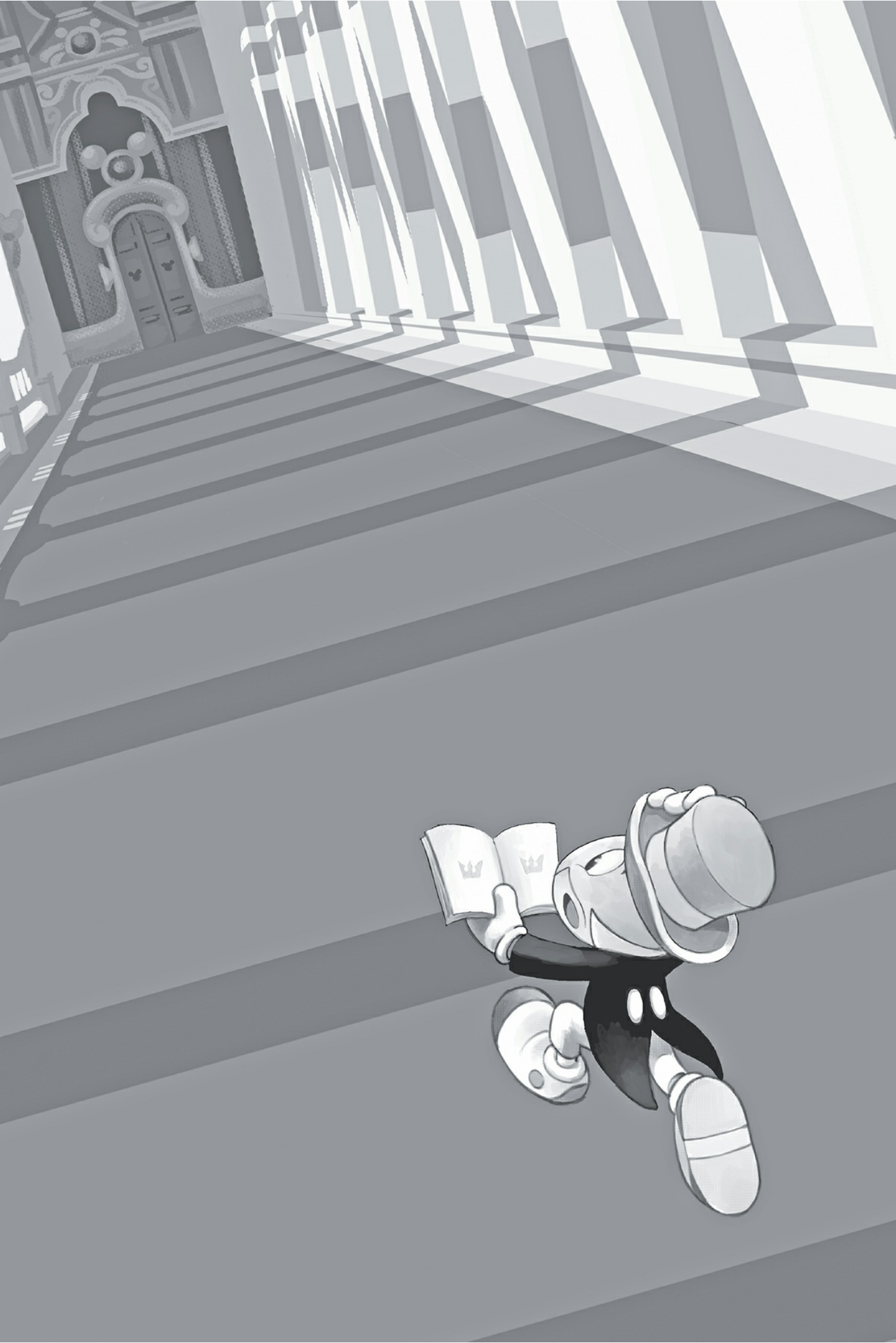

“All right, then. I’ll try asking around!” Sora replied. He spotted Selphie a ways up the beach and ran over to her.

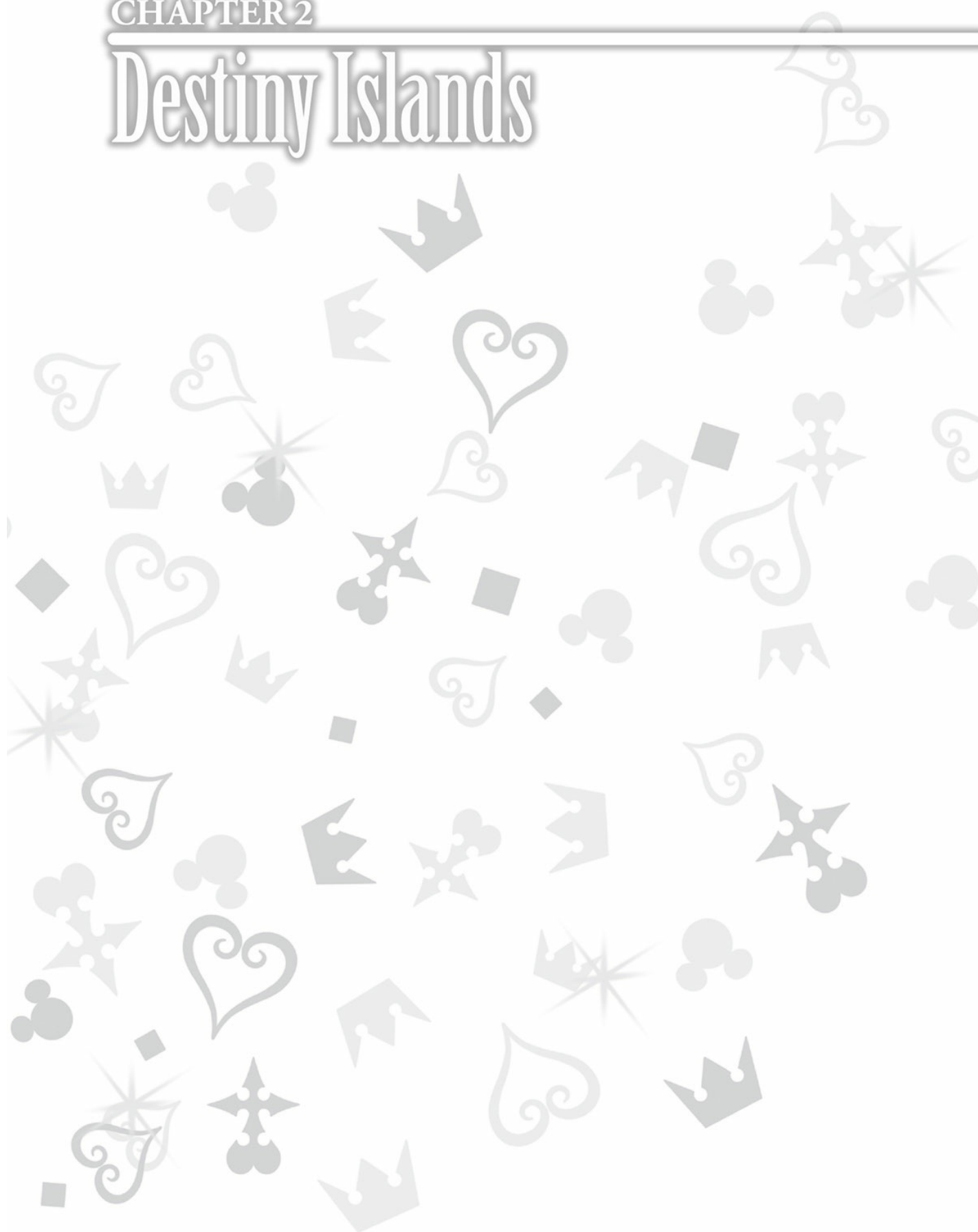
As the boy went, Mickey spoke to him, full of hope:

“But we gotta do something about the castle!” Donald pleaded.

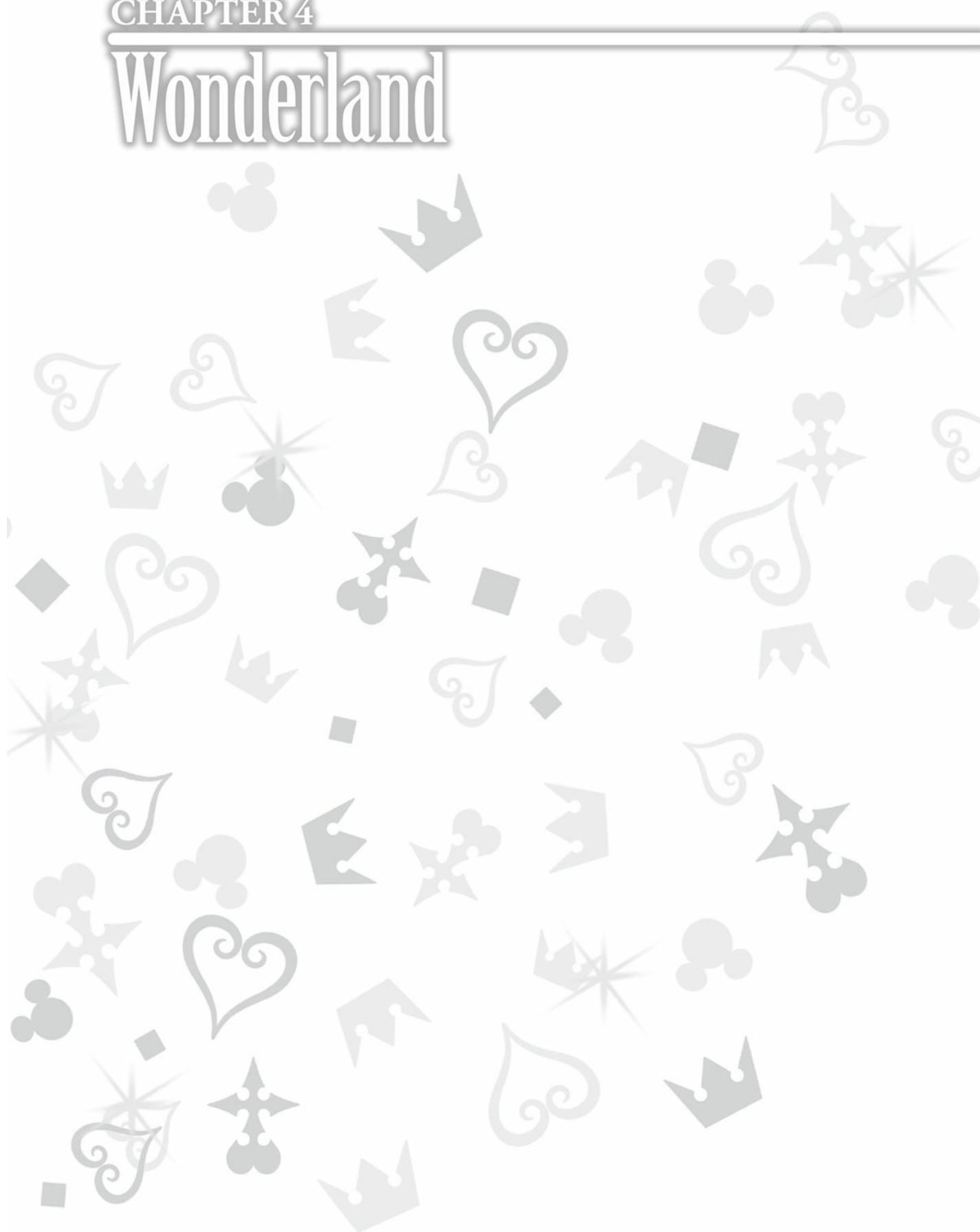
“I’m as worried as you are, Donald, but right now our best hope is fixing up the journal.”

With that, Pete turned away from Sora and trotted off into a mysterious space swirling with an odd white light.

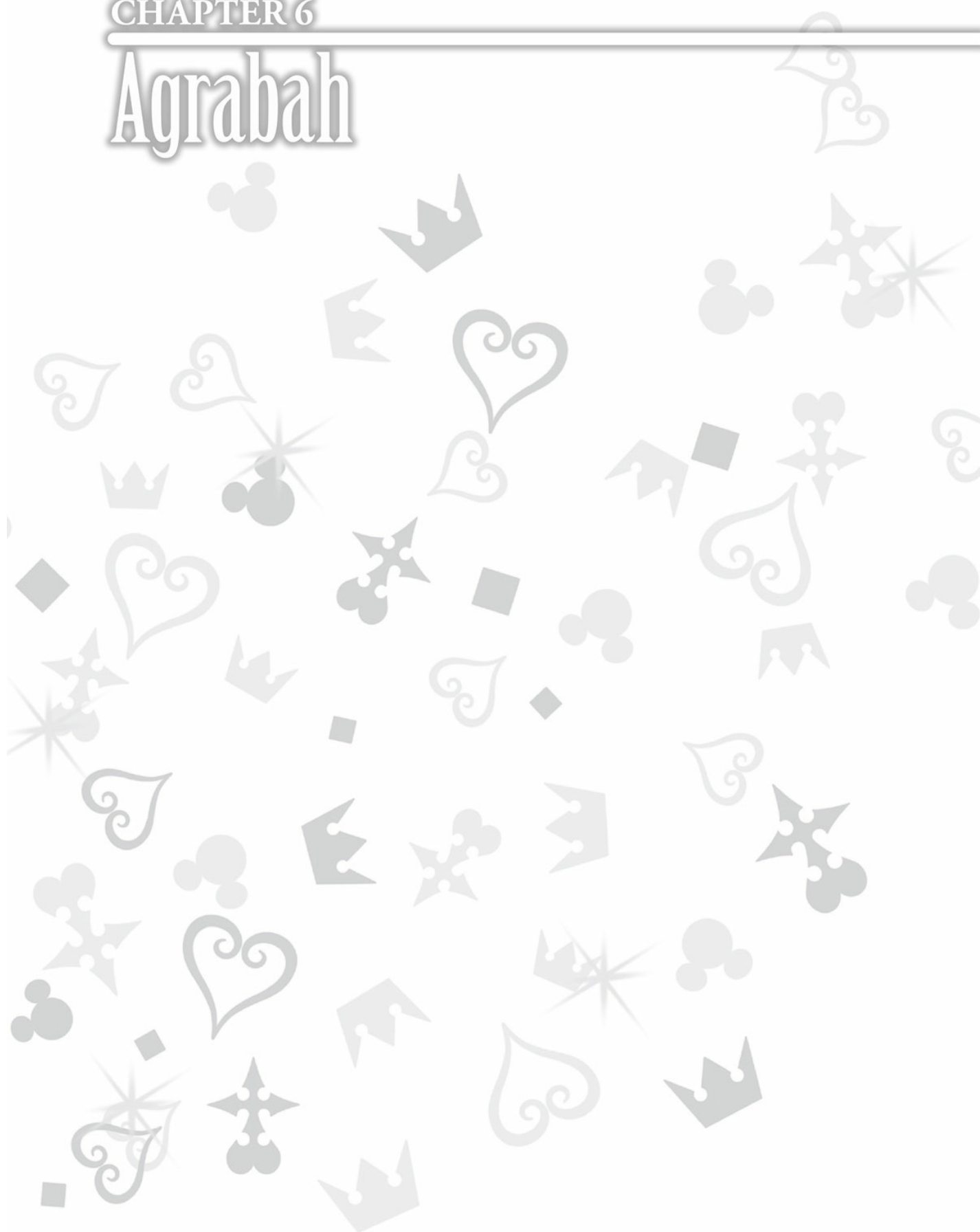
"He must be up to something. Quick! After him!" Mickey called.

*I don't get it, but I can still feel the connection.*

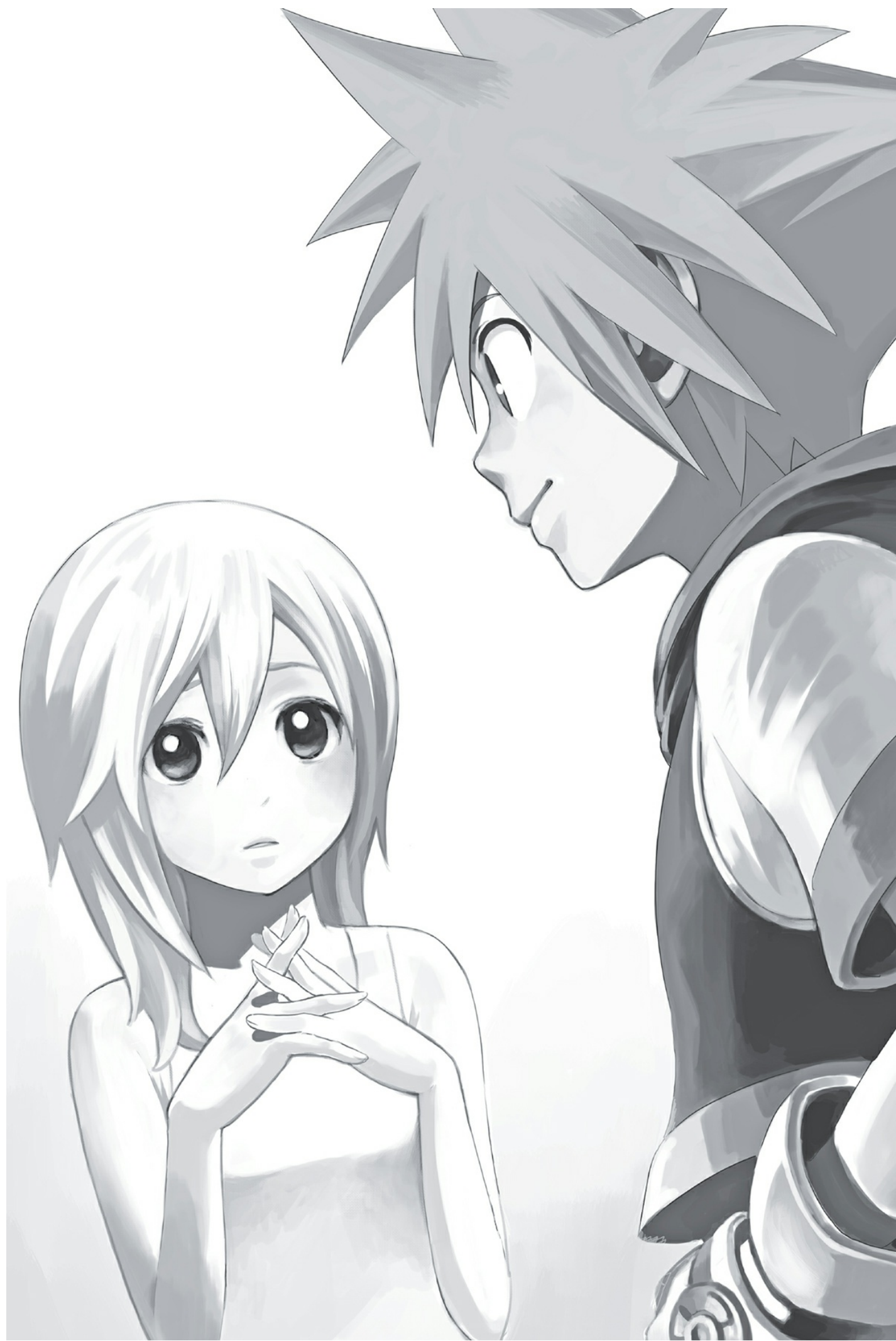


“Naminé. You said Sora has to call these memories to the surface. Is it time?” Mickey asked. It was possible that he, too, knew something about the trio.
