Rose Valencia

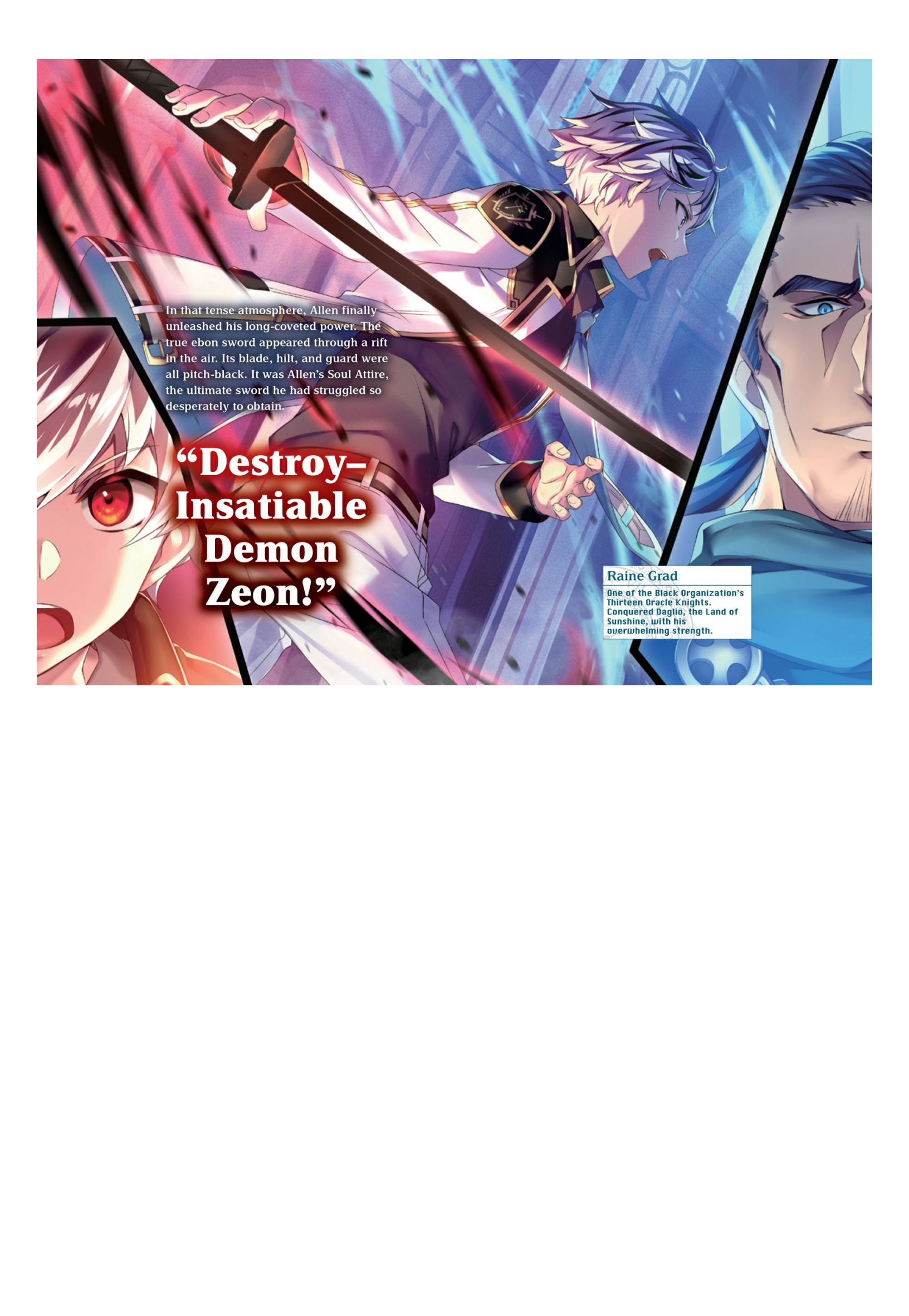
The sole inheritor of the Cherry Blossom Blade School of Swordcraft. She is recommended to become a senior holy knight special trainee alongside Allen.
