May we meet again in volume 3.

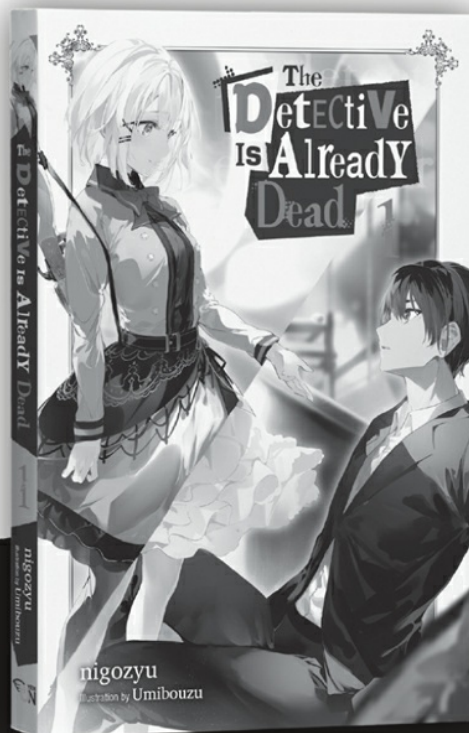


The Detective Is Already Dead
