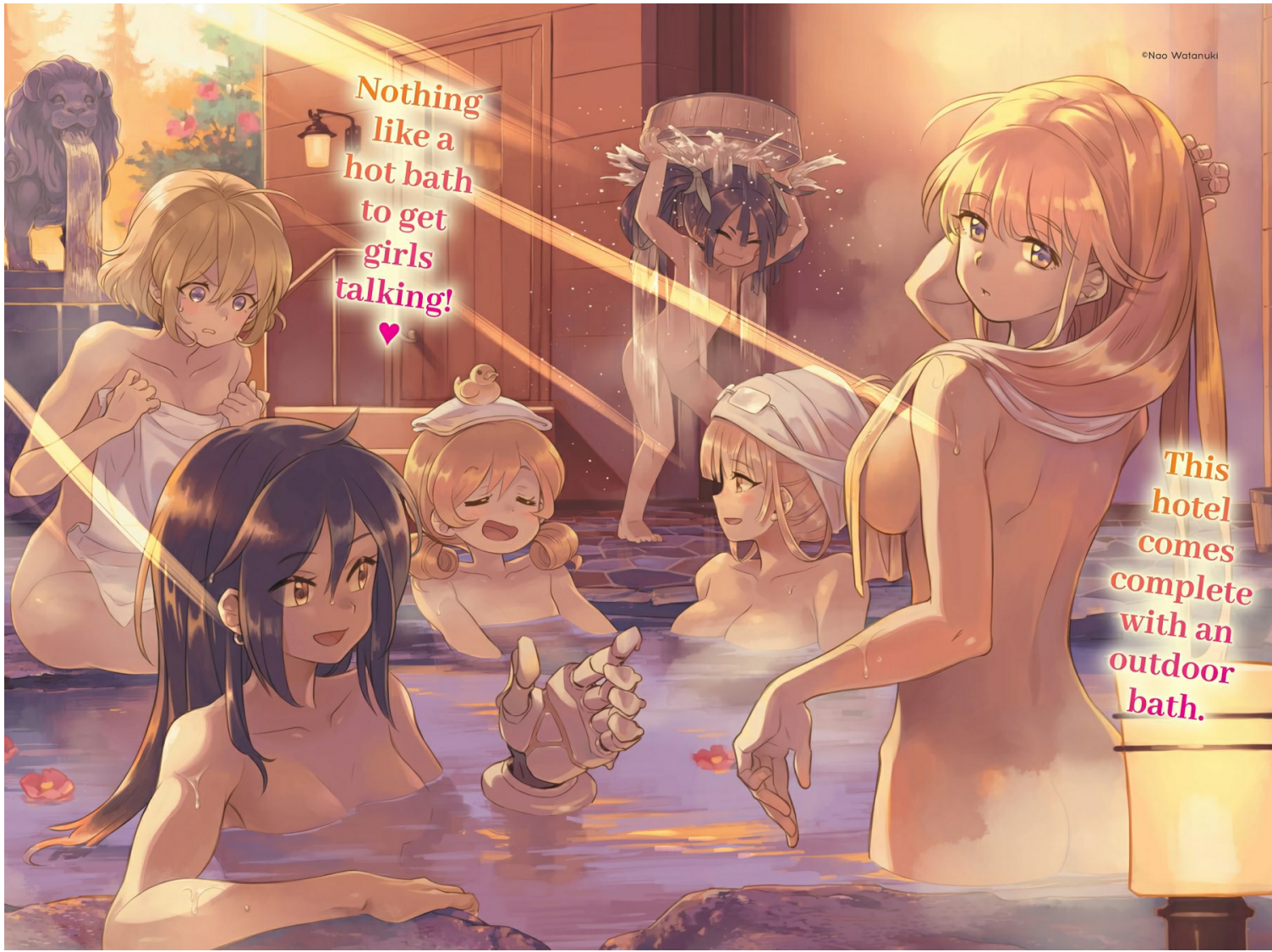












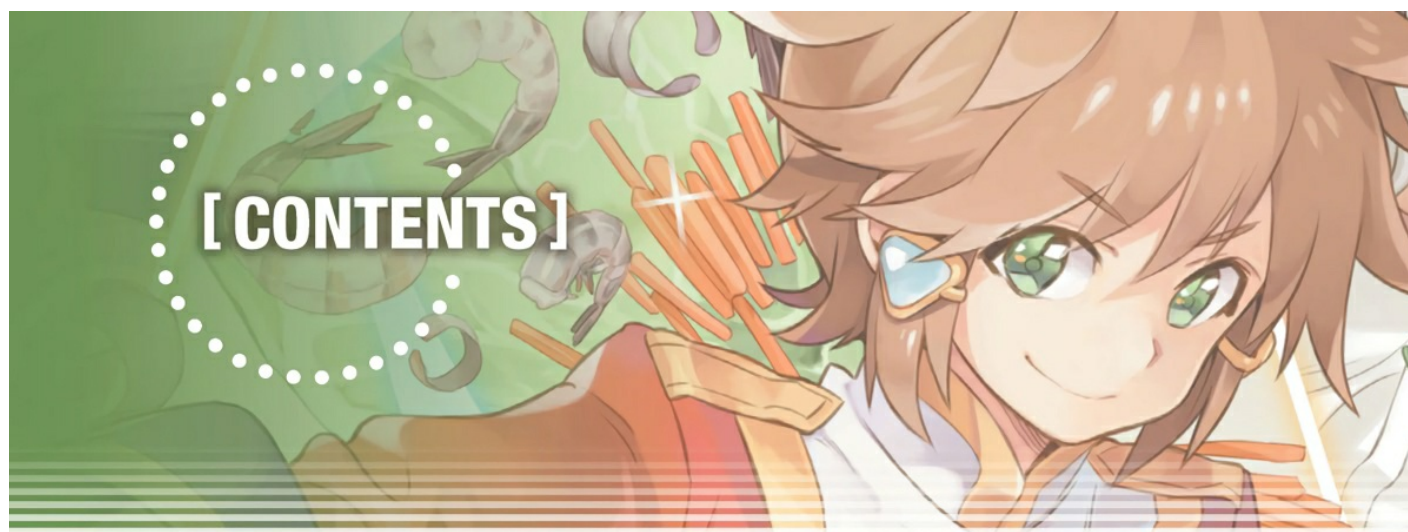

arrange a shotgun wedding before that threat manifests.”

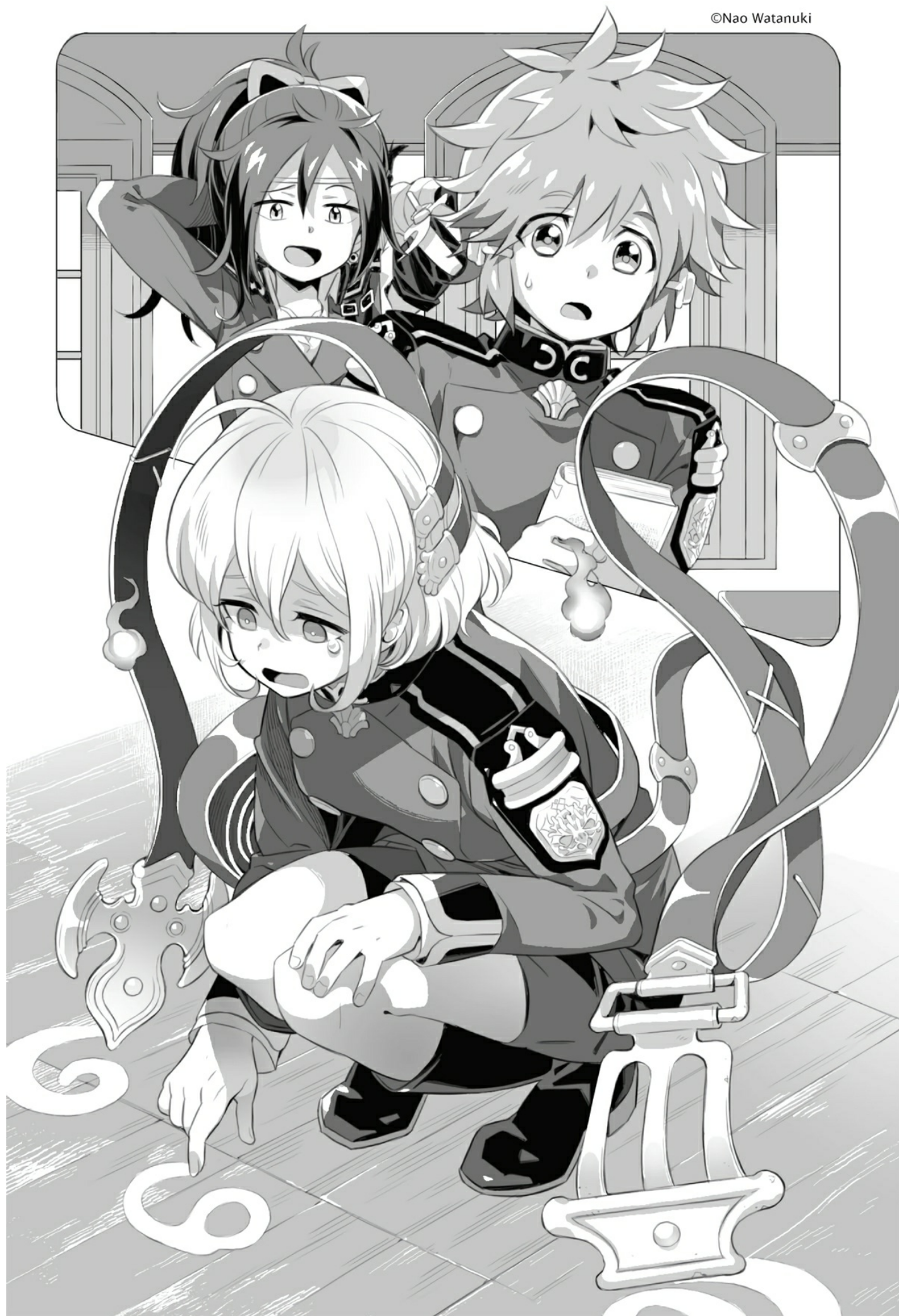
Thanks to the events at the Student Sorcery Tournament, Riho had started looking at Lloyd in a different light. She denied it, but...
