Shigeru Sanada

Inagaki

An inspector with the Ministry of Police. Toshikazu Chiba's subordinate.

Benio Kitayama

Shizuku's mother. An A-rank magician who was once renowned for her vibration magic.

Kousuke Yamanaka

Executive officer of the 101st Brigade's Independent Magic Battalion. Physician ranked major. First-rate healing magician.



Wataru Kitayama

Shizuku's younger brother. Sixth grade. Dearly loves his older sister. Aims to be a magic engineer.

Maya Yotsuba

Tatsuya and Miyuki's aunt. Miya's younger twin sister. The current head of the Yotsuba.



Hayama

An elderly butler employed to Maya.

Mitsugu Kuroba

Miya Shiba and Maya Yotsuba's cousin. Father of Ayako and Fumiya.



Ayako Kuroba

Tatsuya and Miyuki's second cousin. Has a younger twin brother named Fumiya. Student at Fourth High.



Fumiya Kuroba

A candidate for next head of the Yotsuba. Tatsuya and Miyuki's second cousin. Has an older twin sister named Ayako. Student at Fourth High.



Angelina Kudou Shields

Commander of the USNA's magician unit, the Stars. Rank is major. Nickname is Lina. Also one of the Thirteen Apostles, strategic magicians.





Virginia Balance

The USNA Joint Chiefs of Staff Information Bureau Internal Inspection Office's first deputy commissioner. Ranked colonel. Came to Japan in order to support Lina.

Silvia Mercury First

A planet-class magician in the USNA's magician unit, the Stars. Rank is warrant officer. Her nickname is Silvia, and Mercury First is her codename. During their mission in Japan, she serves as Major Sirius's aide.



Benjamin Canopus

Number two in the USNA's magician unit, the Stars. Rank is major. Takes command when Major Sirius is absent.

Claire

Hunter Q—a female soldier in the magician unit Stardust for those who couldn't be Stars. Q refers to the 17th of the pursuit unit.

Rachel

Hunter R—a female soldier in the magician unit Stardust for those who couldn't be Stars. R refers to the 18th of the pursuit unit.

Mikaela Hongou

An agent sent into Japan by the USNA (although her real job is magic scientist for the Department of Defense). Nicknamed Mia.



Alfred Fomalhaut

A first-degree star magician in the USNA's magician unit, the Stars. Rank is first lieutenant. Nicknamed Freddie. Currently AWOL.

Charles Sullivan

A satellite-class magician in the USNA's magician unit, the Stars. Called by the codename Deimos Second. Currently AWOL.

Raymond S. Clark

A student at the high school in Berkeley, USNA, that Shizuku studies abroad at. A Caucasian boy who wastes no time making advances on Shizuku. Is secretly one of the Seven Sages.



Gu Jie

One of the Seven Sages. Also known as Gide Hague. A survivor of a Dahanese military's mage unit.

Glossary



Course 1 student emblem



Magic High School

Nickname for high schools affiliated with the National Magic University. There are nine schools throughout the nation. Of them, First High through Third High each adopt a system of Course 1 and Course 2 students to split up its two hundred incoming freshmen.

Blooms, Weeds

Slang terms used at First High to display the gap between Course 1 and Course 2 students. Course 1 student uniforms feature an eight-petaled emblem embroidered on the left breast, but Course 2 student uniforms do not.

CAD (Casting Assistant Device)

A device that simplifies magic casting. Magical programming is recorded within. There are many types and forms, some specialized and others multipurpose.

Four Leaves Technology (FLT)

A domestic CAD manufacturer. Originally more famous for magical-product engineering than for developing finished products, the development of the Silver model has made them much more widely known as a maker of CADs.

Taurus Silver

A genius engineer said to have advanced specialized CAD software by a decade in just a single year.

Eidos (individual information bodies)

Originally a term from Greek philosophy. In modern magic, eidos refers to the information bodies that accompany events. They form a so-called record of those events existing in the world, and can be considered the footprints of an object's state of being in the universe, be that active or passive. The definition of magic in its modern form is that of a technology that alters events by altering the information bodies composing them.

Idea (information body dimension)

Originally a term from Greek philosophy; pronounced "ee-dee-ah." In modern magic, *Idea* refers to the *platform* upon which information bodies are recorded—a spell, object, or energy's *dimension*. Magic is primarily a technology that outputs a magic program (a spell sequence) to affect the Idea (the dimension), which then rewrites the eidos (the individual bodies) recorded there.

Activation Sequence

The blueprints of magic, and the programming that constructs it. Activation sequences are stored in a compressed format in CADs. The magician sends a psionic wave into the CAD, which then expands the data and uses it to convert the activation sequence into a signal. This signal returns to the magician with the unpacked magic program.

Psions (thought particles)

Massless particles belonging to the dimension of spirit phenomena. These information particles record awareness and thought results. Eidos are considered the theoretical basis for modern magic, while activation sequences and magic programs are the technology forming its practical basis. All of these are bodies of information made up of psions.

Pushions (spirit particles)

Massless particles belonging to the dimension of spirit phenomena. Their existence has been confirmed, but their true form and function have yet to be elucidated. In general, magicians are only able to sense energized pushions. The technical term for them is psycheons.

Magician

An abbreviation of magic technician. Magic technician is the term for those with the skills to use magic at a practical level.

Magic program

An information body used to temporarily alter information attached to events. Constructed from psions possessed by the magician. Sometimes shortened to *magigram*.

Magic-calculation region

A mental region that constructs magic programs. The essential core of the talent of magic. Exists within the magician's unconscious regions, and though he or she can normally consciously use the magic-calculation region, they cannot perceive the processing happening within. The magic-calculation region may be called a black box, even for the magician performing the task.

Magic program output process

- Transmit an activation sequence to a CAD. This is called "reading in an activation sequence."
- Add variables to the activation sequence and send them to the magiccalculation region.
- Construct a magic program from the activation sequence and its variables.
- Send the constructed magic program along the "route"—between the lowest part of the conscious mind and highest part of the unconscious mind—then send it out the "gate" between conscious and unconscious, to output it onto the Idea.
- The magic program outputted onto the Idea interferes with the eidos at designated coordinates and overwrites them.

With a single-type, single-process spell, this five-stage process can be completed in under half a second. This is the bar for practical-level use with magicians.

Magic evaluation standards

The speed with which one constructs psionic information bodies is one's magical throughput, or processing speed. The scale and scope of the information bodies one can construct is one's magical capacity. The strength with which one can overwrite eidos with magic programs is one's influence. These three together are referred to as a person's magical power.



Cardinal Code hypothesis

A school of thought claiming that within the four families and eight types of magic, there exist foundational plus and minus magic programs, for sixteen in all, and that by combining these sixteen, one can construct every possible typed spell.

Typed magic

Any magic belonging to the four families and eight types.

Exotyped magic

A term for spells that control mental phenomena rather than physical ones. Encompasses many fields, from divine magic and spirit magic—which employs spiritual presences—to mind reading, astral form separation, and consciousness control.

Ten Master Clans

The most powerful magician organization in Japan. The ten families are chosen every four years from among twenty-eight: Ichijou, Ichinokura, Isshiki, Futatsugi, Nikaidou, Nihei, Mitsuya, Mikazuki, Yotsuba, Itsuwa, Gotou, Itsumi, Mutsuzuka, Rokkaku, Rokugou, Roppongi, Saegusa, Shippou, Tanabata, Nanase, Yatsushiro, Hassaku, Hachiman, Kudou, Kuki, Kuzumi, Juumonji, and Tooyama.

Numbers

Just like the Ten Master Clans contain a number from one to ten in their surname, well-known families in the Hundred Families use numbers eleven or greater, such as Chiyoda (thousand), Isori (fifty), and Chiba (thousand). The value isn't an indicator of strength, but the fact that it is present in the surname is one measure to broadly judge the capacity of a magic family by their bloodline.

Non-numbers

Also called Extra Numbers, or simply Extras. Magician families who have been stripped of their number. Once, when magicians were weapons and experimental samples, this was a stigma between the success cases, who were given numbers, and the failure cases, who didn't display good enough results.

Various Spells

Cocytus

Outer magic that freezes the mind. A frozen mind cannot order the flesh to die, so anyone subject to this magic enters a state of mental stasis, causing their body to stop. Partial crystallization of the flesh is sometimes observed because of the interaction between mind and body.

• Rumbling

An old spell that vibrates the ground as a medium for a spirit, an independent information body.

Program Dispersion

A spell that dismantles a magic program, the main component of a spell, into a group of psionic particles with no meaningful structure. Since magic programs affect the information bodies associated with events, it is necessary for the information structure to be exposed, leaving no way to prevent interference against the magic program itself.

• Program Demolition

A typeless spell that rams a mass of compressed psionic particles directly into an object without going through the Idea, causing it to explode and blow away the psion information bodies recorded in magic, such as activation sequences and magic programs. It may be called magic, but because it is a psionic bullet without any structure as a magic program for altering events, it isn't affected by Information Boost or Area Interference. The pressure of the bullet itself will also repel any Cast Jamming effects. Because it has zero physical effect, no obstacle can block it.

Mine Origin

A magic that imparts strong vibrations to anything with a connotation of "ground"—such as dirt, crag, sand, or concrete—regardless of material.

Fissure

A spell that uses spirits, independent information bodies, as a medium to push a line into the ground, creating the appearance of a fissure opening in the earth.

Dry Blizzard

A spell that gathers carbon dioxide from the air, creates dry-ice particles, then converts the extra heat energy from the freezing process to kinetic energy to launch the dry-ice particles at a high speed.

• Slithering Thunders

In addition to condensing the water vapor from Dry Blizzard's dry-ice evaporation and creating a highly conductive mist with the evaporated carbon dioxide in it, this spell creates static electricity with vibration-type magic and emission-type magic. A combination spell, it also fires an electric attack at an enemy using the carbon gas-filled mist and water droplets as a conductor.



• Niflheim

A vibration- and deceleration-type area-of-effect spell. It chills a large volume of air, then moves it to freeze a wide range. In blunt terms, it creates a super-large refrigerator. The white mist that appears upon activation is the particles of frozen ice and dry ice, but at higher levels, a mist of frozen liquid nitrogen occurs.

• Burst

A dispersion-type spell that vaporizes the liquid inside a target object. When used on a creature, the spell will vaporize bodily fluids and cause the body to rupture. When used on a machine powered by internal combustion, the spell vaporizes the fuel and makes it explode. Fuel cells see the same result, and even if no burnable fuel is on board, there is no machine that does not contain some liquid, such as battery fluid, hydraulic fluid, coolant, or lubricant; once Burst activates, virtually any machine will be destroyed.

• Disheveled Hair

An old spell that, instead of specifying a direction and changing the wind's direction to that, uses air current control to bring about the vague result of "tangling" it, causing currents along the ground that entangle an opponent's feet in the grass. Only usable on plains with grass of a certain height.

Magic Swords

Aside from fighting techniques that use magic itself as a weapon, another method of magical combat involves techniques for using magic to strengthen and control weapons. The majority of these spells combine magic with projectile weapons such as guns and bows, but the art of the sword, known as *kenjutsu*, has developed in Japan as well as a way to link magic with sword techniques. This has led to magic technicians formulating personal-use magic techniques known as magic swords, which can be said to be both modern magic and old magic.

1. High-Frequency Blade

A spell that locally liquefies a solid body and cleaves it by causing a blade to vibrate at a high speed, then propagate the vibration that exceeds the molecular cohesive force of matter it comes in contact with. Used as a set with a spell to prevent the blade from breaking.

2. Pressure Cut

A spell that generates left-right perpendicular repulsive force relative to the angle of a slashing blade edge, causing the blade to force apart any object it touches and thereby cleave it. The size of the repulsive field is less than a millimeter, but it has the strength to interfere with light, so when seen from the front, the blade edge becomes a black line.

3. Douji-Giri (Simultaneous Cut)

An old-magic spell passed down as a secret sword art of the Genji. It is a magic sword technique wherein the user remotely manipulates two blades through a third in their hands in order to have the swords surround an opponent and slash simultaneously. *Douji* is the Japanese pronunciation for both "simultaneous" and "child," so this ambiguity was used to keep the inherited nature of the technique a secret.

4. Zantetsu (Iron Cleaver)

A secret sword art of the Chiba clan. Rather than defining a katana as a hulk of steel and iron, this movement spell defines it as a single concept, then the spell moves the katana along a slashing path set by the magic program. The result is that the katana is defined as a mono-molecular blade, never breaking, bending, or chipping as it slices through any objects in its path.

5. Jinrai Zantetsu (Lightning Iron Cleaver)

An expanded version of Zantetsu that makes use of the Ikazuchi-Maru, a personal-armament device. By defining the katana and its wielder as one collective concept, the spell executes the entire series of actions, from enemy contact to slash, incredibly quickly and with faultless precision.

6. Mountain Tsunami

A secret sword art of the Chiba clan that makes use of the Orochi-Maru, a giant personal weapon six feet long. The user minimizes their own inertia and that of their katana while approaching an enemy at a high speed and, at the moment of impact, adds the neutralized inertia to the blade's inertia and slams the target with it. The longer the approach run, the greater the false inertial mass, reaching a maximum of ten tons.

7. Usuba Kagerou (Antlion)

A spell that uses hardening magic to anchor a five-nanometer-thick sheet of woven carbon nanotube to a perfect surface and make it a blade. The blade that *Usuba Kagerou* creates is sharper than any sword or razor, but the spell contains no functions to support moving the blade, demanding technical sword skill and ability from the user.

Strategic Magicians: The Thirteen Apostles

Because modern magic was born into a highly technological world, only a few nations were able to develop strong magic for military purposes. As a result, only a handful were able to develop "strategic magic," which rivaled weapons of mass destruction.

However, these nations shared the magic they developed with their allies, and certain magicians of allied nations with high aptitudes for strategic magic came to be known as strategic magicians.

As of April 2095, there are thirteen magicians publicly recognized as strategic magicians by their nations. They are called the Thirteen Apostles and are seen as important factors in the world's military balance. The Thirteen Apostles'

World War III, also called the Twenty Years' Global War Outbreak, was directly triggered by global cooling, and it fundamentally redrew the world map.

The USA annexed Canada and the countries from Mexico to Panama to form the United States of North America, or the USNA.

Russia reabsorbed Ukraine and Belarus to form the New Soviet Union.

China conquered northern Burma, northern Vietnam, northern Laos, and the Korean Peninsula to form the Great Asian Alliance, or GAA.

India and Iran absorbed several central Asian countries (Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, and Afghanistan) and South Asian countries (Pakistan, Nepal, Bhutan, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka) to form the Indo-Persian Federation.

The other Asian and Arab countries formed regional military alliances to resist the three superpowers: the New Soviet Union, GAA, and the Indo-Persian Federation.

Australia chose national isolation.

The EU failed to unify and split into an eastern and a western section bordered by Germany and France. These east-west groupings also failed to form unions and now are actually weaker than they were before unification.

Africa saw half its nations destroyed altogether, with the surviving ones barely managing to retain urban control.

South America, excluding Brazil, fell into small, isolated states administered on a local government level.

"It seems as though his abdomen was pierced from behind, his chest skin and his muscles burst out from the inside, and his heart ruptured."

That was why it had been reported as an unnatural death. Of course, the news hadn't delivered information this detailed. Tatsuya had heard about the details from Mayumi.

"Burst from the inside...?" Masaki asked, in a deeply suspicious tone.

"Almost sounds like Burst."

"Shiba, I promise you, the Ichijou family had nothing to do with this!"

The disturbance in his mind easily seen through, Masaki overreacted. Mayumi frowned a little at how loud his voice was in the relatively small room.

Tatsuya wasn't seriously suspecting the Ichijous' involvement, either.

"But no natural phenomenon could have caused an internal chest rupture, and there aren't exactly many people who can use magic to control the bodily fluids inside a regular living person—much less when the target is a magician—enough to cause their body to explode."

"But that's..."

—Even so, his tongue had been fairly sharp.

"The Ichijou family's Burst spell isn't that easy to use, right?"

"Of course not! Ah—sorry, I mean..."

"Calm down. I said it *almost* sounds like Burst. I didn't say Burst was actually used, and I certainly don't think any Ichijou family magician was involved in this."

Masaki's face grew a little red, probably because he'd realized how out of sorts he'd been and was embarrassed about it. *Maybe his personality is surprisingly weak to unexpected events*, Tatsuya wondered.

"Magic that manipulates the inside of another person's body is hard," said Mayumi. "But affecting one's own body isn't as difficult. Self-acceleration is a relatively popular spell, for example... Tatsuya, do you think Nakura blew himself up—committed suicide?" she asked nervously.

Tatsuya shook his head. "He may have blown himself up, but it wasn't a suicide."

"Brother, you believe Nakura did this because he knew he had sustained a fatal wound, right?"

"You mean the victim, shot through the stomach from behind and realizing he was fatally wounded, used the spell to try and take the opponent down with him?"

"...I'm sorry, but Nakura almost never used magic around me."

Masaki furrowed his brow. "Needles out of water...? How? And what effects do they have?"

"I don't know how he did it, but if they're needles, he probably used them for piercing," Tatsuya said. "If you use a convergence-type spell, even water needles get the penetration they need to use them at a practical level."

Getting a boring answer in response to the question he'd asked in spite of himself, Masaki almost made a slightly miffed face. But right before he did, he remembered Miyuki was watching. "...Which would mean the victim made his own blood into needles and fired them?"

"A counterattack that was literally in exchange for his life..."

Tatsuya directed Elemental Sight at the traces of Nakura's blood that was stuck to the clothing and recorded the information.

"What are you doing, Shiba?"

"Just thought maybe magical traces were near the abdomen wound."

"I see..."

Fooled by Tatsuya's reasonable-sounding lie, not only Masaki but Mayumi also stared hard in the same way. They weren't directing their physical senses toward the clothes, but their magical ones—but the act of looking at something made it easiest to give your magical senses a direction.

"Hmm... I don't see anything," said Mayumi dejectedly, letting her shoulders sag.

Masaki looked up and heaved a sigh. "Nope. I can feel something like a trace, but it's too blurry, and I can't read any meaningful pattern from it... Shiba, did you find something?"

"I couldn't read any information that would specify the criminal, either. But this wound is likely from an imaginary beast."

"A what?"

"Brother, what do you mean by an imaginary beast?"

Mayumi and Miyuki sought an explanation for the unfamiliar word. Behind them, he saw their detective guide jotting down notes.

Tatsuya tried to make Masaki do the explaining, but Masaki casually looked away. Either he didn't know or he did and didn't feel like going through the effort to clarify for him.

Miyuki was the one asking, so if he had known, he probably would have explained proudly. Tatsuya interpreted that to mean, in all likelihood, it just so happened he didn't know about them, either.

"Imaginary beast is a name given to a kind of compound form. Compound forms are techniques that magically bend light and add pressure to adjacent objects, making it look like something formless has an actual form. Imaginary beasts don't twist light to pretend they have a form, though—illusion magic is used to show that form to the enemy. The caster applies anti-object effects to match the constructed form, same as compound forms."

"Compound forms bend physical light, so anyone can see them. Imaginary beasts only appear through mental interference—type magic, so the only ones who can see them are those the caster wants to show them to. Is that right?"

Tatsuya nodded, satisfied at Miyuki's understanding. "Yeah. Very good. To add to that, visual illusions aren't the only thing you can show an opponent. You can use auditory illusions to set up an imaginary beast spell, too."

"Hold on a minute, Tatsuya. From the way you said it, do you mean an imaginary beast isn't really a spell unless someone else perceives it?"

"The biggest difference between them and compound forms is in how the

spell's strength grows by making the opponent think something is present."

Mayumi continued her argument, not looking convinced. "Then why would there be an attack from behind? If there was a noise, Nakura would turn around. It doesn't matter if it's a form or a sound—if he could have perceived something was behind him, he would never have gotten stabbed from behind."

"You don't need to make the person perceive where it is."

"What do you mean ...?"

"With imaginary beasts, it's actually better not to let the opponent clearly perceive them. Imaginary beasts are just that—imaginary. If the opponent could see them clearly, they'd realize they weren't real. The unease at feeling like something exists, the unstable perception that it's somewhere nearby—imaginary beasts don't exist, but the phenomenon lives because of those traits."

"...I don't really get it."

"Ah, sorry. Was that too roundabout? To put it simply, if you show the opponent a sacrificial pawn, you make them think you'll attack them with magic fields shaped like animals, and then you use that as a stepping-stone to cast a stronger spell. The initial pawn can be a compound form or something else—doesn't matter."

"So being cautious of your enemy's magic makes your enemy stronger...?"

"Being aware of the trick halves the effects. It was the right choice getting to see the physical evidence."

Tatsuya lowered his head slightly in a gesture of appreciation.

Mayumi was at a loss on how to react.

The four of them got into one commuter and headed for Arashiyama. (Mayumi had ended her rental of the one she'd arrived in. It would now be heading automatically to its next user.)

Tatsuya and Masaki sat in the front seats, with Miyuki and Mayumi in the back.

No sooner had the commuter drove off than Masaki spoke to Tatsuya.

"Shiba, about those imaginary beasts..."

Tatsuya and Miyuki didn't mistake whom he was talking to; Masaki had been asking Tatsuya this whole time about the topic, not his sister.

"Were the puppet shiki we encountered yesterday something else?"

"I've never heard them called puppet shiki before."

Tatsuya was sitting in the front seat on the right, but since the commuter was moving on its own, there was no need for him to drive. He could turn to his side without any problem at all.

"They're generally called golems. I think that name should spell out the difference?"

"Ichijou, Brother, I'm sorry for interrupting."

Miyuki leaned forward slightly from the backseat. Still, she didn't do anything so lacking in etiquette such as grabbing the back of the seat or poking her face up there.

"Brother, I essentially only know of golems by name, so would you be able to explain what kind of things they are in a simple manner?"

For just a moment, Tatsuya gave a dubious look. Golems were a popular attack method among ancient magicians who were in the Christian sphere or Jewish. It wasn't possible that Miyuki, who had been taught with the expectation that she would fight magicians from foreign countries, didn't know anything but the name.

But after seeing his little sister's eyes dart over to Masaki for a moment, Tatsuya realized her true aim. Part of him thought she was being overly considerate, but he didn't want to waste her efforts, either. For Masaki's sake rather than Miyuki's, Tatsuya began a somewhat detailed lecture about golems.

"Golems are puppets designed to resemble creatures or mythical beasts and are made up of several linked parts. By embedding independent information bodies programmed with movement patterns, you can replicate the motions of the creatures they were designed after by using convergence-type magic to continuously change the relative positions of each of the parts. They're basically

magical robots.

"For example, assume you create a giant, humanoid golem out of stone. At a glance, the golem seems to have no joints, like it's just a hunk of stone, and yet, it appears to move as though it were human. In reality, though, it has no parts connected to it to serve as joints. Like with hardening magic, you just station everything in relative locations—essentially, you're just piling up body parts.

"Golems possess physical form—whatever they're composed of. In some cases, they're organic, like if you use wood, and in other cases, they're inorganic, like stone—and in yet other cases, they're amorphous, like water. But compound forms and imaginary beasts are only force fields without physical form. That lack of physicality is an important difference between them and golems.

"As I mentioned earlier, in order to operate a golem, you need to embed independent information bodies programmed with movement patterns. It won't work unless you continuously project that magic program into it. When the magic program loses its effects, the golem ceases to be a golem. And if it's made of something amorphous like water, it will immediately fall apart.

"If it's made out of wood or stone, you frequently use sealing-type magic techniques as a way to affix the magic program to it. But if you're using another amorphous material like water, you'd mix something that could serve as a magical transmitter into the medium and use that as the target for continuously projecting and updating the magic program. In yesterday's case, I would assume the first small golems that appeared were one-time-use, disposable tools, where the magician didn't update the magic program, and then he used the blood stolen from the *ninjutsu* users to serve as the transmitter.

"Before modern magic was established, it was thought that blood had an important magical significance. Ancient magic posits that blood offerings are highly effective, and many spells exist that use it as a medium. From the perspective of modern magic, blood circulates through the whole body, including the brain, and is directly involved in sustaining life. Additionally, the eidos in blood are highly dense psionic information bodies; even a single drop can contain the detailed properties of the user. Thus, as a target for projecting a magic program onto, you could say it's extremely suitable."

"...Then basically, the difference between golems and things like imaginary beasts and compound forms is whether or not they have a physical form, right?"

Perhaps starting to find the lecture boring, Mayumi literally summed up Tatsuya's explanation in a single sentence.

"Based on all that, golems seem easier to deal with since they have a physical form," Masaki followed up.

Tatsuya shook his head a little. "Whether they're compound forms or imaginary beasts, putting in the unnecessary effort of giving it a creature's form is an inefficient way to use magic. If you don't use a magical item at the core, they can be wiped out by magical power focused into a small area—Area Interference—and if you're strengthening the false form with a magical item, all you need to do is destroy that core. Or you can simply destroy the field making up the false form. If the field is applied physically, then you can destroy it physically."

Lariats, used by esoteric Buddhist ancient magicians!

With this technique, instead of spreading psionic noise into the air to prevent magic activation like Cast Jamming, you slung this rope around the opponent and poured the noise into them directly through it, effectively blocking them from casting anything.

Tatsuya didn't dismantle the lariats themselves, only the noise being sent into him. And then, with all his might, he yanked on the ropes with his hands.

Though Tatsuya was powerful, it wasn't as if he boasted superhuman strength. Normally, he didn't have the strength to drag two humans out, one with each hand. But they were too baffled at how their spell was broken by

something unexpected. Tatsuya was able to drag them out of their hiding places because he'd taken advantage of that opening.

The carbon dioxide density in the air went from 350 ppm to 400 ppm. From 3 in every 10,000 molecules to 4 in every 10,000. The gases seemed to be overflowing, even though in actuality, it barely contained anything. But with this number, even limited to the troposphere, which extended up to 10,000 meters, it also meant the carbon dioxide alone would lower the pressure dramatically, creating a layer of about 2 meters.

The composition of air was distributed uniformly throughout the atmosphere. If you used magic to skew that distribution, the world—or nature, as you might call it—would attempt to correct it. If you gathered a specific atmospheric constituent—in this case, carbon dioxide—into a certain small area, the density of carbon dioxide in the vicinity would drop. In order to correct this, the world would send carbon dioxide into the area in which its density was lowered. This was accomplished through a chain substitution of gas constituents without producing an air current.

On a micro scale, the carbon dioxide—converging process that was needed to create dry ice with magic would, through the air particles moving faster than the speed of sound, cause a chain reaction of substitutions. However, the truly fascinating thing about this phenomenon was that the magician who caused the event alteration at its origin was not involved in this macro, atmospheric-level change in the air composition. By simply and one-sidedly converging the carbon dioxide needed for the dry ice into an incredibly small area, the *world* would provide the missing materials as it tried to erase the effects of the magic-based event alteration.

In this way, the artificial dry ice hail fell like rain in the bamboo grove. Their speed was far less than the speed of sound, averaging around five hundred to six hundred kph. The bullets, too, were quite a bit lighter compared with lead ones. But the magically hardened pellets were more than fast enough to pierce human skin and flesh.

Six men stumbled out of the bamboo grove. They didn't show any signs of heavy wounds, probably because they'd protected themselves from the dry-ice bullets with magic. Still, blood seeped from several wounds on their arms and legs.

"...This shows that a responsive alloy plate is not a necessary condition to cast sealing-type magic. Seals only guide the flow of psions, and as we've just shown, using a seal pattern to project it yields the same effects. Hence, we can conclude that at its essence, sealing-type magic is not dependent on physical seals."

First High's presentation, with Isori as the leader, ended. Boisterous applause went up from the crowd.

"This is the biggest applause yet," offered Miyuki, released from judging duty because it was First High's presentation, to Tatsuya, who was in the seat next to her.

As the uniquely odd atmosphere continued, Second High's presentation started.

"Second High's presentation will now begin. The title is, 'A Hypothesis Regarding Notable Concepts in Mental Interference-Type Magic's Principles and Activation Sequences.'"

The stir in the venue grew louder. The principles of something still almost fully unexplained—mental interference magic. Any thesis dealing with it was sure to be something ambitious and revolutionary for magic studies.

"...As you can see from these observation results, at the same time as a person perceives something, psionic information bodies are newly formed. The point to note here about these psionic information bodies, which are formed through one's perception, is that when the perceiver actively eliminates the object of perception—for example, via instant incineration—this breakdown begins in advance of the actual destruction.

"...Many of the observational results you've seen match the hypothesis that psions are particles that give form to will and thought. They show that a person's passive perception does not create psionic information bodies; instead, their active mental processes are creating them.

"...For a person's will, or in other terms, their mind, to apply some sort of effect to this physical dimension, we believe they must convert will into psionic information bodies. If we adopt this hypothesis, we can interpret perception-type psychic powers, beginning with telepathy, as also being magic that uses psionic information bodies.

"...We believe that the psionic information bodies formed through will—mental activity—possess the characteristics you've all just seen. Of course, this can't explain all of their characteristics, but if we can define the displayed factors as an activation sequence, the formularization of mental interference-type magic is sure to accelerate by leaps and bounds. At the same time, this would lead to the development of anti-magic that can nullify mental interference-type magic. And it would be a good opportunity to dispel the superstitious fears surrounding mental interference-type magic.

"As such, mental interference-type magic doesn't have any essential differences from the four families and eight types. The mind, too, as long as it is connected to the physical world, will produce psionic information bodies. These are psions showing the form of the will. Thus, if we create a magic program that alters these psionic information bodies, we will be able to alter real intentions in relation to this world, at least—the conscious mind. This magic alters a person's perception and, consequently, alters their active will.

"...If we assume a person's mind is not split into a conscious mind and an unconscious mind and is instead a single entity where one part is conscious and the other unconscious, then by observing and analyzing the psionic information bodies produced by the will's formation, we should be able to expand all mental interference-type magic into a true form of technology."

Minoru wrapped up the presentation with that.

For a moment, there was silence.

And then the venue erupted into thunderous applause.

The 2096 All-High Magic Thesis Competition. The crown of victory rested upon the head of Second High, which had appointed Minoru Kudou, a freshman, as its main presenter.

It was the moment a new star had been born in all the National Magic University-Affiliated High Schools, from First through Ninth.



Meanwhile, even at the Yotsuba main mansion, an even more serious presentation than the Thesis Competition's, though smaller in scale, was occurring.

AFTERWORD

How did you enjoy *The Irregular at Magic High School*, Volume 15, *Ancient City Insurrection Arc, Part II*? The subtitle may have been more accurate as *Ancient City Insurrection Attempt Arc*, but subtitles can easily be spoilers, and more importantly, *Attempt Arc* isn't a very good name, so I hope you will find it in your heart to understand.

The Yotsuba branch families have appeared at last. They were just side characters in this episode, but it's a matter of deep importance to me that they finally showed up. Well, sure, they'll be side characters in the future, too, but they're an irreplaceable cast of characters that will play a major role during a big turning point in *The Irregular at Magic High School*, so I've been having them wait in the wings for a very long time. The episode in which they appear for real will be one of the climaxes of the story.

The branch families' actual appearances were all written in from the very beginning, but I only decided on their last names fairly recently. I racked my brains over them, finding a lot of things didn't quite work for me. Shiiba, Mashiba, Shibata, Kuroba, Mugura, Tsukuba, Shizuka. Among them, I think Shiiba, Mashiba, and Shibata are easy to understand. They're all variations on the Yotsuba/Shiba shift.

Some may have already realized this about *Kuroba*, but it comes from "clover," as in a four-leaf clover.

Mugura comes from a plant called a Yotsuba-mugura in Japanese, or "four-leafed creeper."

Tsukuba originates in *Tsukubane-sou*, or "shuttlecock-grass." It's a perennial herb in the lily order that has four leaves.

Shizuka I got from a plant called *Hitori-shizuka*, or "single-man's quiet." This is another perennial herb with four leaves.

While looking all sorts of things up to choose the last names, I learned that it's a struggle to make names follow a regular pattern.

One last thing, and this is a bit of a fictional inside story. In the story, it's said that Zhuge Liang had mastered the art of Qimen Dunjia (purely a background setting for this series), but the essence of the Qimen Dunjia used in the Yokohama Disturbance Arc and this Ancient City Insurrection Arc is something I created based on my own personal interpretation of the one that appears in the *Romance of the Three Kingdoms* (Eiji Yoshikawa's version, to be precise). In other words, it's not that Zhuge Liang knew Qimen Dunjia, but that I defined the arts Zhuge Liang used as being Qimen Dunjia—that would be the correct order of things. That's not to say Eiji Yoshikawa's *Romance of the Three Kingdoms* doesn't depict anything like that with Zhuge Liang, but the essence of Qimen Dunjia in this story is an original creation.
