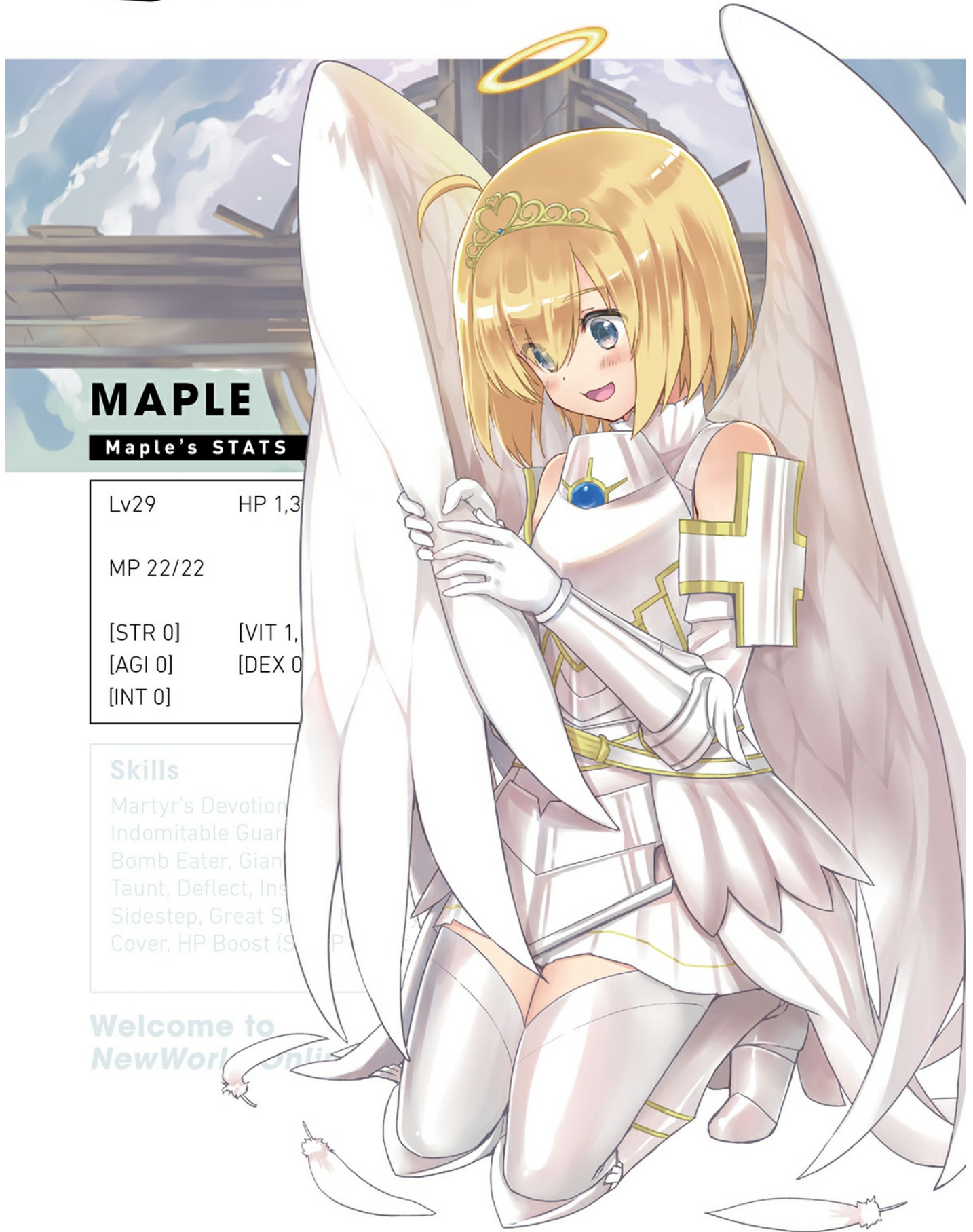

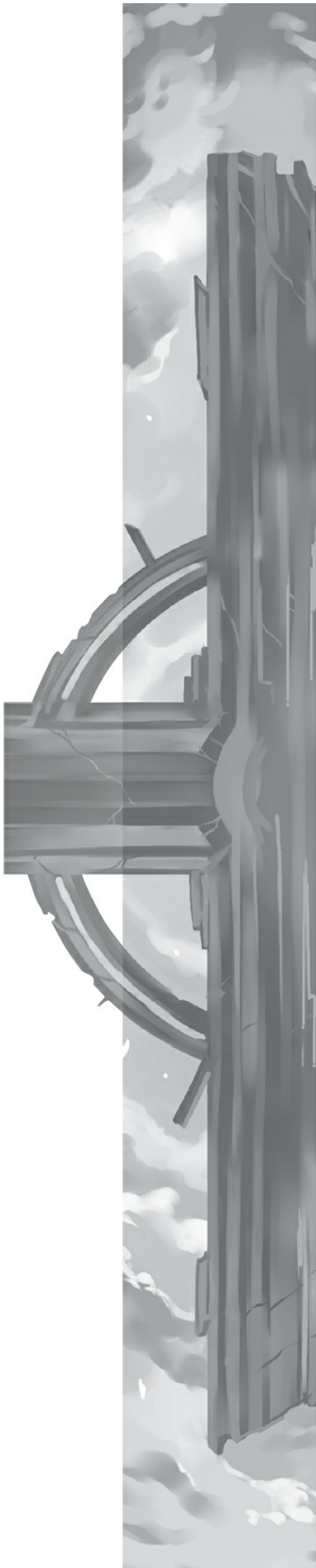

## Akashic Records

Grants nine random skills, three each from Crafting, Combat, and Other categories.

Skill levels are set at (M) or V.

Skills vanish after one in-game day from activation.

Does not grant skills already learned.

Kanade had activated Akashic Records earlier, and it just happened to spit out Mining V—so for today, he was a solid miner. That was the only reason he and Maple were the ones headed for the mines.

Armed with a pickax, they were on the hunt for ore.

“Golems usually show up in these mines,” Maple said. “Leave those to me!”

“I can only use staves, so even if I pull other weapon skills, they’d be useless. It’s pure luck whether I can fight or not on any given day.”

Akashic Records would really start to shine once Kanade went up a few more levels and could fight without relying on the skill’s random boons.

Max 100%.

There was no way to beat Sally without attacking her, but the more her opponents missed, the more her advantage grew.

“Even with this, I’d still struggle with Maple’s tankiness.”

helpful advice.

“Hmm... I’m a little busy today... Oh, I know! I can lend you Syrup. Anything helps, right?”

“Uh...you’re sure? This is important, right? What if I don’t give it back?”

Chrome went ahead and put on the new gear.

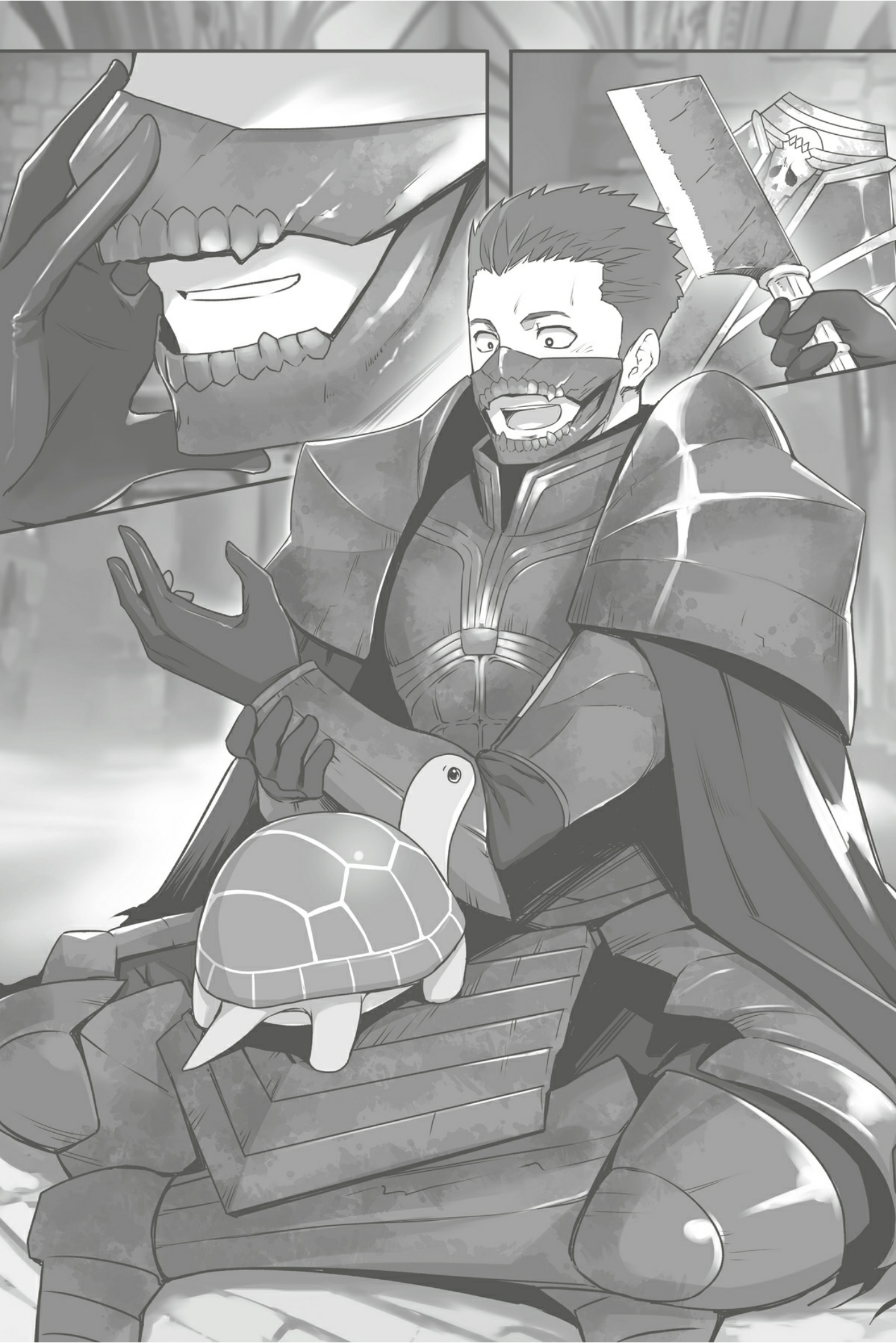
The lower half of his face was covered in a bloody skull.

# Soul Eater

Recover 10% of max HP after felling a monster or player.

# Dead or Alive

When HP becomes 0, 50% odds of surviving at 1 HP.

# Life Eater

Whenever dealing damage, recover HP equal to one third of damage dealt.

# Soul Syphon

Recover 3% HP when taking damage from an attack.

Chrome read through the skills, put Syrup back in the ring, stepped onto the magic circle, and left the dungeon behind.



A few days after Chrome took the first step on his journey to stop being a regular person...

...there was a brief maintenance outage, and the skill Shearing was added.

Like the name implied, it was a skill...for shearing things. Nothing else!

To accompany the skill, sheep had been added to certain areas.

According to Iz, these provided good materials, and they should collect them if they got a chance.

Maple and Kasumi had nothing better to do, so they set out across the first-stratum prairie.

It certainly was a step away from the norm.

“Then what would it take to surprise you?” Kasumi asked.

She's slain her natural enemy.

**294 Name: Anonymous Spear Master**

She's the top of the food chain.

Look out for the fur-ball fortress.

They resolved to ask Chrome if he showed up, and thus...time passed.



# Defense Build and the Third Event

Maple logged in, appearing at the Guild Home. There, she found Sally, Kanade, and Iz at the entrance.

“The event’s begun!” Maple declared excitedly.

She was pretty sure those were bad news, so she decided to add a buffer.

“Wool Up!”

A fluffy white ball appeared in the discolored gray realm.

Maple huddled inside the wool, fleeing the demon’s attacks and inspecting the chains.

“If you’ve inherited the angel’s power, then I’ll simply have to strip it from you!”

“Hmph! Nothing scares me in here! Um...Cursebind? I’ve never heard of that status effect.”

It could stack up to five times, and if it did, that would lower all stats by 25 percent.

“I’m at two stacks, which means I’m down ten percent.”

Cursebind would lose a stack after two minutes, so she’d have to wait four whole minutes to be ailment-free again.

The rest of her party was watching the battle unfold from the doorway.

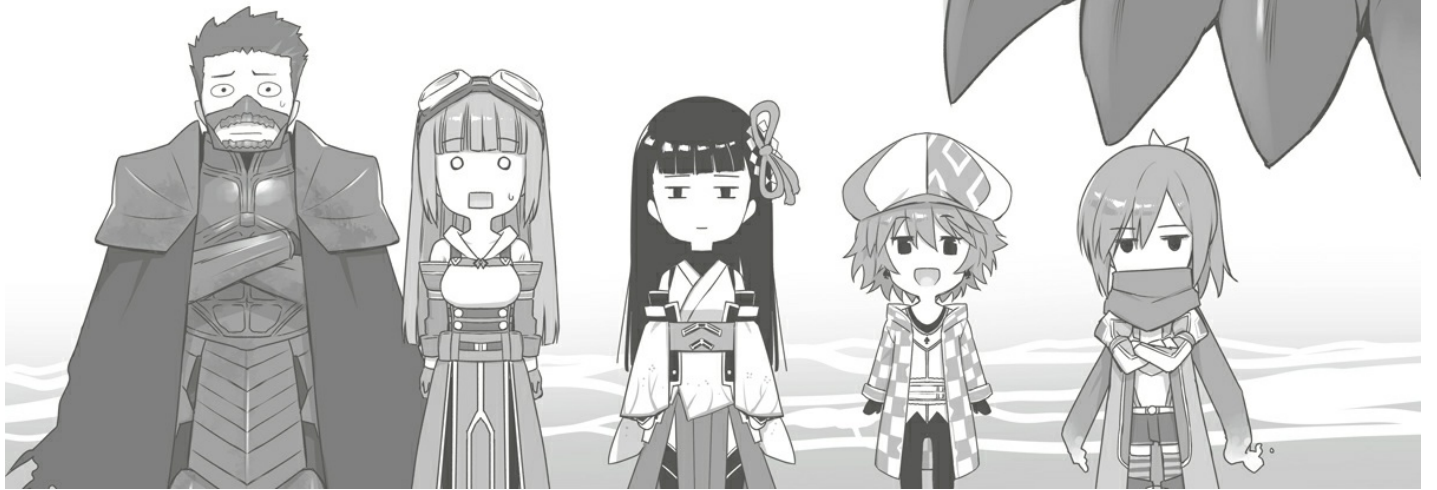
“What... What are those? Those are *clearly* monsters. *She’s* a monster.”

The sole difference was that the encouraging player had white hair, while the discouraged player had black hair.

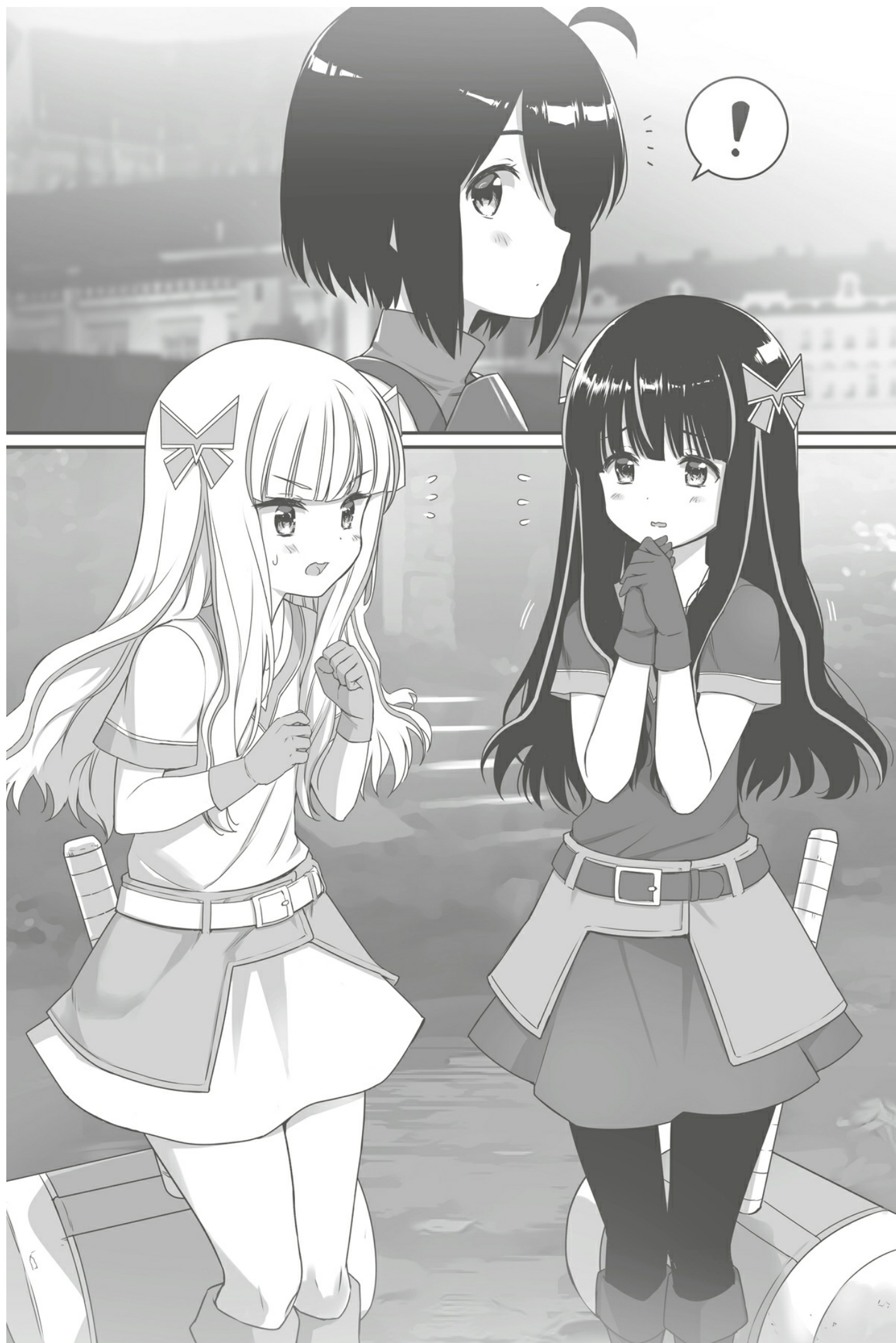
The white-haired one was the first to respond. “Er... Wh-what is it?”

They trailed out of the Guild Home after Maple. Sally had some business of her own to take care of, so she wasn’t logging out just yet.

“You going, too, Chrome?”

He’d been heading out the door himself—but not to help Maple.

“Yeah...Kasumi’s already at it.”

It was currently summer. And all summer long, monsters had a low chance of dropping watermelons.

Collecting these would enhance the guild’s support effects.

That meant stat boosts. These watermelons could raise STR, AGI, and INT by a maximum of 10 points each. Just as gathering enough dirt makes a mountain, making sure to hit that quota every time would amount to a substantial permanent boost to all guild members.

“I’ve got Maple handling the twins’ power leveling, so securing the guild buffs is on us.”

“Lords knows what they’ll come back as... They’re not out hunting a unique series, are they?”

“Nah, just getting some levels for now. Somewhere on the first stratum, away from prying eyes...”

There was a reason they were trying to avoid attention.

When she explained this to Chrome, he made a face and nodded.

Meanwhile, Maple had brought the twins to a deserted corner of the first stratum.

They were outside the dungeon where she’d fought the hydra.

“Are we running this dungeon?”

“Yep, we are! Put those things on!”

The twins equipped their helmets.

With their faces covered like this, nobody could tell who they were.

“Martyr’s Devotion!”

Maple went right into angel form, hair glimmering gold in a glow of divine light.

They'd seen this before so were able to admire the beauty of it without reeling in surprise.

"Atrocity!"

But that feeling did not last long.

Maple swiftly transformed into a hideous beast. Only the effects of Martyr's Devotion remained. Even her wings were gone.

"Hop on! Oh, make sure you get at least one hit in on the boss."

These two girls were really strong...so they could easily hold on to the creature Maple had become.

"Oh, and if anyone sees us, I'm gonna pretend to be a monster, okay?"

Their heads were hidden, so nobody could match their faces to their guild and their guild to Maple; this whole rigamarole was purely to prevent anyone from realizing who monster-form-Maple really was.

They wanted to keep that ace up their sleeve until the guild event.

""Huh?""

"Grah! Grrrrr!" Maple said and flung herself down the cave.

There was no need to role-play *now*, but she felt like it.

She shredded every monster along the way, opened the door to the boss room, and charged right at the hydra waiting within.

The poor hydra fell once more to her voracious appetite.

Yui and Mai had each landed a blow before its demise, so they leveled up.

And then came the important step.

Unlike the last time, two magic circles appeared before them.

One led to town—the other to the dungeon entrance.

Sally had explained that after clearing a dungeon once, subsequent runs would offer up this second circle.

And Maple took the new circle back to the entrance.

If they left the dungeon, the boss would respawn.

Their reason for coming here was to farm the hydra boss.

This poison dragon was far and away the toughest foe on the first stratum.

And it took an awfully long trip from town to get here, so with the current boom in extreme builds, not many players were inclined to make the arduous hike.

Best of all, the dungeon itself was quite short.

They could clear the deserted dungeon in a flash, rip the rotting dragon to shreds, and then consume it piece by piece.

And as they repeated this process, the twins rapidly leveled up.

Maple knew the route by heart, so she never got lost, and there was nothing around that could challenge her onslaught.

Maple was looping the dungeon at astonishing speeds, averaging just over three minutes per run.

After checking her time a few runs in, she felt an urge.

Yes...

She wanted to crack the sub-three range.

There was no real meaning to this. All she had to do was be a few seconds faster.

Maple was beginning to discover the fun that could be had when repeating the same run over and over again.

Taking this corner a little tighter, slaughtering all the monsters at that spot with fire breath before they clashed, avoiding anything that might slow her down...

Opening the boss door with no wasted motion, hitting the boss itself as hard as she could.

A few attempts after she started consciously working at it, her time dipped below the three-minute mark.



She felt like there was still room for improvement.

She could beat that hydra faster.

If she had Yui and Mai go all out on it, they could make some real gains.

After several tries doing that...

Yui's and Mai's new levels were boosting their attack strength, and they actually shaved down their run time to under 2:30.

"Yesssss!" Maple roared, her voice all staticky.

There was no reward for this, but Maple felt a great sense of accomplishment.

"Maple! Maple!"

"Mm? What?"

"Look!"

The twins showed Maple their stat screens.

Her head had no eyes, but for some reason, she could still see just fine.

"Um...Annihilator? And Conqueror?"

"Let me see... Conqueror is for beating a boss a bunch under a certain time limit. Prereq is a lot of STR. And we got Annihilator because of the dungeon speedrun. You need a lot of STR for that, too."

Maple's Atrocity had boosted her stats, but those numbers weren't real, so there was no way for her to get these skills.

The twins showed her the full skill listing, and Maple noticed something interesting.

**Conqueror**

Doubles the user's STR. Costs 3x the points to raise VIT, AGI, or INT.

## Condition

Defeat a boss a set number of times under a set time limit.  
Requires STR: 100+.

Specifically, this Conqueror skill was the STR version of her Absolute Defense.

“Hmm... Don’t think Kasumi would need that. Or Chrome...and Sally would hate the downside...”

The guild members with DPS builds were all raising several stats, so they wouldn’t want a skill that stunted their growth in all but one area.

“And Annihilator...is *really* good.”

# Annihilator

Allows one-handed use of two-handed weapons.

# Condition

Clear a dungeon below a set time limit. Requires STR: 100+.

In other words, they could now dual-wield giant hammers like Sally did daggers.

“How about we do a few more loops and then head home?”

““Okay!””



After countless loops of the hydra dungeon, they finally called it a day.

Yui and Mai climbed down off Maple’s back, and she reverted to her human form.

“Whew,” she said, stretching. “I’m all worn out! That was fun, though.”

“Oh, um. Maple, thank you so much! We gained so many levels!”

Yui turned and bowed. Mai followed suit, thanking her, too.

“Mm, great! But I hear there are some really high-level players out there. I’m still on the low end! Sally said the highest player is...sixty-one now?”

“S-sixty-one?! Th-that’s...mind-blowing.”

“What level are you now, Mai?”

Recovering quickly from their surprise, the twins turned to assessing the results of the day’s grind.

“Probably the same as you, Yui. Um...twenty.”

Mai was clearly still not used to opening her status menu, but she managed after a moment and showed it to her sister.

Yui opened her own for comparison and then had an idea.

“Oh! Should we let Maple look over our stats? Do you mind, Mai?”

“Hmm. I’d say...yeah, let’s do that.” Mai said, nodding.

They took a step toward Maple and showed her their stat blocks.

## Skills

Conqueror, Annihilator

The two girls looked the same, and so did their stat blocks.

“Oh, so the reason you didn’t use any skills in combat is because you didn’t have any.”

“Yes... Everything we fought on our own just killed us before we could land any hits, so we couldn’t make enough money to buy any scrolls.”

“And it’s hard for us to learn skills from beating monsters. That’s why we were looking for a guild...”

Most monsters were on the agile side.

Unless you were Maple and just sprayed down the whole area with poison, you’d need to be able to handle a few incoming attacks at the very least.

Maple didn’t need to pay those any attention, so she welcomed incoming monsters, but the twins had found that approach didn’t work out so well.

“Even if we just head out to gather items, we can’t run from any monsters and would wind up dying that way, too...”

“That’s why we were thinking about starting over when you called out to us.”

They’d also upgraded their weapons before buying some other essentials, which had only dug them in deeper. Without anyone to help, they’d been out of options—but meeting Maple had changed all that.

They were now strong enough to make progress despite the serious drawbacks of their extreme builds.

“Welcome back. How’d it go? They get some levels?”

“You betcha! They’re still not super high level, but they’re a lot higher than before!”

“Well, we have time. Getting them third-stratum ready in a single go was always a long shot.”

Maple explained that the twins were level 20 now, and Kasumi and Sally were suitably impressed.

As Maple was asking what skills they should have the twins learn, Yui stepped

up.

When everyone looked, she said, “U-um! We learned these two skills today.”

“Let’s see...”

“Can I have a look?”

Kasumi and Sally examined Yui’s skills. The ones Maple had accidentally earned them were powerful and would certainly have a huge impact on the direction their builds took.

“Ooo...kay. Right. Thanks for sharing.”

“Same here.”

They turned away from Yui and stared right at Maple.

“Huh? Wh-what?”

“I dunno if it’s what I expected or...worse.”

“You always surpass my wildest expectations.”

“At the very least, if they’ve both got those skills, we’ll have to rethink things.”

Sally had been assuming the twins wouldn’t really be much use in a fight for a while yet, but Maple had found a way to make them instantly combat capable.

“Okay, so...Annihilator? If nothing else, we’ve gotta prep gear that takes advantage of that.”

“Oh! Right, right. That’s what we came here to talk about!”

“Iz is in the back. I’ll go get her.”

“Uh, hi. Yui and Mai, was it?”

““That’s right!””

“Um, can I have a look at these skills?”

They showed Iz their screens. Stat points all poured into more attack and two support skills designed to support that build.

“Interesting. Well, to get you started— I mean, nobody in our guild can use ‘em.”

Iz took four hammers out of her inventory and handed two to each twin.

“You can have these,” she said. “They’ll help for now. These hammers should make it easier for you to land hits, too.”

Yui and Mai scoped out their new weapons.

# Crystal Hammer

[STR +25] [Supersize]

## Supersize

Increase target size.

Effect lasts thirty seconds, with a one-minute cooldown.

In other words, this skill allowed them to supersize the hammer heads, making it harder to miss.

With their damage output, as long as they hit, the blows would be fatal for most enemies, so this skill was ideal.

“Um, a-are you sure?”

“I mean...these are really nice!”

“Not a problem. They’re good, but nobody else in our guild can use ’em, so they were just collecting dust. And...”

““And...?””

“I’ll make you something better. We should talk deets.”

Iz was being so generous, it clearly made the twins feel guilty, and they were already shooting each other anxious looks.

“Seriously, don’t worry about it. Consider it an investment. In return, just think about what you can do for us later.”

That finally clinched it for them, and they nodded.

““All right! I’m sure we can help out now!””

“Heh-heh. Then let’s figure out what designs you’d like. Come on in to the back, and we’ll get your gear sorted out.”

Iz headed toward her workshop.

“Er, thank you, everyone!”

“They can probably survive without dodging in this guild, but...can’t hurt to learn a few tricks.”

Maple Tree had the two best great shielders in the game.

And Maple had just picked up Martyr’s Devotion, raising their defensive capabilities even further.

There were few forces as unfathomable as a durable Yui and Mai.

“Can’t wait to see how they grow!”

“I’d better get ready to train them.”

“I need to gain some levels myself... So much to do!”

“But that’s what keeps it fun!”

“Good point!”

The more she had on her plate, the bigger Maple’s smiles.

While they were talking, Yui and Mai had just reached the outside of Iz’s workshop.

“In here,” Iz said, opening the door for them.

Inside, it was quite roomy.

On one side was a desk Iz likely used when sketching new designs. On the walls were an array of weapons and armor, smithing tools, and the fruits of her labors.

In another corner was a set of flasks for making potions, wooden boxes filled with gems and crystals, planters growing all variety of things, and a sewing machine—clearly the tools required to craft anything this game allowed.

Iz found two extra chairs and sat down at her desk, turning to face the twins.

“Come in—have a seat. Let’s decide what I’m making for you.”

“Okay!”

“Please.”

“Hmm, let’s start simple—equipment stats.”

“What do you think, Mai?”

“Good question... With the skills we have, do we keep boosting STR?”

Not long ago, they’d been considering abandoning the build concept entirely, but meeting Maple had allowed them to see a future down that path.

So they were at a crossroads.



How could they best support their guildmates? That would be the basis for this decision.

“When you’re stuck and can’t be sure what choice to make, just do what feels right. That’s how Maple does it.”

Iz had seen plenty of evidence that gut feelings could lead to dividends.

“Then...”

“Yes. Stay the course!”

Their minds made up, they spoke as one.

““Pure STR boost!””

Iz grinned, jotted that down, and it was time for the next step.

“Then let’s decide what kind of equipment and what it should look like. I think you’ll be using this gear for a while, so let’s make sure we get it right.”

As they talked things over, Iz rummaged through her boxes, showing them different pieces. They took their time settling on the right design.

Eventually she put down her pen, seemingly satisfied.

“Okay, we’ll go with that. Wait right here. I’ll craft them and be right back.”

The gleam in her eye made it clear she couldn’t wait to get cracking.

“Um, you’re sure we don’t have to pay?”

“You’re good. But if it bugs you, I’ll be happy to take any unwanted materials off your hands.”

“We can do that!”

“We’ll get lots!”

“Mm, good luck! There’s plenty of good stuff on the second and third stratum. Well worth seeing for yourselves! Anyway, like I was saying, I’ll have these done in a jiffy, so just wait outside.”

““Okay!””

Once the two of them had left, Iz quickly went through her stock of materials, piling them up and getting ready to craft.

“The other guild members rarely stop by my workshop, so...good! I can go full tilt.”

Iz set to work, never pausing, clearly having the time of her life. Maybe that’s why their gear was finished far faster than she’d expected.

Outside the workshop, the twins had been waiting as instructed. Surprised by Iz’s crafting speed, they happily received their new equipment. The outfits matched their hair—one set was black and green, the other white and pink. They were both quite cute, with several sets of frills and ribbon embellishments. Iz would be making them custom hammers, too, but currently she was out of materials, so those would come later.

Wondering what to do next, Yui and Mai headed back to the guild entrance but found no sign of the others.

“Where’d they go...?”

“Not sure... Whoa! We were talking for two whole hours!”

That was a lot longer than they’d thought.

“Should we call it a day?”

“Hmm... Mai, do you mind if we do one more thing?”

“...? Tour the second or third stratum?”

“No. I mean, we’ve got two new weapons. I wanna try them out!”

“Oh...right. Sure, let’s do that.”

“Thank you, Mai!”

They headed back to the first stratum to try out the very battles that had given them so much trouble before.

Back on familiar terrain once more, they began looking for a good place to fight.

“It’s gotta be somewhere people won’t see us.”

“Mm...probably a good idea.”

Outside of town, they quickly left the main path, heading toward the less

popular mountains.

Avoiding areas where monsters might lay in ambush, they slowly traveled away from civilization.

“Careful, Yui.”

“Got it, Mai.”

Keeping their eyes peeled, each time they spotted monsters, they backed off before they were noticed. They did this again and again until they were certain there were no other players around.

They were in a zone of tall rock pillars near the base of the mountain.

They had not been aware this area existed, but it was perfect for what they were attempting.

“Nobody’s here, right?”

“Not that I can see!”

Certain they were alone, they opened their inventories and hesitantly equipped the hammers Iz had given them.

“Wow. W-we truly can equip both...”

“It feels really weird having one in each hand.”

Dual wielding their new hammers, they wove between the rocks, searching for monsters.

“...! Yui, there!”

Mai pointed—there was a two-yard-tall golem up ahead, basically a heap of rocks stuck together and imbued with life.

“Mai, you okay? Better put that away.”

“Oh yeah. Right. Sorry.”

Mai brought up her menu and put the extra hammer back in her inventory.

“The golem was slow enough for us to hit.”

“Mm. But against something fast like a snake...we’re still helpless.”

They had plenty more challenges to overcome. They couldn’t dodge at all, and their finesse with attacks left a lot to be desired.

“But if we *do* hit, we win. That’s wild.”

“I know, right? That’s something!”

It might have been only one step forward, but that was progress nonetheless.

They could dominate any fight where their blows actually connected.

Previously, the only monsters they’d ever managed to hit were the bugs found just outside of town.

“Yeah, that looks good. We’ll have to ask Sally and Maple about what else we

should get.”

They wound up picking an attack skill they could learn without breaking the bank.

“So Double Impact, then?”

“Let’s go for it!”

Their minds made up, they each made a purchase.

Outside the shop, they quickly used the scrolls, learning Double Impact.

## Double Impact

Two hammer strikes.

The resulting blows create small shock waves, dealing extra damage.

Usually, most players would be limited to just one hammer—but they could wield two. If they both used this skill together, it would unleash eight blows—each of which would one-shot the average monster.

And with their STR, those “small” shock waves would likely do considerable damage.

“Wanna try it out?”

“Yes! Right away!”

They headed back into the field.

When they reached a suitably deserted area, they tried their newly acquired skill.

The shock wave alone proved capable of taking down monsters, and the whole “as long as *something* hits” style was definitely working for them.

But after taking out a number of monsters, another surprise attack took them both down.

“Whew, still...that was fun! Wanna go again?”

“Sure! ...Uh?”

They were about to head back out, but a thought made Mai pull up her menu. And the color drained from her face.

“Er, uh...what’s wrong, Mai?” Yui said, looking worried.

“Yui! W-we’ve gotta go! Or else...”

Mai’s trembling finger was pointing at the time.

“Augh!”



Yui screwed up her eyes, wishing she hadn't seen that.

With all the time they'd spent in town and heading way out into the field, it was *very* late.

Way past the time they usually stopped playing. There was a strong chance their parents would be ready to give them a tongue-lashing the moment they left the game. Their post-log-out fate might be dire.

"We should probably hurry...and get it over with, right?"

"Y-yeah..."

They logged out and woke up in their own rooms.

The twins' rooms were across the hall from each other, and they opened their doors as one. They poked their heads out—and immediately found themselves face-to-face with their serenely smiling mother.

""Eep!""

"Good morning, girls. We need to talk. Come downstairs."

She turned her back and headed to the living room.

"It wasn't..."

"...all good."

Regretting their carelessness, they hung their heads and obediently followed their mother. Yui was racking her brain for a good excuse, while Mai had already given up.



The day after the hydra grind, Yui and Mai were with Sally in the third-stratum Guild Home—this time, paying slightly more attention to the hour.

They were in a rather large room—specifically, the training room. This was a new Guild Home feature added with the implementation of the third stratum, and it was accessible only via a magic circle.

Here, your HP would never run out. You could use all your skills, but not learn new ones.

Since Iz had yet to craft hammers she deemed acceptable, the twins were still

using the temporary ones. Both of them stood ready, a hammer in each hand.

“In this training room, you can practice fighting all you like without anyone seeing.”

“Practice how?”

“You want to get better at wielding those hammers, right?”

““Yes...””

He was another person who had a tendency to get stronger when people weren't looking.

She didn't say a word but was clearly a little jealous.

“Say a prayer to Maple, and you might get stronger, too,” Chrome said. “I’m only half kidding.”

# Sorcerer's Stacks

“Interesting... I’ll have to try it when I get back. Wait...no, maybe not today. I’m awfully tired.”

He went back up the stairs, pondering the books he’d read.

“The other one...wasn’t on the second stratum. Maybe the third? Or the first...or not even implemented yet?”

Either way, Kanade was hell-bent on being the one who found it.



The real-world admins were well aware that Kanade had learned this skill.

They were keeping close tabs on every member of Maple Tree, with a second set of markers reserved for anyone who’d done well in the first two events.

“Kanade cleared Our Bad Joke 20?!”

“Yeah...he did the same thing on the floating island.”

“Why are we calling this a joke?! I designed it! It’s a legitimate test of skill!”

“Maple Tree’s apparently just stacked with people who can clear the toughest challenges one right after the other.”

Chrome and Sally both had a unique series.

Kanade was taking on the libraries.

Even the newbie twins had grabbed STR-focused skills.

And Maple was everything.

Nearly all her skills were bad jokes.

“Uh...what else?”

“That concludes my tale. We are the only two who know The First existed.”

“Well, thank you for sharing!” Maple said politely.

The old man shuffled off down the alley, vanishing into the maze of back roads.

“So did The Second hate The First? Doesn’t seem like that triggered the start of a quest or anything, so... Maybe it’ll be useful later?”

Maple filed the old man’s story away in the back of her mind, then resumed exploring the town.



The more Maple explored, the more she found machines made by the Second Machine God. Without exception, they had that same blue light gleaming within.

Otherwise, there wasn’t much worth writing home about.

“Hmm...maybe it’s time to check the field.”

“I am...the king of the junk heap! I slumber amid the refuse... Dreams, miracles—are naught but garbage.”

And then he transformed.

Scraps of junk flew in from all around, hurtling into the hole—and re-forming as weapons.

Loads of them. Every inch of him bristled with tools of violence—and every barrel pointed at Maple.

“Refuse...you will join the heaps!”

While the weapons were being downed, Maple had sent Syrup (regular size) forward—and all she had to do now was warp to it.

Maple gaped at her new equipment for a moment but then remembered the fight wasn't over.

"I have to beat that thing! Taunt!"

Maple put Bonding Bridge back on, called out Syrup, and had it generate vines and rock cover with Mother Nature, temporarily blocking The Second's attacks.

One had been the top-ranked player in the first event—Pain, a classic-looking knight in white armor with a silver sword. Many players called him the Holy Sword—a name derived both from his skills and his appearance.

Next was Dread, the man they called Godspeed. He’d taken second place in the first event—like Sally, he wielded daggers. His avatar boasted coppery-bronze skin.

Beside him was Frederica. She carried a wooden staff with a large jewel—making it clear she was a mage.

And the last member had ranked fifth in the first event.

Drag, the Ground Splitter. Rough armor and a massive, unadorned ax. His bulging muscles made it clear he was a powerful fighter.

## Defense Build and the Crafter's Role

These two guilds contained most of the players capable of transforming a battlefield on their own.

"Maple Tree also has the blue girl who caused a stir in the second event, right?" Frederica asked. "She sounds like bad news, too."

Their spotty intel on Maple Tree left a lot to be desired.

They had next to no details on Sally and Kanade.

"Depends on the specifics of the event format, but we could just crush 'em with numbers. Worse comes to worst, we send you in, Pain."

Dread had a point. Maple Tree was quite small, but *their* guild was massive in comparison.

Numbers alone meant they'd always have the advantage.

"Our guild has solid strength across the board," Drag said. "And we've had 'em all get Poison Resist; those who had the time picked up Paralyze Resist, too. That means Flame Empire is the real threat."

"And we've got our crafters running that dungeon and making gear for everyone, right?" Frederica was talking about the second dungeon found on the third stratum. Only crafting classes could enter, and the materials found within allowed—for the first time—crafting of gear with skills attached.

They had parties running through the place around the clock, churning out gear with status-effect-resisting skills.

"This Maple girl's all about status effects and her shield, right? Plus that turtle? They say she's a full VIT build, which sounds crazy, but...odds are we can

shut her down completely.”

“Hmm... Well, Frederica, any information you can gather will help. Especially on Maple Tree.”

“You worry too much, Pain! I got this.”

Frederica picked up her staff and left the room.

Dread and Drag followed.

Left on his own, Pain muttered, “There’s nothing more frightening than what you don’t know. We know too little about Maple Tree.”

He did not know about Chrome’s new gear.

Or Kanade’s magic.

He’d yet to face Sally’s evasion.

They didn’t even know Yui and Mai existed, let alone the level of destruction they were becoming capable of.

And worst of all...

Nearly all members were convinced Maple could attack only with poison and her shield.

They did not know about her angel form, monster form, Machine God form, or Syrup’s laser death beams.

Pain alone had a hunch there was more to her—but he lacked evidence to back that up.



While Pain was fretting over Maple Tree, Iz was fidgeting on a chair in their Guild Home, her waist-length blue hair swaying.

She had just heard the breaking news about the crafter dungeon.

While she spent most of her time indoors, this lead was very tempting.

“Urgh... If I could get Maple or Sally to help...”

She meant borrowing Syrup and Oboro.

With the two of them, there was little risk of dying mid-dungeon.

Dying meant a loss of gold, some items—and worst of all, a temporary stat drain.

She would rather avoid that.

But of course, neither girl was anywhere to be seen.

Iz managed to wait all of five minutes.

Hitting the limits of her patience in no time at all, she stuffed her inventory full of combat equipment and gathering items, then flew the coop.

A five-minute machine-wing flight later...

She was in the new dungeon.

“Okay...let’s do some mining.”

Iz quickly found ores and crystals to hammer away at.

Crafters were unable to learn any weapon skills or magic, but a whole range of skills exclusive to their class made up for that restriction.

These included Smithing and Synthesizing.

However, these could be used only in workshops.

Synthesizing was an exception; anything craft-able below level V could be made anywhere, but the necessary ingredients still had to be assembled, and some items had carry limits.

For instance, bombs were an invaluable offensive tool for any crafter, but they could be made only in a workshop, and each player could carry only five.

Even with healing potions, crafting in the field was limited to the two weakest kinds.

And if that wasn’t bad enough, there was a permanent reduction to all weapon damage.

To make up for it, crafters got experience each time they completed anything made with skills like Smithing.

But they were undeniably lousy at fighting.

Crafters were, by and large, people who didn’t mind that. They just focused

on making items instead.

Iz was no exception.

And she was a top-tier crafter.

Since the day the game launched, she'd been mining, smithing, sewing, gathering, and synthesizing, raising every crafting skill available, sometimes getting so engrossed, she played all night long.

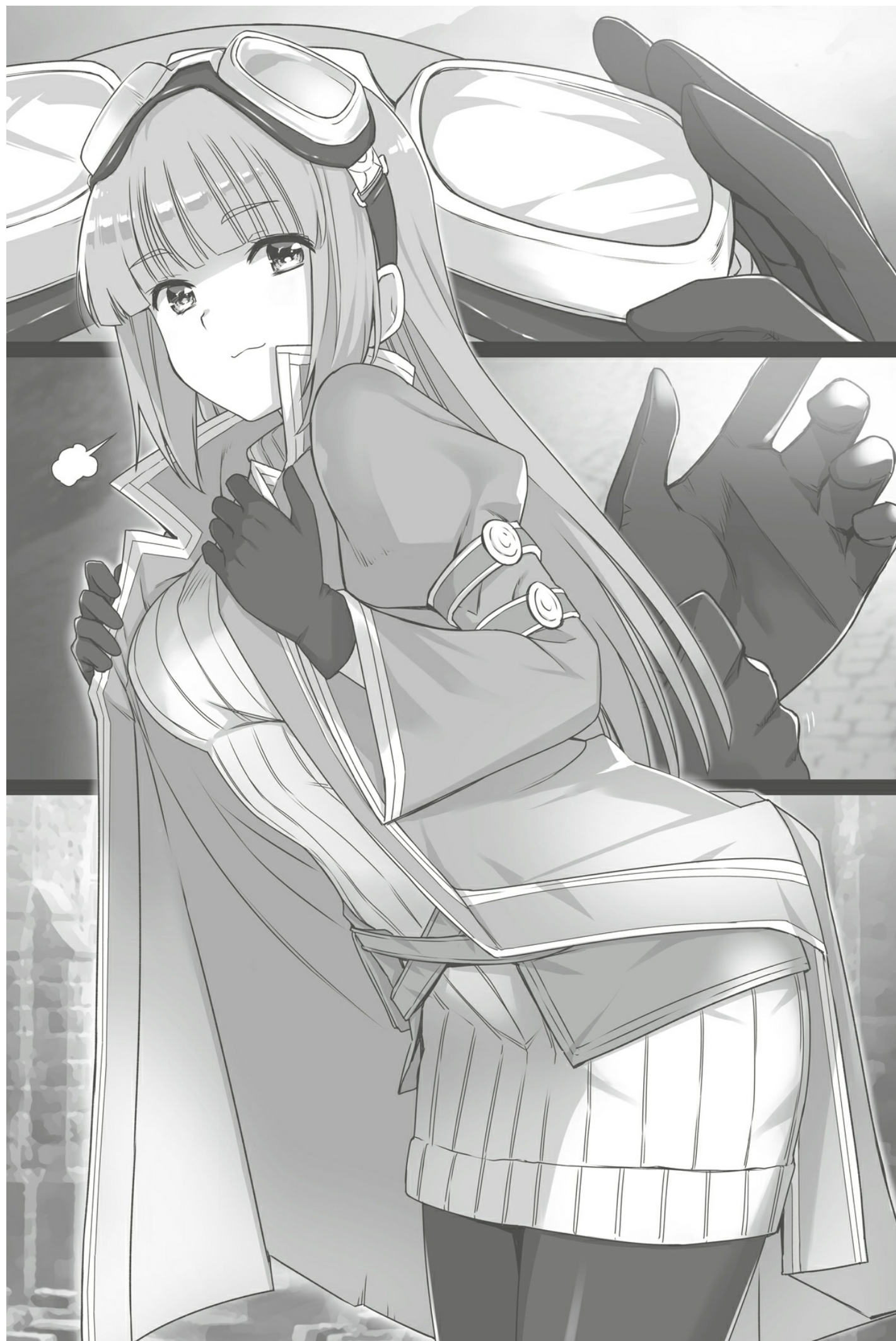

“Hmm, Maple, there’s a lake below.”

“Oh? Wanna check it out?”

Frederica's thoughts had already turned to what she should ask once she won.

Sally was out of breath. She lost her balance—there was no way she could avoid the stone bullets now.

"Got her!" Frederica breathed a sigh of relief...

And she heard Sally yell, "Waterflow!"

Before the mage's eyes, Sally started batting all the rocks aside with her daggers.

A different approach from the waterbolts...suggesting that this skill worked

only on solid objects.

This interpretation...was also meaningless.

As Sally batted the last stonebolt aside, she shot forward only to have her attack cut short.

“Right. I’m gonna surrender.”

“What? Oh. Okay...”

The words **YOU WIN!** suddenly appeared in front of Sally—and they were just as quickly sent back to where they’d started.

At the least, she believed she’d learned far more than she revealed.

She never realized which of them was caught in the bigger mousetrap.

Sally watched Frederica go, whispering, “The better you are, the easier it is to fake a disadvantage. Heh-heh-heh.”

She’s seen the mage twitch when she said “The Order of the Holy Sword” and immediately suspected where her loyalties lay.

And when Frederica had started blabbing info on the Flame Empire, Sally took that as proof she was with The Order.

What the mage did would work to her guild’s advantage.

Playing other guilds against each other was also in Sally’s playbook, so it wasn’t hard to figure out Frederica’s plan.

“And ‘knowing’ false info is worse than knowing nothing.”

Sally now knew about Frederica’s offensive spells, her impressive MP pool, and her significant defensive abilities.

And Frederica had learned about Attack Lure and Waterflow—two fearsome

skills with exploitable weaknesses.

In Sally’s opinion, if the twins got a little more experience with dual wielding, they’d be perfect.

Right now, their abilities were like a weaksauce blend of Maple’s and Sally’s hellfire, and in extremely specific situations, they could unleash a downright unreasonable level of force.

“Wanna see them in combat? We could find a place without prying eyes.”

““Let us show off!””

“Then maybe the forest? Not many people there. Especially if we head away from dungeons.”



“Sounds like a plan.”

The four of them hopped on Syrup’s back and wafted off to the deserted forest depths.

“Here we are!”

They landed in a forest clearing.

It was big enough for the twins to swing their hammers freely. They each took out their second hammers and stood ready.

“We’ll be keeping our distance.”

“Good idea.”

Monsters were already approaching through the underbrush.

Yui and Mai started swinging—not even using any skills.

Any successful strike spelled instant death, and the hammer blows were raining down mercilessly on any and all monsters.

A monster darted sideways, avoiding Yui’s blow, but Mai spotted it instantly, and her follow-up made it explode.

If Mai left an opening, Yui covered it. The hammers had impressive range, and the girls took full advantage of that. Sally had shown them a few tricks, and they thought alike to begin with—so their teamwork was now genuinely impressive.

And there were no monsters around that could tank one of their blows and keep coming.

All they had to do was hit once. That took a lot of the stress out of fighting.

Slaughtering all before anything could get to them.

“Those attacks are so good!”

“This is what everyone thinks when they see your defense, Maple.”

“Oh...huh.”

Even as they spoke, more monsters joined the carnage.

And when the dust finally settled, they hopped back on Syrup and flew away.

In the air, all four got a message—simultaneously.

It was from the admins, detailing the next event.

They read through it.

“Time compression—once again, no way to join in late.”

“Five days this time, huh? A bit shorter.”

And then the meat of the message...

At last they learned what this guild event would actually involve.

First, guild sizes: Less than twenty members were classified as “small.” Twenty-one to fifty as “midsize.” And fifty-one or more as “large.”

Each guild was given an orb to defend, and other guilds would attempt to steal these.

When defending your guild’s orb, each six-hour stretch earned one point.

Small guilds would earn two points.

When in possession of another guild’s orb, each three-hour stretch earned two points. And the guild robbed of their orb would lose one point.

If the orb was stolen by a small guild, the orbless guild would lose three points.

If the orb was stolen by a midsize guild, the orbless guild would lose two points.

Once points were awarded, the stolen orb would automatically return to its original location.

If the orb was recovered within the three-hour limit, no points were awarded or lost.

It was possible to check the locations (and status) of guild members and your guild’s orb on the map screen.

Stolen orbs were automatically placed in the pilferer’s item list.

Smaller guilds would be positioned in easy-to-defend locations.

Several temporary guilds had been created, and players not in guilds could

apply to these, allowing them to join the event.

Next, the death penalty.

First death: 5 percent stat reduction.

Second: another 10 percent drop.

Third: another 15 percent penalty.

Fourth: 20 percent on top of that.

Fifth: retired!

If all players were eliminated, the guild's orb would no longer spawn.

You could steal the same guild's orb only once a day.

That was the gist of the rules.

"Hmm, so five deaths and you're done, and frankly, starting from three onward, you're pretty hosed. At four deaths, your stats are halved..."

Given Maple Tree's numbers, they couldn't afford to use any strategies that involved sacrificing themselves.
