


"This shrine... It's made of jewels I've never seen before!" shouted Alan in surprise, still a jewel miner to his core.

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"I know not. Did you do something to her last night?"


"Not at all. We just dug up some dirt together with our shovels."

Base: 100d100 (Expected number: 5050) DAMAGE Depending on the level and Shovel Power, the number of die changes.


Wave Motion + Earth + Chaos + Pure Magical ATTRIBUTES

"Whoa, what's wrong?!"


