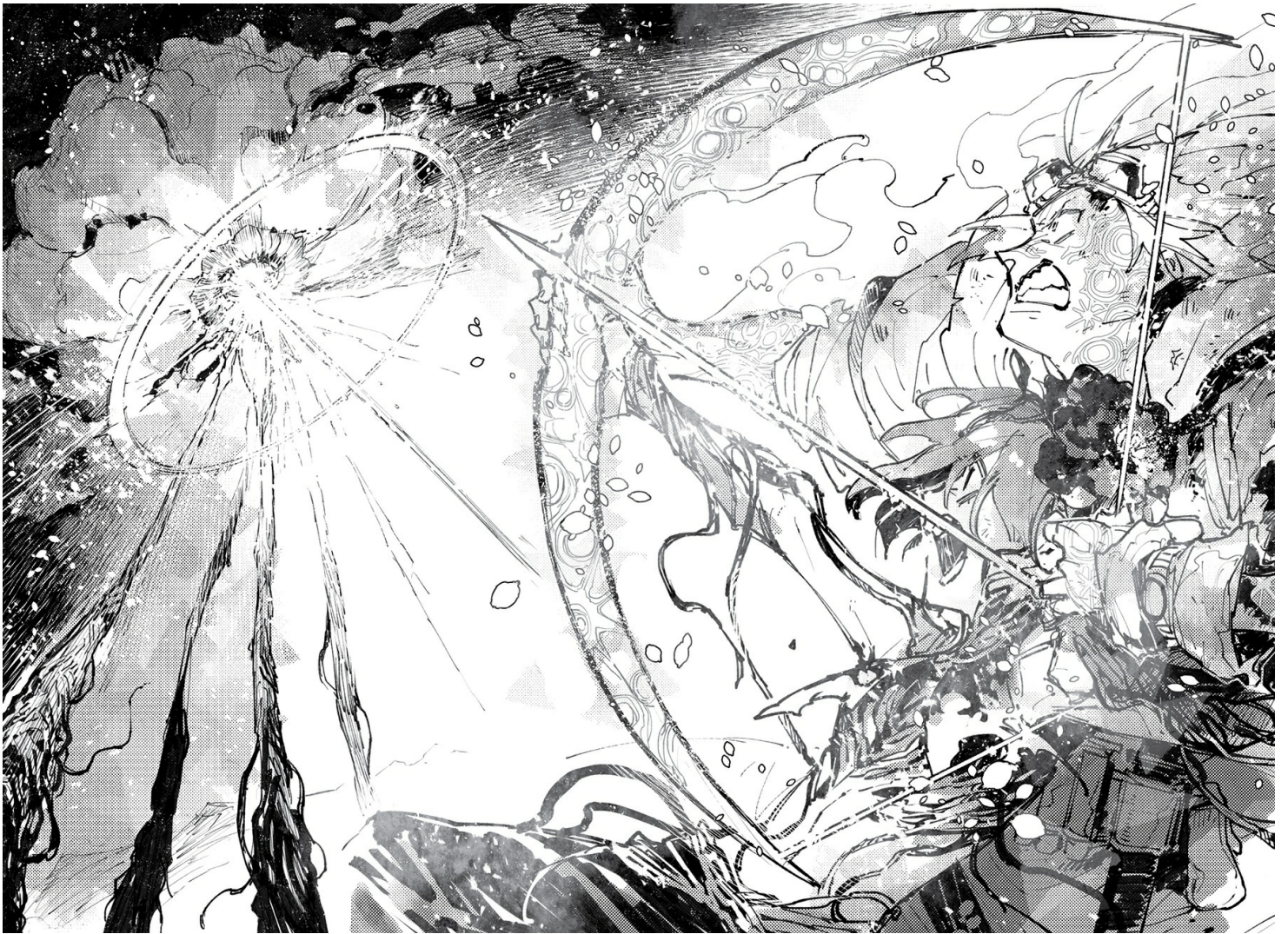

From the moment I popped into this world, I've been (almost) exclusively a Saitama kid. But lately, my hometown has grown rather busy, mostly due to the new railway line that opened up nearby.

Apartment blocks have been cropping up in places that were once nothing but fields, and in front of the station there are gigantic malls and buildings I don't even know the purpose of. It's a far cry from the town I used to know. In fact, if I were to show what the place looked like to my old elementary school student self, he probably wouldn't recognize it at all.

Developments bring money into the region, which are funneled into more developments... I suppose, from the viewpoint of Saitama's finances, I ought to be happy.

But I wonder what Saitama itself thinks of all this?

Let's say, for example, that I were Saitama. I should think I would be quite angry, and probably react along the lines of: "Hey, who the hell do you think you are? Get your damn buildings off my back!!"

And if that happened, there would be no more to say. After all, I (Saitama) could simply roll over onto my back and bring the entire urban development scheme to a catastrophic end. All the residents would be left without warmth or shelter, with no recourse but to build temples and shrines to me (Saitama) in the hopes of quelling my anger.

Humans feel as though they have conquered the land, but that is not the case. The land merely lets us live here, and we would do well to remember that.

It was about one part this reverent image and nine parts "Wouldn't it be cool if Hokkaido was actually alive?" that inspired this fifth volume.

Well, I've already filled half the page with my grumbling, so to return to the

book, the primary theme, in this author's humble opinion, was "searching for a way of life."

So far, the series villains have all embraced the darkness from start to finish, but Shishi is constantly doubting her own path, searching for her own soul. She's a conflicted, more true-to-life villain who wants to do the right thing, and when she consequently strays from her own path, Bisco, our hero, takes responsibility (in his own way) and allows her to start over.

Choosing your own path, which Bisco describes as "blooming," is not as easy a thing to do as Bisco makes it sound. Without the benefit of hindsight, it is very often impossible to know whether your choice is the correct one.

When you bloom in a certain direction, with all your heart, and it just doesn't work out, that can be greatly disheartening. And I think it's at times like those that Bisco says to bloom again, facing the sun this time.

For me, it was only after a few "rebloomings" that I came to write *Sabikui Bisco*. If a flower cries because it blooms in the darkness, one choice may be to try blooming somewhere else.

And there would be no greater pleasure for myself as an author if the words and actions of those in this volume inspire any of my readers.

Now, as I have filled the page, I shall say good-bye. Well then, until next time.
